One of the loveliest of June brides was Shirley Ann Helweg, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul H. Helweg, of Roseburg, who became the bride of Terry Walter E. Hercher, son of Mrs. Walter E. Hercher, of Dillard, Sunday, June 29, at the First Presbyterian Church. Dr. Morris H. Roach performed the double ring ceremony at four o'clock in the afternoon in the presence of 200 guests.

A blue and white color-scheme was carried out in the church decorations and gowns and flowers of the bride's attendants.

Blending shades of blue delphinium and calla lilies filled the two large white floor baskets, which were flanked by candelabra holding white candles. The candelabra standards were decorated with sprays of fern and blue daisies while the large center candle was twined with the blue dyed Esther Reed daisies. A fan-shaped bouquet of delphinium decorated the pipe organ. The pews for the relatives were marked with white satin bows and blue daisies, while the center aisle pews were marked with white satin bows and loops of blue maline.

Miss Janice Plummer, organist, played selections a half hour before the ceremony and accompanied Gordon Howard, who sang Greig's "I Love You," before the nuptials were performed and sang "The Lord's Prayer," during the ceremony.

The altar candles were lighted by Miss Janet Elliott, who wore a formal white organza gown with a waist corsage of blue Esther Reed daisies.

With the opening strains of the Bridal Chorus from Lohengrin, the bridal party advanced to the altar.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride was beautiful in a gown of white imported Swiss organza over taffeta fashioned with a small pointed collar, short puffed sleeves and tiny buttons down the front of the bodice. There were bands of tucks evenly spaced on the bodice and skirt. Her fingertip veil of illusion fell from a cap of Venice lace. She wore short lace mitts and carried a cascade bouquet of Esther Reed daisies and stephanotis.
