Pitching Duels Looming In Roseburg - Drain Tilts

This weekend's split double bill between the Drain Black Sox and the Roseburg Chiefs in Finlay Field promises a couple of pitching highlights.

Saturday night at 8, it will probably be a battle of hardened veterans. Manager Earl Sargent is definitely starting the old warhorse, Bus Sporer, on the mound for the Chiefs. If Manager Roy Helsner follows the form he has used in past Southwestern Oregon League series, he will do the pitching for the Sox. This will be a game where cunning and control should tell the story.

Again following the form book, the Sunday battle at 2 p.m. should be a contest of youth on the mound. Manager Sargent has announced he will use either Mickey Coen or Don Hopp. Both are youngsters, but putting Coen on the mound would be a natural because Helsner will probably send his young freshman star, Jerry Cade, to the hill.

Before this week, Drain would have reigned as a heavy favorite to take both ends of the double bill. The Sox have two of the top pitchers in the League and some of the top batting talent. Most of the talent both on the mound and at the plate is of the battle-scarred veteran variety. With a roster including such veteran stars as Helsner, Harvey, Storey and Bill Beard, the Sox have won ten games and lost only two. Meanwhile, the Chiefs have an even won-lost record of seven and seven.

Harry Markson, managing director of the International Boxing Club and a close friend of Goldstein's, said Ruby felt all right.

"It was just a case of the heat," Markson quoted Goldstein as saying. "Robinson is fine," said Dr. Vincent Nardiello, Ray's personal physician. "He just suffered from heat exhaustion. He's talking about a return fight with Maxim."

Sal Maglie Continues To Jinx Brooklyn; Wins 3-0 For Giants

Even on the hottest day of the year in New York, Sal Maglie is "Mr. Zero" to the Brooklyn Dodgers.

The 35-year-old "Barber" of the Polo Grounds chilled the Dodgers without a hit for six innings, and finally wound up with a three-hitter, 3-0, that boosted the New York Giants within three games of Brooklyn.

In winning his seventh in a row over the Dodgers, three this year and four in the last part of the '51 season, Maglie ran his string to 27 consecutive shutout innings.

Maglie threw only 45 pitches in the first six innings as he worked on a no-hitter. Jackie Robinson broke the spell with a leadoff single in the seventh.

The victory made Maglie the National's first 1952 10-game winner. That was the only game in the National League and there was only one in the American as the teams traveled.
