Vote In Senate Spells Increase For Air Force

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted unanimously Monday to give the Air Force enough money to build its fighting strength to 143 wings by the middle of 1955.

By a vote of 79 to 0, the Senate adopted an amendment proposed by Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo) that would chop seven billion dollars in cash from Air Force funds voted by the House.

But at the same time the amendment would give the Air Force authority to contract for new planes—on credit—on the basis of a sum 560 million dollars more than the amount voted by the House.

It was an unusual amendment and it left most of the senators a bit puzzled.

In place of the \$1,125,044,000 of new cash for planes voted by the House, O'Mahoney's amendment would provide only \$4,685,044,000 cash but it would allow eight billion of contract authority or credit.

This was \$7,440,000,000 less new cash but a cash and credit total of 560 million more.

The vote came after O'Mahoney said he wanted the Air Force to attain the 143-wing goal by July 1, 1955.

This would be one year beyond July 1, 1954—the date that the Joint Chiefs of Staff and military intelligence experts say Soviet Russia will be able to launch a long-range atomic bomb attack on this nation.

Republican senators, including Bridges of New Hampshire, Ferguson of Michigan and Case of South Dakota, questioned that the House would be willing to accept any scheme for contract authority.

But all agreed to vote for the amendment and see what a Senate-House committee, that will adjust differences later, could agree upon.

Four Roseburg men are among the crew of the aircraft carrier USS Valley Forge which docks at the San Diego naval air station today from Korea.

The men are William D. Whitehead, chief gunner (warrant); Robert R. Barrett, fireman; George W. Porter, aerographer's mate, first class; and James K. Neavoll, gunner's mate, third class.

Today is the carrier's second anniversary of combat. She was the first carrier to launch air attacks against the North Koreans and the first to complete three Korean tours.

Finn Denies He Gave False Tip On Lattimore

SEATTLE — A Finnish veteran of the Russo-Finnish War pleaded innocent Monday to two charges of giving federal agents false information that Owen Lattimore was planning a trip to Russia.

Harry A. Jarvinen, 32-year-old Seattle travel agency manager, gave the "not guilty, your honor" response to each of two counts at his Federal Court arraignment.

One count in the grand jury indictment charged him with giving false information to the Central Intelligence Agency; the other involved the FBI.

Lattimore, controversial Johns Hopkins University specialist on Far Eastern affairs, has denied any plans for such a trip. After Jarvinen's indictment Friday, the State Department apologized to Lattimore for its issuing of advances against his departure from the country, on the basis of the "tip."

Jarvinen told reporters after the short court appearance that the statement about Lattimore was made to a C.I.A. agent who was a "very close" friend, at a dinner party at which they were drinking.

Jarvinen's attorney continued to decline to let him discuss the motive for the original statements.

"The government attorneys haven't all the facts in this case," Attorney Gerald Shucklin explained. "He will tell his story at the trial."
