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Factors Noted Regarding Conventions In Past Years Of Major Political Parties

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here are the answers to a couple of questions about the political conventions, held this year in Chicago. The Republicans open theirs July 7. The Democrats follow July 21.

1. Why do the Democrats hold their convention after the Republicans finish theirs?
Answer: Just habit.

2. Why do the parties pick the same city for their convention?
Answer: True, they've picked the same city the last three times.

But most of their conventions before 1940 were held in different cities. But the expense and problems involved in the news, radio and TV coverage are becoming so huge and complex it's best all around to meet in the same place.

The two Chicago conventions this year will be in the same hall. The Democrats and Republicans worked hand-in-glove making the arrangements. It's saved them time, money and trouble.

Choosing the convention city is done by the national committees of both parties a half year or more before the conventions open.

Major Factors Weighed

Actually, subcommittees of the big committees have been scouting around long before that. They keep these main points in mind:

1. Location. They usually pick a place most centrally located for all the delegates. It's no accident the two parties have met most often in Chicago.

2. Facilities. This covers a lot of ground: Hotel space; enough room in the convention hall itself to get the work done; from now on probably only a hall with air-conditioning will be selected, for the Chicago convention will be air-conditioned this year; and ample arrangements for the news, radio and TV people.

3. How much money a city is willing to kick in to get itself

picked for the convention.

Chicago will give \$250,000 each to the two parties this year to help cover their expenses. The city hopes to get the money back in business, prestige and publicity.

Past Meeting Places

The Republicans have held most of their conventions in the Middle West. Although they've met in Philadelphia (five times) and Baltimore (once).

The Democrats have ranged a little farther afield. They've met, besides the Middle West, in Baltimore (three times), New York (twice), Houston (once), San Francisco (once), Denver (once), Philadelphia (twice).

Accidents Kill 2 Near Hermiston

HERMISTON, Ore. (AP) — Two men were killed in separate highway accidents near here shortly before midnight Monday.

Harold Ward, 30, gasoline service station operator, was killed in a collision with an Overland Greyhound bus as he turned into his station.

Cpl. William J. Conley, 25, Camp Hanford soldier, was killed five miles south of here 30 minutes later when his car went off the highway at a curve. His home town was not learned.

In both accidents a passenger suffered a leg fracture.

Conley's passenger, James McDaniel, 21, also a Camp Hanford soldier, from Seattle, crawled up an embankment and flagged down a passing car. He was reported in good condition in a Pendleton hospital Tuesday.

Ward's passenger, Lewis Ray O'Mohundro, 26, Ordinance, suffered a bad leg fracture and his condition was more serious. No one aboard the bus was hurt.

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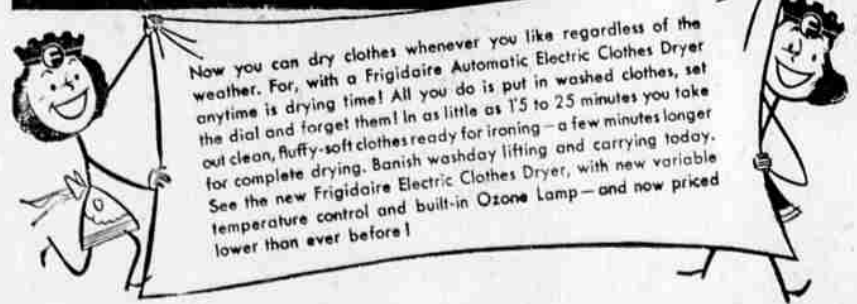


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
