Two More Prisoners Flee Crumbling Jail

McMINNVILLE (AP) — The Yamhill County jail, virtually falling apart because of the bricks, was abandoned Saturday night by two more prisoners.

They used a window sash to knock the bricks out from the crumbling mortar.

Their hole was right alongside a recently patched place used by a departing prisoner two weeks ago.

It was only a matter of hours, though, before one of the men, Albert Ulman, 29, Willamina, was found at his parents' home in Portland.

The other, Donald Memory, 16, of Clifton, O., still was hunted.

The people recently voted money for a new jail and it will be built next year. The present one was built nearly 65 years ago.

McKay Doubts If Taft Could Carry Oregon

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Oregon's Gov. McKay, a Republican adherent of Gen. Eisenhower for the presidential nomination, said here Sunday he had serious doubts that Sen. Taft, if he got the nomination, could carry Oregon.

Colorado's Gov. Dan Thornton, also an Eisenhower man, said the same thing about his state.

McKay said, though, at a press conference preceding the annual governors' conference which he came here to attend, that if Eisenhower were nominated he could carry all three Pacific Coast states. Only Oregon among the 11 Far West states went Republican four years ago.

TEN INJURED IN HIGHWAY ACCIDENTS

2-Car Crash Deals Hurts To 7 Persons

Three Injured In Other Mishaps That Result Also In Two Citations

Ten persons were injured in three accidents Sunday and early today on Pacific Highway south of Roseburg.

State Police and Myrtle Creek Police Chief Oliver Corbett reported seven persons suffered minor injuries in a two-car crash at 8:45 a.m. Sunday a mile south of Myrtle Creek.

Electric Co-Op Gets Govt. Loan For Expansion

A loan for \$375,000 to Douglas Electric Co-op, for expansion of its service has been approved by the Rural Electrification Administration, Rep. Harris Ellsworth disclosed today from Washington, D. C.

The announcement said the fund would be used to build 16 miles of transmission lines, 33 miles of distribution lines and completion of previously approved construction.

It was expected the expansion would bring new service to 177 consumers, including 52 irrigation loads, Congressman Ellsworth said.

Officials of Douglas Electric here said they had not received official word the loan had been approved and were unable to disclose what areas would be affected by the new construction.

Sewer Line Draws State 'Fix' Order

Cloverdale Area Told To Abolish 'Nuisance' Due To Faulty System

The State Sanitary Authority has ordered an end, within 10 days, to what it calls a sewage nuisance in Roseburg's Cloverdale area in which some 170 homes are located, the Associated Press reports from Portland.

The Cloverdale Water Company, North Roseburg Sanitary District, Roseburg Homes Inc., and H. R. Kettell of Portland, former controller of the district, were named in the order.

State action to force the Cloverdale area to bring its sewers up to specifications followed hearing in Portland Friday.

The Cloverdale area is part of the North Roseburg Sanitary District, which includes a total of about 1,000 homes.

Although voted into the North Roseburg District, the Cloverdale area has been denied the right to hook up with the large district because its sewers do not meet specifications.

Officials said its the Cloverdale system, although only three years old, was constructed in such a way that storm water backs up in the pipe lines and also pours in through weak joints.

State authorities have also called its sewage disposal plant "inadequate."

The state order is expected to spur work on the Cloverdale system so it can soon be connected with the North Roseburg district.

Once this is completed, officials said, the whole sewer system problem in that area will be cleared up.

Convict Trio Fails In Escape Attempt; 4th Walks Away

SALEM (AP) — Three convicts—two of them killers—tried again Sunday to escape from the state prison but, unhappily for them, Warden Virgil O'Malley happened to be walking across the grounds at the time.

"Hey, what's going on there?" O'Malley shouted as he saw three men, racing through a restricted area, carrying a make-shift ladder.

In a moment he recognized them and knew what they were doing. There was Lifer DuPre Poe, in for killing a policeman; Wayne LeRoy Long, only a day away from hearing his execution date set; and Albert Doolin, habitual criminal. Just two weeks ago those same three tried to get away.

When O'Malley, who was showing Lt. Dean Evans of the California State Prison at Soledad around the yard, recognized the men, he told them to halt.

Weekly, they did. Guards put them back in their cells.

Investigation showed that they were released briefly from segregation—they were there for trying to escape—to get exercise. The exercise they took involved cutting door bars with a smuggled hacksaw, running to the roof, sliding down a sheet rope, then running across the yard toward the wall.

The cells which now hold them insecurely will be occupied only until the stronger new cell block is completed.

There was one convict who did escape over the week end. He was Ernest E. Chandler, a trusty, who walked away from the guards' quarters where he was a cook.

Weekend Rain Takes Heavy Toll Of State Cherry Crop; Hay, Clover Also Damaged

Rain washed heavily on Oregon over the week end. The value of the state's cherry crop was cut by thousands of dollars. Some hay and clover were damaged. A roof leak caused substantial damage to the U. S. National Bank at Junction City.

Electric Storm Damages Home, Affects Power

Lightning preceding a drenching rain storm damaged one home in the Roseburg area over the weekend and cut power circuits in several places.

More than one and a half inches of rain fell in Roseburg from 3 p.m. Saturday to 11 a.m. today, most of it during a three-hour period late Saturday, the U.S. Weather Bureau reported.

A bolt of lightning struck power lines leading into the home of Francis P. Mendenhall on Calkins Road and streaked along the wires into the building.

The flash burned out the electric meter and grounding system, exploded the ground plate for the telephone and damaged the roof of the house.

California & Oregon Power Co. reported lightning cut power circuits in several spots Saturday afternoon, blacking out the Main street area and a couple fringe areas.

Power was off for nearly an hour when the storm knocked out a main feeder line between Dixonville and Roseburg.

Slick roads and poor visibility caused by the rain were blamed for more than a dozen accidents in which at least 10 persons were injured in the Roseburg area.

Boy Who Stole Gift For Dad Kills Himself

TOLEDO, O. (AP) — A 15-year-old boy, arrested recently because he tried to steal a gift for Father's Day, killed himself to make amends, the sheriff's office said.

A motorist found the body of Fred Greenburg Sunday not far from his home.

The boy had shot himself in the head with his dad's .22 caliber pistol, Deputy Coroner Irvin McConnell said.

The boy had left a note to his parents, saying he was "paying for my mistake."

Juvenile court officials had released him to his parents' custody after giving him a lecture.

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Salary Boosts Loom For British Royal Pair

LONDON (AP) — Parliament was urged Monday by Queen Elizabeth II a yearly salary of \$75,000, both of \$1,336,000—a raise of \$182,000 compared with the wages of her late father.

A select committee representing all major parties in Parliament also proposed the Queen's 31-year-old husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, be paid 40,000 pounds or \$112,000 for life. He now receives an annual allowance of 10,000 pounds.

The duke, who is recovering from an attack of jaundice, got another piece of good news, this one from the Royal Navy. It announced his promotion from lieutenant commander to commander.

Jail Escape Foiled By Discovery Of Hole

SALEM (AP) — An escape attempt from the Salem city jail was stopped Saturday night by Police Capt. Leland D. Weaver, who discovered a hole dug in an outside wall by county prisoners.

The hole was almost big enough for a man to squeeze through. County prisoners are being held in the city jail while the new courthouse is being built.

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Truman Will Approve Bill, Conferees Say

10-Month Continuance Less Than President Wanted But He Yields

WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration leaders said Monday President Truman will sign later in the day a bill extending wage and price controls for 10 months.

Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) told reporters after a White House conference that the President is "not too well pleased with it" but that signing the measure is "the only thing he can do."

The bill as passed by Congress Saturday bears little resemblance to the controls legislation Truman asked of the House and Senate last year.

He wanted authority to control wages and prices extended for two years, until June 30, 1954, and he asked that the current controls provisions—contained in the Defense Production act of 1950 be strengthened.

Instead Congress weakened some of the controls authority and placed a 10-month limit on an extension.

The Defense Production Act will expire at midnight Monday night unless the President signs the extension.

Rayburn told questioners the President "didn't seem very enthusiastic" over the legislation even though the final bill as considered a victory for the administration after the House earlier had voted to kill nearly all wage-price controls.

Major Changes Made

The controls legislation, would continue federal authority to regulate wages and prices through next April 30.

But it would make several major changes in the present Defense Production Act. These changes would:

1. End rent controls on Sept. 30 except in localities whose governing bodies vote to extend them to next April 30, and in certified critical defense areas.
2. Toss out controls over credit for consumer goods and for conventional housing loans. The Federal Reserve Board could restrict housing credit again if the annual rate of new houses started passed 1,200,000. The present rate is 1,100,000.
3. Retain the Wage Stabilization Board (WSB) but with limited power, and to make the appointment of its members subject to Senate confirmation.

The board would be deprived of its authority to make recommendations in labor disputes unless the management and union agreed to ask the WSB how much of a wage boost might be granted in a dispute.

A major administration setback was adoption of an amendment to exempt processed fruits and vegetables from price controls.

Price control officials said this comprises about 11 percent of the household's grocery purchases and could mean a big hike in food costs.

The measure also includes a request—not binding—that the President invoke the Taft-Hartley law in the steel strike. This would mean asking for an 80-day strike-halting court injunction, which Truman has said would accomplish nothing permanent.

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
