WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Barkley, unlike his competitors for the Democratic presidential nomination, has no plans to stump the country seeking support from convention delegates.

He told a news conference Monday he will make no speeches before the Democratic convention opens in Chicago July 21.

But, he said, he will go to Chicago a day or two before the convention to meet delegates.

The 74-year-old Kentuckian decided over the weekend to become an active candidate for the presidential nomination.

Employment In June Tops Monthly Record

WASHINGTON (AP) — More Americans had jobs in June than in any

previous June on record—63,572,000.

The Census Bureau, reporting this Tuesday said the figure was only 60,000 below the all-time record set in August, 1951.

The Bureau said the employment picture was much brighter, with 789,000 more jobs openings last month than for June a year ago. Most of the new opportunities were on farms.
