

**Oregon Walnut Crop Outlook Reported Good**

PORTLAND (U) — The Walnut Control Board, meeting for the first time in Portland, reported Tuesday that 1952 crop outlook was good.

Much of last year's crop already has been marketed and that made room for the present crop, J. H. Bryce of Los Angeles, manager, reported.

Of the 1,128,800,000 pound crop, 838,433,000 pounds had been shipped by the end of May, he said. Some 172,231,000 pounds have been classified as surplus and will not be sold on domestic markets.

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## Legion Service Officer Explains Aid Offered Vets

George Shaw of Portland, department service officer for the American Legion, discussed veterans' problems handled by his office at meeting Monday night of Umpqua Post of the American Legion.

Shaw, here on his bi-monthly visit to Veterans Hospital, said his office handled 368 compensation and pension matters from Sept. 1, 1951 through May 31, 1952.

His office also handled 150 death benefit cases, 28 insurance requests and seven vocational and rehabilitation problems for veterans.

He emphasized that department service is free to all veterans whether they are legionnaires or not. The department processes all benefit claims free, he pointed out. The office handled 3,073 personal interviews, 1,344 hospital contacts, 2,994 telephone calls and 1,308 rating board appearances.

Compensation and pension recoveries to date for 1,068 vets included \$998,249. Two hundred thirty-nine death benefit claims processed brought recovery of \$233,765.

Shaw disclosed that the work of Legion posts in Roseburg and Medford and their post service officers is being augmented by bi-monthly visitations by a department service officer to the Veterans Hospital here and Camp White, Medford.

The department staff consists of three full-time service officers and two full-time secretaries. One service officer and one secretary staff the office at 429 S.W. 4th Ave., Portland, and the other service officer and secretary are in the VA Building at 205 S.W. 5th Ave.

## Lookingglass Parish Told Of Alaska Mission Work

Demonstrating that the famed Methodist "Circuit Riders" is not a thing of the past, Rev. F. Gene Elliott, who has served the past two years on a 450 mile circuit on the Kenai Peninsula in Alaska, appeared before a packed house at the Lookingglass Church on Sunday evening with a fine collection of colored slides and a graphic presentation of the work being done in that area.

Included among the splendid scenery views, Rev. Mr. Elliott has taken pictures of some of the difficulties of carrying on the work of Christianizing natives and settlers on the peninsula. During the past two years the government has been spending huge sums of money in that area, largely because of defense strategy. Church presented to them this spring.

The Elliotts serve under the Alaskan Missions Council of the Methodist Church and during the ensuing year their expenses will be underwritten by the Rose City Park Methodist Church of Portland, where the annual Oregon Conference was held in late June. They are currently visiting with Elliott's parents Mr. and Mrs. Fred Elliott in Canyonville, where Gene had his public schooling, later graduating from Cascade College in Portland and from Ashbury Seminary in Kentucky. They will leave shortly for Pennsylvania to visit Mrs. Elliott's mother, returning to the coast in mid August and on to Alaska in time for the Alaskan Annual Church Conference in Ketchikan in late September.
