

Covered Wagons Cavalcade Need

Covered wagons that once crossed westward over gutted wagon roads are badly needed for the forthcoming Centennial Pageant. Pageant Director Horace Robinson said he'd like 10 or 12 of them for use in the Umpqua Cavalcade and added he wasn't too worried about the condition some of them might be in.

In fact he'll settle for the beds alone of the covered wagons or any parts thereof. It has to be a covered wagon type, he said.

One of the major problems of the pageant will be obtaining the wagons, Robinson said, because of their scarcity in the county.

"The older the better," Centennial Secretary Mae Matthews said. "If they have historical significance we like them better, and if they haven't, we still like them."

Anyone who could assist in locating any of the wagons or parts

was asked to contact Centennial Headquarters in the Junior High School building.

Heat Continues To Scourge NW; Logging Halted

The sun poured down from clear skies throughout the Pacific Northwest again Wednesday, keeping this region among the most heated spots of the country. Little relief was in sight.

There was great fire hazard, but

Tuesday maximums pushed up to a peak of 104 at Medford and there were other century readings in Oregon. Washington was close to record marks, Spokane's 93 being the season's high and Seattle's 88 only two degrees under the record for the date set in 1905.

Portland's downtown weather bureau station reported 101 degrees, hottest there in six years, but its airport station was only 98.

But the coast, though, got relief.

Both Newport and North Bend, on the Central Oregon coast, had maximums in the 60s Tuesday. The day before Newport reported 91 and North Bend 88.

Much of Western Oregon's logging halted under the law stopping it at 30 per cent humidity. Western Washington had complete closure in Pacific County Wednesday and Thursday under order of Forester Bernard Orell. Closure at noon, standard time, was ordered for Wednesday in Grays Harbor, Mason, Thurston, East Lewis, Kitsap, Clallam and Wahkiakum Counties, and both Wednesday and Thursday noon in most of Lewis County. Noon daylight time closure Wednesday and Thursday was ordered for Clark and Skamania Counties.

Orell pointed out that berry pickers and recreationists are barred from the woods where logging restrictions are in effect.

The Oregon governor's office, working under routine plans for fire weather, set aside a few small areas of high hazard as open only to those with legitimate business. That permits logging but keeps out those who lack facilities for quick action against fires, should any start.

The Weather Bureau at Portland issued a fire weather forecast which said conditions would not improve materially, except along the coast, Thursday.

And the Thursday temperature forecasts said Western Washington would be 85-95; Eastern Washington 95-105; Eastern Oregon 90-100.

The heat wave led Portland to institute restrictions on watering of lawns and gardens. Householders were told to alternate sprinkling days, houses with even numbered street addresses taking one day, odd numbers the next.

New Suits Filed In Circuit Court

C. A. Wise, Co., has filed suit in Circuit Court against Edwin E. and Edith Welton for \$4,000 damages in lost profits due to alleged failure of the defendants to deliver logs on an agreement.

The State Highway Commission has filed suit to condemn property on the Oakland-Desty section of Highway 99 against Alfred E. and Anne K. Hoffmeister.

Ruth E. Nerbas is suing to foreclose a mortgage in a complaint against Harry G. and Mary Eileen Rapp, who allegedly owe \$3,317.45 on a promissory note. Attorney's fees of \$600 are also asked.

Suit to quiet title on property in Drain has been filed by Lucia A. Sawers and Edwin and Jane May Mattin. Elmer M. and Jane Doe Gray were named defendants.

A condemnation suit by Douglas County against William Kacerovsky for property to be used in relocation of the North Umpqua Highway has been settled out of court and dismissed.

WILL IN PROBATE

The estate of Glen W. Dodge, who died June 25, is left to his widow, Stella G. Dodge, according to a probated will.

The estate is estimated at \$18,000 real and \$2,500 personal property. Mrs. Dodge of Canyonville was appointed executrix.

Petition for probate of the will of the late William Laurence Emel who died May 12, was filed Wednesday. The estate is left to the widow, Helen M. Emel, and two sons, all of Elkton. Value of the property is estimated at \$12,000.
