Bronchial asthma is a recurrent condition consisting of attacks of shortness of breath with a peculiar noisy respiration called wheezing. About 1 per cent of the population have asthma. It may begin at any time from infancy to old age although the majority of cases begin before the age of forty.

Asthma is frequently associated with other disorders due to allergy such as allergic eczema, both in the infant and later in life, seasonal and perennial hay fever, recurrent hives, stomach and intestinal upsets due to particular foods and etc. Extrinsic asthma or asthma provoked by contact with substances in the environment has a strong hereditary pattern. The individual inherits the tendency to become sensitive. Most often there will be found a history of asthma or other allergies in his parents, brothers or sisters, grandparents or other relatives. Intrinsic asthma or asthma without an apparent external cause begins usually later in life and an allergic heredity frequently is not to be found. Nerve involvements are often found to be the causative factor.

Reds Out Pauer From Top Post
BERLIN — Ana Pauer has been fired from her job as foreign minister of Romania, the Soviet-licensed news agency ADN reported Saturday from Bucharest.

The news agency said Simion Bughici has been appointed to take the place of the one-time darling of international Communism who was purged in May from the Romanian Communist Party's high command.

The ADN report said Mrs. Pauer, the hefty, 59-year-old daughter of a rabbi, was fired "by decree of the great National Assembly of the People's Republic of Romania." Her ouster had been expected since she was purged from the nation's Politburo for "errors and deviations."

U.S. Ship Seeks Atlantic Record

ABOARD THE S. S. UNITED STATES AT SEA — America's new queen of the seas, the S. S. United States, cut through thick and treacherous fog with unslackening speed Saturday and left no doubt she is headed for a new record crossing of the Atlantic. She is reported hitting 36 knots.

Now they're saying unofficially the streamlined, 53,000-ton streak of power will pass Bishop's Rock in the English Coast before dawn Monday and rip from six to 10 hours off the trans-Atlantic speed record held by Britain's Queen Mary.

Bishop's Rock is the terminal point of passenger ship speed tests, which originate at Ambrose Light, off the American Coast.
The United States met her first severe test Friday night — her second at sea on this maiden voyage — and came through like a champion while her 1,700 passengers, unaware of the drama, dined and danced in Independence Day celebrations.

GOP Chairman Rejects Request Of 23 Governors

CHICAGO — GOP National Chairman Guy Gabrielson Thursday rejected the request of 23 Republican governors that he support a proposed change in rules for seating contested delegates at next week's party convention.

Gabrielson thus aligned himself with Sen. Robert A. Taft and took a position opposite that of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's leading supporters.
The GOP governors, in a manifesto issued at Houston, Tex., asked the party chairman to back a rules change which would prohibit delegates involved in contests to vote on the admission of other contested delegates.

Replying, Gabrielson said in a telegram to the 23 governors: "The adoption of such a rule would be contrary to all custom and former rulings. . . . It could be used by ruthless, unscrupulous individuals to prevent the holding of a future convention."

Truman Rents Chicago Hotel Floor, Report

NEW YORK — The New York Journal American, in a special dispatch from Chicago, said it had learned President Truman had secretly engaged the entire fifth floor of the Blackstone Hotel beginning July 14.

The date is a week before the Democratic National Convention opens in Chicago.
"The implications of this news are far-reaching," the dispatch, by Sanford E. Stanton, Journal American political writer, said, "representing as they do a complete reversal of all forecasts about the convention."

It could mean that Harry S. Truman has changed his mind and decided to seek another term in the White House, or will at least take a strong hand in guiding the selection of the Democratic presidential nominee.

President Truman has said that he will not be a candidate.
