Father Hyland, who is pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Roseburg, was born in Ireland and is a member of the Capuchin Franciscan Order, one of the four largest orders of religious priests in the Catholic Church. Having completed his high school studies, he attended the National University of Ireland, where he took his degree in Scholastic Philosophy.

He later attended Irish Capuchin Franciscan Theological Seminary, pursuing his studies of theology, scripture and canon law for four years. He successfully completed the course and was ordained a priest June 29, 1927, at the church of the Most Holy Trinity, Cork City, Ireland, by the Most Rev. Dr. Cohan.

Father Hyland came to this country in 1929 and for eight years served as assistant pastor in the Capuchin churches of Los Angeles. Since then, he has served as pastor at Bend and Roseburg.

To commemorate the occasion, Father Hyland sang a solemn Mass at 10:30 a.m. Sunday, June 29, and Father Eunan Buckley preached the sermon. The reception followed in the afternoon to honor the jubilarian.
