Finn Blamed
For Attacks
On Lattimore

SEATTLE (AP) — A 32-year-old Finn who came to this country 17 years ago after fighting the Russians in his homeland was accused by a federal grand jury Friday of lying about Owen Lattimore.

The jury returned two indictments against Harry A. Jarvinen, a Seattle travel agency executive, charging him with giving false and fictitious statements both to the Central Intelligence Agency and the FBI.

Jarvinen will be arraigned Monday. He said he will plead innocent. He is free on \$500 bond.

His attorney blames "too much drinking" at a cocktail party for Jarvinen's trouble.

The false tip given by the travel agency manager was that Lattimore, Johns Hopkins University professor and Far Eastern expert, planned a trip to Russia.

As a result, the State Department barred Lattimore's departure from this country. Later the FBI determined the tip was false. Lattimore had denied all along he had any intention of leaving.

The university professor, a favorite target of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) in his accusations of Communist influence in the State Department, also has denied any Communist connections.

After the grand jury handed down the indictments, Lattimore said in Baltimore he had never heard of Jarvinen but hoped the investigation would "find out what it's all about." The State Department had no comment.

Jarvinen's lawyer, Gerald Shucklin, said his client made a chance remark at a party where he had too much to drink. A CIA agent was present and overheard what was said, passing it along to the State Department.

"No one would have been justified in acting on that statement," Shucklin said.

Neither Jarvinen nor Shucklin offered any comment on the second indictment, which alleged that Jarvinen repeated the false tip to FBI agents called in to investigate. Jarvinen, who became a U.S. citizen in 1943, fought against the Russians in their 1939 invasion of Finland and served two years in the U.S. Army's 10th Mountain Division before he was discharged for medical reasons.

Navy Unit Here
Gets More Pay

Effective July 1, members of the Roseburg Electronics Warfare Unit of the Naval Reserve will receive pay for 48 meetings a year, on the same standard with units in larger cities in the 13th Naval District. Wait Kauslarich, station keeper, announced today.

In the past local reservists have received only 24 drill pays. Success of naval reserve units in the smaller towns, where percentage attendance and membership far surpasses some of the larger ones, has prompted action for the increased pay.

The Roseburg unit, said Kauslarich, who is with the regular Navy stationed at Roseburg, has received commendation from the commandant, Adm. D. E. Smith, headquarters 13th Naval District, Seattle, as being the first unit in his district to get up to full strength since the Korean war started.

The unit was highly complimented also for good attendance, and as the result of having an overflow of members, plans are to organize another electronics company in Roseburg the latter part of the summer.

With a new building (the unit is taking over the old Douglas County Home in West Roseburg July 7) and 48 pay drills, the Roseburg outfit will be second to none in the 13th district, said Kauslarich.

Commanded by Ray C. Brown, the unit, rated one of the finest, also has the best facilities of any town in the country, he said. The normal complement is 50 men and four officers, but the unit has an overflow of 15 men.

Orders have already been received for the deactivation of the Volunteer Electronic Platoon 13-17.

Traffic is expected to be detoured about the middle of July when construction gets under way on the new 75-foot span.

Tight Patrol
Ordered For
Tiller Region

Around-the-clock police patrols were being maintained on the Tiller-Trail Road and other South Douglas areas as the search for the suspected slayer of a state policeman entered its fifth day today.

State police were maintaining patrols on the theory that George Baker Dunkin, 67-year-old eccentric, may have gone north out of Jackson County.

Douglas County sheriff's deputies were scheduled to leave Monday morning for the Big Camas and Diamond Lake areas if the fugitive is not located by then.

Dunkin is wanted in connection with the ambush slaying of State Patrolman Phil B. Lowd of Medford last Tuesday evening.

Airplane patrols were also being flown over the rugged Umpqua Divide by state police from Roseburg. Officers were refraining from a foot-by-foot search of the 50-square-mile area in which Dunkin is believed located. The recluse is believed armed with the same .30-30 rifle with which he's suspected of shooting Officer Lowd.

Police cited Dunkin's ability to cover a large amount of territory by foot in a short time and added that he once walked some 30 miles from his cabin to Tiller in one night "by trails which only he knows."

Officers theorized that Dunkin may attempt to contact someone for food or ammunition. It was believed that he had no more than about five cartridges with him when he fled Tuesday night.

Officers reported finding most of his ammunition in his filthy cabin at the head of Elk Creek.

Four Roseburg area youths were injured late Friday when the lights blinked out on the car in which they were riding and the vehicle reportedly missed a corner and rolled over three times on Garden Valley road near the old Denton ranch.

James Lowe, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Lowe, 1010 W. First St., driver, minor cuts and bruises, including a black eye.

Gary Burkhardt, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Esper Burkhardt, 1407 Umpqua Ave., injuries to his right leg and head.

John Michael, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. T. Michael, Garden Valley, head and neck injuries.

Page Binkley, 16, son of Mrs. Fay Binkley, 1124 Princeton St., scratches and minor chest injuries.

Attendants at Community Hospital said this morning all of the boys were in excellent condition and would be released soon.

The accident occurred near midnight. Lowe said he lost control of the car when the lights went out and it skidded on the slippery road.

The boys were taken to the hospital in the Mohr Ambulance.

**38 Boys Enter
Applebox Derby**

A good turnout of racers was promised in the Applebox Derby July 12 with the report today that 38 boys have already entered.

Vic Bakala, of Hansen Motor Co., reported that the number of entrants has been "very good."

The drivers will whip their homemade applebox racers down Winchester Street in a 640-foot course to compete for cash awards and a trophy.

The cash awards are offered by Hansen Motors, while the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the derby and offering the big gold trophy.

First of the applicants to enter this year was 14-year-old Leonard Read who took first-place honors at the derby last year. Last year's second and third place winners, Ralph Young, 7, and Bobby Lockman, 12, are also entered. Read will have racer No. 1.

Rules specify that the racers must be built at a cost of not more than \$10, including wheels.

Anyone 14 years old and under is eligible, according to Grady Mankins, general chairman of the event.

Bakala urged prospective applicants to obtain a set of rules at Hansen's before starting to construct their racers. The new rules are different than they were last year, and some of the racers are not measuring up to the correct specification stipulated in the rules.

The racers are to be constructed by the youngsters themselves, and no help, other than advisory, is permitted, Mankins said.

Rules specify the following maximums:

Width—37 inches tread-to-tread. Height—24 inches without driver. Weight—190 pounds with driver. Length—65 inches. Height off ground—six inches. Protrusion of the body of the racer beyond 14 inches past the rear axle is not permitted. Cash awards consist of \$100 for first place, \$50 for second and \$25 for third.

Council OK's
Contract For
Storm Drain

The Roseburg City Council at a special meeting Friday accepted a low bid of \$37,587, submitted by Stoen Construction Co., Seattle, for installation of a first unit of West Roseburg storm sewers.

The council also passed an ordinance setting July 9 as the date for a second voting upon the city budget excess above the six percent limitation. The amount to be voted upon will be \$123,977.92. The budget committee at a meeting last Monday cut \$9,040 from the original expenditures. July 23 was set as the date for the public budget hearing.

The bid of Stoen Construction, which has the contract for construction of additional lines of the North Roseburg Sanitary District, was about \$500 less than the city engineer's estimate.

Two other bids were submitted. Everett Denn Herder, Portland, was next low with \$41,733.58, and H. C. Werner, Inc., Eugene, \$45,560.

Construction will begin in the near future. The contractor has been given 120 days to complete but the intent is to have the job completed before rainy weather sets in next fall, said City Manager W. A. Gilchrist. The city wants no more wet weather construction, he commented.

The storm sewers will be placed along Nebo, Myrtle, Fairhaven and some of the connecting streets, continuing north to Harvard. The line will extend east one block on Harvard to Union, then proceed north across the Veterans Hospital property, just east of the old County Home, to the South Umpqua River. It will follow an old road in this vicinity. Easement has been acquired from the Hospital administration.

Gilchrist said that the pipe leading to the river will be 36 inches in diameter, large enough to drain remaining portions of West Roseburg. Y's will be placed in order that new connections to the trunk line may be made at any time, without disrupting the existing installation.

The area to be served by this initial installation will include a large portion of the Fairhaven district which has petitioned for street paving. It is intended that paving can get underway next summer, said Gilchrist. The council hopes to drain additional areas there next summer.

Construction is scheduled to start Monday on storm sewers in the north part of Roseburg. The council has let a contract to Willard F. Stoneburner, Springfield, on a low bid of \$21,501. Sixty days is allotted for completion. This also is only a first unit in an overall plan for draining the north section of the city.

The line will begin on Rowa street, and will drain West First and Jackson streets, entering Deer Creek near the highway bridge on North Stephens Street.

All main lines will be large enough and Y's for connections will be placed so that future installations may be connected without disruption of the initial lines, said Gilchrist.

**Allies Protest
Berlin Shackles**

BERLIN (AP) — The Western Allies protested to the Russians Saturday that "inhuman" shackles have been put on the people of Berlin by East Zone Communists.

In identical notes, the three Western commandants demanded the Russians either tell their puppet East Zone authorities to stop restricting the free movement of Berliners or arrange compensation for the thousands of innocent people suffering "untold distress."

West Berlin authorities said 16,000 West Berliners with property in the East Zone have registered in a City Council survey of those affected by the restrictions.

The notes were delivered as East German Communists stepped up their assault on the nerves of West Berliners to mark the visit of U.S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson to the Soviet-occupied city.

Acheson's morale-building visit is ostensibly to lay the cornerstone of the American Memorial Library in Berlin.
