**Bill Cuts Power To Call Reserves To Active Duty**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress has passed and sent to President Truman a compromise bill limiting his power to call reservists to active military duty.

It splits reservists into two general groups, "ready" and "standby." The "ready" reserves, composed of service veterans and numbering 1,500,000 could be called to active duty during an emergency declared by the President, but Congress itself would decide how many should be called.

The "standby" reserves, composed of veterans with long service and more active reserve time, could be put on active duty only in wartime or during an emergency declared by Congress.

These men would be called only when there are no more available "ready" reservists.

Drafted men released after serving two years of active duty now go into the ready reserve for six years.

They can discharge this liability for further active service by actively participating in reserve programs for three years and going into the standby reserve.

**Pernia Moore Dies June 29 In Eugene**

Pernia Kirk Moore, 70, former Roseburg resident, died June 29 in Eugene.

Mrs. Moore was born Jan. 10, 1882, in Elmira. She was married Jan. 29, 1901, to Maurice Moore in Eugene. For the next 20 years she lived in Roseburg, moving to Eugene in 1921.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Eugene, with recitation of the rosary Tuesday at the Pool-Larsen Chapel.

Surviving are her five children, Thomas H. Moore, Klamath, Calif.; Cora Frey, Martha Selander and Elaine Getty, Eugene; two brothers, Bert and Elmer Kirk, Walton, Ore.; and a sister, Ethel Hooker, Brookings. She leaves six grandchildren.

**Salmon Poor On Coast; Trout Angling Good**

Fourth of July weekend fishermen will find salmon fishing at Winchester Bay poor, but angling better in the interior. Trout fishing is just fair in coastal lakes, with angling good in coast streams, according to the southwest regional office of the Oregon State Game Dept.

Recent rains have caused water conditions in the Upper Umpqua to be unfavorable for angling, but improvement the coming weekend is expected.

Trout fishing on central coast lakes is fair with flies. Catfish are beginning to bite. Warm water fishing is good. Trout angling in southern coastal streams is good.

Salmon angling is improving in the Grants Pass area and is fair to good in the Upper Rogue from By-Be Bridge to Stillhead.

Trout angling has been fair to good in the upper river areas and air in the north. Spinners or bait have been producing the best catches, but large, light-colored flies have been fair, and all flies should do better when the water clears.

Summers steelhead fishing is low.

**Demurrers To Overload Charges Sustained**

District Judge A. J. Geddes Wednesday sustained some 35 demurrers entered in behalf of truckers charged with overload violations.

The demurrers were made on the contention that the facts stated were not sufficient to constitute a cause of action and that the overload complaints do not conform to state regulations in that they are not specific as to the amount of overload.

Deputy District Attorney Donald S. Kelley moved for permission to file amended complaints. Daniel R. Dimick, representing the defendants, objected and Judge Geddes gave both sides until Tuesday to file briefs. The judge is expected to rule later on whether the amended complaints may be filed.

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly still has not ruled on the validity of the overload complaints. A hearing was held in his court several weeks ago.
