

Convention Offers Variety Of Sidelights

CHICAGO — The only clergyman attending the convention as a voting delegate is Rev. Charles Franklin Parker, a Congregational minister from Prescott, Ariz. He hasn't made up his mind yet as to his choice. As far as his political views conflicting with his work, Rev. Franklin says, "I have political opinions, but I don't express them in the pulpit unless I believe a moral principle is involved." GOP women are on the man-hunt in Chicago this week. They're stalking delegates. They want either to persuade them—or keep them persuaded. Two detectives are in constant attendance on Sen. Taft and Gen. Eisenhower.

Six men have been assigned to each, working eight-hour shifts around the clock. It's still the women who can do a first-rate job in dressing up a place. And

credit for doling up Convention Hall goes to Mrs. F. Peavey Hefelfinger of Wayzata, Minn., who is in charge of decorations and music for the GOP. Mrs. Hefelfinger and her committee have spent six months in planning and \$75,000 in preparing for this week's proceedings. Mutual network radionets set the precedent. And now a press and radio people at the Conrad Hilton, convention headquarters, are using the service elevators. The 14 regular passenger elevators are too jam-packed, with half to three-quarter hour waiting lines set up. Andy Frain, the fellow who sets up ushers and guards for major fights, World Series games, etc., is in charge of the special "bell boy" units at the Hilton. These boys are courteous—but, oh, so firm.

New Piano Player Due

Another piano player for the White House is in the offing if either Taft or Eisenhower finally wins the nod of the GOP delegates and then the public. Both men have been known to play the piano at private gatherings. And Mamie Eisenhower plays a bit, too. Seen buttonholing GOP delegates was J. E. Dooley, of Fond du Lac, Wis., the 77-year-old president of the U.S. Voters League. He's boosting his monetary plan to eliminate the national debt and taxes. Could this be a prediction of things to come? A baby elephant was parading down Michigan Blvd. in front of GOP convention headquarters in the Conrad Hilton Hotel when a Taft band suddenly pulled out all the stops. And the elephant bolted away from its trainer, through the big crowd and on down the Avenue. Most persistent campaign plunger on the convention scene—a guy who makes the cigar store Indian take a back seat—Dr. C. Leslie Hudson of Belvidere, N. J., who daily stands for hours in the lobby of the Hilton, serenely puffing a MacArthur corn-cob pipe. Probably one of the most disappointed old-line campaigners here is Mrs. Robert A. Taft, who because of a recent stroke, must view all of this activity from a wheel chair. Gen. Eisenhower has both his charming wife and mother-in-law in his headquarters at the Blackstone Hotel.

Morgan Decorators Date New Store's Grand Opening On S. Stephens St. Saturday

The grand opening of Morgan Decorators Saturday at 8 a.m. DST will add a new, completely modern paint, wall paper and custom-made drapery store to Roseburg's growing business district.

Manager-owner of the newly remodeled \$10,000 store located at 517 S. Stephens St., is Don Morgan, who lives at 110 N. Flint. The store will handle the F. P. Fuller line of paints and supplies.

No sales will be made on Saturday, but a prize consisting of a 30 x 40-inch plate glass mirror will be given. Punch will be served and free paint samples will be available, Morgan says.

The first color-planning center put out in the country by the W. P. Fuller Co. is found in the new store. It's so new it's still incomplete, says Morgan. The planning center contains samples of wallpaper, wall and woodwork paints and carpet, thereby aiding the home decorator in planning a color scheme right in the store without taking samples home.

The two display rooms—one for paints, wallpaper, painting supplies and mirrors, the other for draperies—are fluorescent-lighted, cool and done in shades of rose, light green and gray.

A lighted coastal scene decorates one wall of the carpeted 12 x 18-foot drapery display room, which also serves as a lounge. The ceiling is in an egg crate design.

Total floor area of the new store is about 18 x 180 feet. This includes the paint and wallpaper showroom, in front, the drapery room and lounge, the drapery sewing and cutting room and, in back, the storeroom and warehouse.

The store has the latest in painting machines, to blend the paints to any color desired. The machine handles four cans of paint at once.

A 14-foot neon sign from the Roseburg Neon Co. will point out the business to passersby.

Ten employees will work for Morgan Decorators. Morgan's wife will make draperies to order, as well as sell the drapery material.

Mrs. Lea Kendall who will be bookkeeper, came here from Coos Bay. Other employees work outside the store, as Morgan will continue his former painting and decorating business, in connection with the store.

Morgan has been in Roseburg for three years. During that time he operated a painting and decorating business, formerly located at 729 Miller with the Roseburg Glass Co.

He has been in the painting business for the past 25 years. He came to Roseburg from Omaha, Neb., where he was head of the painting department for Orchard and Wilhelm Co.

This is Morgan's first venture in a retail business.

Kier-Crooch Plumbing Co., 230 N. Stephens, formerly was located in the building. Morgan has leased the property from L. A. Rhoden of Lowell's Ready-to-Wear. He has completely remodeled the building.

Contractors are L. K. Cornwell, construction, and Trowbridge Electric, electrical work. The fixtures came from San Francisco.

Some sapphires—called "fancy sapphires"—are yellow, violet, orange and green.

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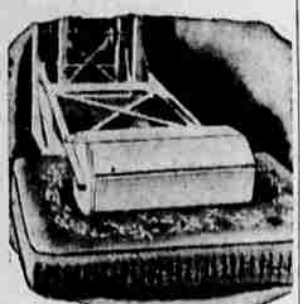
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
