WASHINGTON — A hint of a 22 per cent boost in aluminum allotments for civilian goods manufacturers was given Wednesday by the National Production Authority (NPA).

Radio and television set manufacturers were notified of such an increase for the present quarter, and officials said other consumer goods industries probably will get the same treatment.

The extra supply is made possible, NPA said, because demand for the light metal has been less than expected this spring.

GOP Governors Speak On Issue Of Delegates

HOUSTON — Republican governors called on the GOP National Committee Wednesday to bar any contested delegate from voting on his own admission or the seating of any other disputed delegate.

A statement approved by all 23 GOP executives attending the governors conference here said that if contested delegates won on their own seating the Republican Presidential nominee "will enter a vital and difficult campaign under a serious moral cloud."

Govs. Dan Thornton of Colorado and J. Bracken Lee of Utah told a news conference the statement was subscribed to by both supporters of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and of Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio.

Thornton supports Eisenhower's bid for the GOP nomination, Lee is backing Taft.

Thornton and Lee said Gov. Earl Warren of California, himself an active candidate for the nomination, had agreed to sign the statement.

Warren's approval of the statement was considered significant because it indicated his 70-vote California delegation would join in attempts to prevent contested delegates from voting on disputes.

SHOOTS PICASSO'S DOVE

PARIS — Pablo Picasso, who drew the Communists' famed dove of peace, has been the victim of a poacher. Police announced Wednesday the arrest of Gabriel Rousseau for entering Picasso's farm north of Paris and shooting—a dove.

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Air Power Boost Urged To Force Armistice

SEOUL — Gen. James A. Van Fleet called Wednesday for a big boost in Allied air power as the cheapest way to force the Communists into agreeing to a Korean armistice.

"Great air strength is the one thing we need most of all in Korea," the U.S. Eighth Army commander told NBC Correspondent Irving R. Levine in an interview before leaving for Pusan.

"I would like to see our air effort stepped up greatly. I think we would gain something at the armistice talks if the United Nations were willing to put additional pressure on the Communists."
