Stevenson Holds Back Decision On Candidacy

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois said Monday he will decide later what to do in the "unlikely" event that a move develops to draft him for the Democratic presidential nomination.

The Illinois governor, considered by many in his party as one of the likeliest prospects for nomination at the Chicago convention opening July 21, told a news conference here he still is running only for re-election as governor.

But he left the door open to what he said is an "unlikely" move to draft him, although he said he

would not participate either openly or secretly in any such move.

Here for the annual governors conference, Stevenson anticipated questions of reporters about the presidential situation. He read to a news conference a typed statement which concluded:

"I will not participate openly or covertly in any movement to draft me. Without such participation on my part, I do not believe that any such draft can or will develop."

"In the unlikely event that it does, I will decide what to do at that time in the light of conditions that then exist."

When he had finished reading his statement, Stevenson smiled at reporters and added:

"It will do you no good, gentlemen, to ask any further questions."

Dividend Rate Boosted By U.S. National Bank

The United States National bank of Portland is now paying its quarterly dividend to shareholders at the new, higher rate of \$2.40 per share per year, reports Harold Schmeer, manager of the Roseburg branch.

This is a 20 per cent increase in dividend, Schmeer says. The rate of \$2.00 per share per year has been paid since April, 1946.

The United States National has been paying dividends without interruption for more than 53 years, he added.

With deposits totaling \$574,137, 335 on March 31, the United States National ranks 32nd among the banks of the nation.

The bank's paid-up capital and surplus now total \$30,000,000, having been increased from \$24,000,000 to \$29,000,000 by action of the shareholders in March of this year and by transfer of \$1,000,000 from undivided profits to surplus in May Schmeer reports. In addition, there is more than \$12,000,000 in undivided profits, giving the United States National a working capital base of more than \$42,000,000.

The United States National bank now serves 33 Oregon communities with 41 offices located throughout the state.

"You say I don't have the right to start a milk business ...

why not?"

BECAUSE you first must get permission. Everyone who distributes milk—whether as producer or wholesaler—must be approved by Milk Control.

Official regulations make it clear that no one will be permitted to enter the milk business if the Milk Administration says such new competition might disturb existing distributors.

Milk Control decides which distributors, as well as which producers, shall be allowed to fill our needs. No one can go into the milk business simply because he sees an opportunity. He must get permission. Once in business he cannot extend his business beyond a certain definite territory without further permission.

At the beginning of 1940 there were 766 distributors in Oregon. By 1950 their number had shrunk to 231—a loss of 70%. Yet this was the same period during which our population increased 40%.

Such rigid regulations prevent healthy competition which, in turn, could reduce milk prices just as it enables people to buy more of other foods.
