

Beavers Blank Solons, 7-0 And 3-0

Stars Beat L. A. Twice; Padres Win

Six of seven Sunday games in the Pacific Coast League had something in common—shutout pitching.

Hollywood blanked Los Angeles twice, 4-0 and 2-0, for the first double shutout of the season, only to see Portland turn up a few minutes later with another, 7-0 and 3-0 over Sacramento.

San Diego downed Seattle 2-0 in the opener and the Rainiers were ahead 1-0 in the nightcap when the game was called in the fourth inning because of wet grounds.

San Francisco held Oakland to a goose egg, 3-0, and lost the nightcap in eight innings, 5-4.

Red Adams and Marino Pieretti were the stars for Portland. Adams limited the solons to four hits in the first game and Pieretti gave up two in the nightcap.

The Beavers' 11-hit attack in the opener was sparked by Hank Artt's two-run homer. Joe Brovia's four bagger in the fourth inning of the finale made it 1-0 and the two other scores came in the sixth on a bases-loaded single. Portland took the series, 5-2.

Memo Luna shackled Seattle with a two-hitter in pitching his shutout. The game was interrupted for 30 minutes by showers. Both San Diego tallies came in the first.

Jack Tobin opened with a single and moved to third on Dick Faber's single. Faber moved to second on the throw-in, then Herb Gorman singled to score them both.

The two games washed out during the week will be played when the Padres return to Seattle for another series, Aug. 26.

Driving the car above was Bill Ward, captain of the Canadian Aces, when he made his spectacular 163 foot run on two wheels as part of the thriller when staged at Hughes Stadium in Sacramento, Calif., recently. Bill will again thrill the spectators and earn points for his team when the combined thrill circus and stunt contest appears in Roseburg at the Fairgrounds.

Sedans To Do Broadjump For Stunt Show Monday

The world's greatest collection of fearless humans will gather under the banners of the International Stuntmen's Association and the Joie Chitwood Auto Daredevils to offer two and a half hours of thrills at 8:30 p.m. Monday, at the Douglas County Fairgrounds in Roseburg. Every step has been taken to prepare for a record-breaking crowd of thrill-seekers.

The second annual championship open stunt contest will feature competition between Joie Chitwood's world champion daredevils and Bill Ward's Canadian Aces, Vancouver, B. C.; Angel Lopez y sus Diablos del Timon, Mexico; D. F.; Ewald "Dutch" Schnitzer's Circus of Death from Berlin, Germany; "Lucky" Walters' Hollywood Stuntmen; and Aki Kimura's Dragon Drivers. Japanese stuntmen on world tour. There will be 30 events altogether.

Included on the competition program will be broadjumping new sedans for distance and height from one ramp to another—almost 100 feet through the air; crash-rolling stock cars for distance and

consecutive rolls; slide for life through fire; head-on collision with an 80 mph impact while the drivers remain at the wheel; and many specialty events.

Points will be awarded here toward the ISA's \$10,000 added purse and the gold trophy which will be awarded to the captain of the winning team entry at the close of the contest in October.

In addition to automobile stunts there will be motorcycle broadjumping; the motorcycle crash of flaming death through two blazing board walls; Cyclotron-cycle racing; and "Lucky" Walters, who leads the Hollywood Stuntmen into competition, will blow himself up in a casket with 20 sticks of dynamite.

The Chitwood troupe that is competing in the contest is the same one that you've seen in the movie "To Please a Lady" which starred Clark Gable as a Chitwood driver. They have also been featured in Life, Saturday Evening Post, Popular Mechanics, and newsteels.

Fifty-two members of the team, plus coaches and officials are due to reach New York Monday night. Tuesday they go to Princeton to train for the remainder of the week. They will compete in a final fund-raising meet at New York, July 6, and take off for Helsinki the next day.

Dodgers Nip Boston, 6-5; Giants Thump Phils, 12-3

Sunday was a day of sweet revenge for a flock of peddled players and marooned managers who came back to haunt their old stamping grounds.

Tommy Holmes, fired a month ago as manager of the Boston Braves, faced his former hirelings for the first time in the role of a pinch hitter—and cracked out the hit that snapped a 5-5 tie and drove in the run that gave the Brooklyn Dodgers a 6-5 victory.

Fred Fitzsimmons, fired as manager of the Philadelphia Phillies six years ago to the day—June 30, 1945—took over the reins of the New York Giants due to Leo Du-rocher's four-day suspension, and directed his charges to a 12-3 triumph over the Phils.

Dick Kryboski, traded off by Detroit last February, cracked a home run with two out and two on in the last of the ninth to give the St. Louis Browns a 3-2 victory over his former Tiger mates.

Howie Pollet and Joe Garagiola, batterymates sent by the St. Louis Cardinals to Pittsburgh last year, combined to lead the Pirates to a 2-1 win over the Redbirds. Pollet pitched a two-hitter. Garagiola scored one run and drove in the other.

Goldie Robinson, a former Cleveland first baseman, doubled in a run and scored another in the Chicago White Sox first game 4-2 decision over the Indians and smashed a two-run homer in the second game that ended in a 10-inning 7-7 tie. Darkness prevented further play.

John Pramesa slammed a pinch hit bases-loaded single to drive in the last two of Chicago's seven runs in the ninth inning that enabled the Cubs to overcome an 8-2 deficit and defeat his former Cincinnati mates, 9-8, in the first game of a doubleheader.

Field Opened In Annual Women's Golf Tourney

The annual Courier-Pearson women's golf tournament at the Roseburg Country Club this year will be an open affair.

In former years, the tourney was limited to "B" Class golfers, but an announcement from the Country Club reveals this year's tourney will host an open field for all three classes. Qualifying rounds are set for July 1, 3 and 5.

In years past, old timers say, rattlesnakes were occasionally found in the Roseburg area, but none has been reported in recent years. They have been known to exist in numbers in rocky places more remote from the city, including the area to the south and west of Mt. Nebo.
