Chiefs Clip Bearded David Team, 2-1

Third Inning Rally Gives Win Margin

The bearded baseball wizards were tired Sunday night.

With neither the chance nor inclination for frivolity, the House of David lost its third game in Oregon at Finlay Field. The razor-sharp Roseburg Chiefs battled the visiting professionals to a tight, 2-1, exhibition victory.

Both teams played strict fundamental ball, with only a few minutes out in the fifth inning for the "David's" clever pepper game.

It was a two-run effort in the third inning that spelled the win for the Chiefs. A cluster of three singles following John Linde's double did the trick.

Linde opened the frame with his double that put him in scoring position. He advanced to third on Wally Beamer's ground out and was sent home with the first run on Lovell Baker's lofty fly to right field. Barney Koch scored off the consecutive trio of singles that spelled the winning run. He advanced to second on a passed ball and scampered all the way home on Al Simpson's clean single. Ernie Velasquez completed the threesome with another single.

Threat Halts

The only run for the House of David came in the eighth after Pitcher Alex Ballias made a motion for a rally by slamming a clean double. Shortstop Frank Williams seconded with a sharp single to left field. But that's where the rally died.

The visitors made a last-ditch bid to tie the score in the upper half of the ninth when Bob Bell was walked. This threat was wiped out by Roseburg's second double play of the game. Bill Brady was also walked but a beautiful cutoff play from Al Simpson to Barney Koch cinched the victory.

Koch, incidentally, collected four of Roseburg's eleven hits off Ballias. He appeared at the plate four times. Among his quartet of singles was a magnificent hunt down the third base line which rolled straight as a die just inside the straight.

The toughest break of the game was suffered by the bearded baseballers when a booming home run far out on the cinder track was socked by Chuck Chapetta. David Manager George Anderson termed it a "raw deal." Base Umpire Royd Bruton called Chapetta out for failing to touch second. Anderson says Chapetta touched the bag in the customary fashion with the inside of his left foot. This might have changed the complexion of the game, but Anderson took it gracefully. "It could have gone either way," he said.

He also said that the "David's" were beginning to show the effects of night-after-night play which has carried them through most of the states of the West in the last two months. Tonight they play at Coquille.

Roseburg Manager Al Sargent started the game with his new curve ball acquisition, Wally Beamer of Sutherlin. The Sutherlin youngster appeared impressive, but limited his deliveries to curves almost exclusively. In his five-inning stint, Beamer scattered three hits, struck out two and walked one.

He was relieved in the seventh by Don Hopp, who gave up both his hits and the only run in the eighth. In four innings, he struck out four men and walked two.

Local Archer Wins Trophies

Kathryn Ullrich returned to Roseburg Sunday from the State Archery Meet at Portland with two trophies tucked neatly under her arms.

She highlighted a four-person team performance from Roseburg's youthful Umpqua Bowman. She picked up one trophy for the best score for women over 50 years of age, and topped the women's field in the tight championships with a shooting distance of 279 yards, a foot and six inches.

Elaine Foster, another Roseburg entry, placed sixth in total points in the women's competition. Mrs. Ullrich placed seventh. Completing the Roseburg list at the meet were Earl Ullrich and George Foster. Although neither placed, Ullrich was nominated as Oregon's candidate to the National Archery Association board of directors. Elections will be held in mid-August at Jackson, Michigan.

A total of 91 archers participated in the meet, including 56 men and 15 women. Representatives from Sylvan Archers of Portland topped both the men's and women's championships. Topping the men, in extremely rugged competition, was Bond Whitmore. Heading the women was Harriett War-nich.

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Yanks Beat A's With 2 Homers

It looks as though the pitchers are in for a tough time in the major league's 19th all-star game at Philadelphia Tuesday.

Five of the 12 pitchers on the dream squads saw action Sunday in the final games before the mid-summer classic — and all were beaten. The sluggers, on the other hand, came through with flying colors.

The American League suffered the biggest blow when Bobby Shantz, the tiny lefthander of the Philadelphia Athletics, was forced to retire after four innings because of a muscle pain across his chest in the first game of a doubleheader against the pace-setting New York Yankees.

Shantz, the major's top winner with 14, was counted on to start against the National but it appears now that Cleveland's Bob Lemon may draw the assignment.

The Yanks clipped Shantz for four runs during his stay and went on to defeat the A's, 5-2. All-stars Gil McDougald and Mickey Mantle led the Yank drive against Shantz, each smacking a homer. Philadelphia bounced back to

win the second game, 7-6.

The split enabled the Yanks to retain their three game lead.

The Chicago White Sox took over second place from Cleveland, edging the Indians, 3-2, in 13-innings on all-star Minnie Mioso's homer. All-star righthander Mike Garcia was the loser.

The Washington Senators clung to fourth place, beating the fifth place Boston Red Sox, 5-2, as Pete Runnels knocked in three runs. The Detroit Tigers came from behind to defeat the St. Louis Browns, 8-6.

Brooklyn opened a 4½-game lead in the National League, trouncing the Boston Braves, 8-2, while the second-place New York Giants divided with Philadelphia, winning the first game, 2-0, but losing the second, 4-1.

The torrid third-place St. Louis Cardinals ran their winning streak to nine games by sweeping a pair of games from Pittsburgh, 6-5 and 6-4.

The fourth-place Chicago Cubs took two from Cincinnati, 5-1 and 2-0, behind Paul Minner's two-bitter and Warren Hacker's four-bitter.

Fishing Access Project Disclosed

Details of a public fishing access project comprising 44 access points on the Rogue river between Gold Beach and Prospect, located 150 miles upstream were revealed today by State Game Director P. W. Schneider.

Lands adjacent to the famed Rogue river but outside national forests are for the most part privately owned and free public access is barred.

"In some locations a fee is charged to reach the river, and there is urgent need for free public access to sites where boats can be launched as well as for bank angling," says Game Director Schneider who regards the fishing access program one of the most significant ever launched by the game commission.

Public access is of major interest on the Rogue for this unique stream provided year around angling for runs of winter and summer steelhead, spring and fall Chinook, silver salmon, and resident trout.

Fishing from boats especially designed for the river is the most common and productive method of angling on the Rogue.

Access sites will consist of tracts of river frontage containing from 1 to 100 acres with space for roads, bank fishing, boat ramps, and parking areas. Of the 44 sites approved for development, 18 will be for bank fishing, 8 will be developed as boat launching sites, and 18 will accommodate both boat launching and bank fishing. Conspicuous posters will designate the areas for the public.

Etchen Gets High In Trapshooting

SUN VALLEY, Idaho — High on all targets went to Sun Valley's Rudy Etchen as the 5th annual Sun Valley trapshoot banded to a close Sunday.

Etchen, already leading the field in the previous five events with 587 out of 600 targets, added 95x100 in the final handicap event to carry off highest honors in the meet with only 18 targets missed.

Second place went to Maynard Henry of Los Angeles with 21 losses and third to Arnold Reigger of Seattle with 22.

In the three events, totaling 400 targets, for the all round championship, the two top shooters changed places, Henry winning first with 390 and Etchen second with 388. Reigger was third again with 387.

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
