

Hospital Director Vote Deadline Cited By Head
Douglas Community Hospital Manager J. W. McAlvin calls attention to the deadline for voting on directors for the hospital staff. Three directors are to be elected for a 3-year term.

The candidates are incumbents Kenneth Ford, Dr. Morris Roach and Frank Ashely. Others nominated are Jeff Jeffers, Gordon Bevens and Harold McKay.

The official ballot states that to be valid, the ballot must be enclosed in the self-addressed official ballot envelope and mailed or taken in person to the office of the hospital, 1300 Harvard Ave.

However, McAlvin said, some letters were mistakenly mailed out without return envelopes, so returns may be sent in an ordinary envelope.

Ballots must be in the office by 5 p.m. June 30.

West Coast Airlines Gets 5th Safety Award

West Coast Airlines, receiving its fifth consecutive award, today was cited by the National Safety Council along with forty other U. S. scheduled air lines in recognition of their contribution to safe air transportation in 1951.

West Coast was among 15 local service airlines which have had a perfect safety record since their establishment, and was one of those to receive a five-year award.

In the five and one-half years since December, 1946, WCA has carried 375,000 passengers nearly 50-million passenger miles. Only two other local service carriers have a longer span of safe operation, Empire Air Lines, which began three months earlier in September, 1946, and Frontier Airlines, which began in November, 1946.

Myrtle Creek Lowers Cost Of New Building

Construction will start July 7 on a new building to house the Myrtle Creek Police Station and Library, it was announced today.

Original plans were revised by the common council to pare down cost of the building to \$18,605, the maximum amount the city can obtain for the project.

Todd Building Co. of Roseburg will build the structure. It is expected to be ready for occupancy in October when the library and police station will be shifted from present cramped quarters in the old Myrtle Creek City Hall.

structing the three bridges needed for spanning the North Umpqua River at Winchester and the South Umpqua twice at Roseburg. Eventual plans call for continuing the highway south over or through Roberts Mountain to Myrtle Creek and thence south to connect with new construction north of Canyonville, thus completing Oregon's longest stretch of Highway 99 that has become antiquated compared with modern travel means.

The commission will also let a contract for grading and temporary surfacing of 3.99 miles of the Divide-Rice Hill section. This, according to the local highway office, is largely for access roads to serve the residents living along the new-limited access highway.

Contract is also to be let on a 90-foot viaduct on the Comstock and Lawrence access Road grade separation structures on the Divide-Anlauf sections.

Access to the Drain-Reedsport highway will be constructed near Anlauf at the point where the new highway swings slightly to the east, and then continues south.

Other bid calls announced by the commission include: construct 332-foot concrete bridge over Galapool Creek on the Elkton-Sutherlin Highway; grading and surfacing 2.15 miles of Reedsport-Dean Creek section of Umpqua Highway, and grading and paving 32 miles of city streets in Riddle and Glendale.
