Umpqua Forest Revenue Exceeds \$2 Million

Receipts from the Umpqua National Forest, mainly timber sales, passed the \$2 million mark during the fiscal year just ended, the U.S. Forest Service announced today.

Revenue from the sales and other miscellaneous sources amounted to \$2,188,850 in the period from July 1, 1951, to June 30, 1952.

Twenty-five per cent of national forest receipts are apportioned for road and schools to the counties in which each forest lies. Record receipts of \$39,811,161 in 13 national forests in Oregon and Washington will mean a total of \$7,702,790 apportioned to the counties this year.

Truman Okays Waterways Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman signed a bill Friday appropriating \$354,961,600 for the Army Engineers' river and harbor and flood control program.

One of two measures which nearly thwarted Congressional adjournment plans, the bill contains \$236,788,800 for rivers and harbors and \$25,742,800 for flood control work.

The funds are for the year which began July 1.

Following are Pacific Northwest projects for which appropriations differed in the original House and Senate approved bills, with amounts showing the conference recommendation:

River and harbor construction. Oregon — McNary lock and dam, \$3 million; The Dalles lock and dam, 20 million; Washington — Chief Joseph dam, 15 million; Ice Harbor lock and dam, none.

Flood control construction. Oregon — Detroit Reservoir, \$10,350,000; Lookout Point, \$16,625,000; Willamette River, \$400,000.

City Budget Scheduled For Third Vote July 22

Items were changed, it is not necessary to republish the budget.

Members of the budget committee present were Arlo Jacklin, chairman, Henry Jacobson, Harold Backen, H. E. DeBernardi, R. D. Coen and Ken Ellison, and councilmen, W. J. Adair, Cecil Hugh, Frank Ashley, Jack Hart, Harrison Winston, Bernard Saar and Gordon Harness. In addition Mayor Albert G. Flegel and City Manager W. A. Gilchrist were present. Dr. Bruce Hetrick was the only budget member absent.

The committee is planning to present a signed article for early publication in the News-Review setting forth the reasons why it feels the budget is fair and should be passed.

Two Ordinances Passed

The council in special meeting at 11 a. m. passed to their third readings two ordinances. One regulates trailer parks and camp sites within the city of Roseburg. It requires permits at nominal fees, and requires that sanitary condition be met.

The second ordinance repeals an antiquated ordinance regulating and restricting laundries in the city, contrary to present accepted practices.

Rotarians Hear Of Shifts Due In School Rolls

Hundreds of Roseburg pupils will be shifted from schools in their "natural attendance area" to relieve congested class rooms next fall, Superintendent of Schools M. C. Deller disclosed Thursday at the Roseburg Rotary Club meeting.

"Some Roseburg students may even be transported to Willbur for classes," he declared.

Superintendent Deller explained that the projected addition to Rose School and the new North Roseburg School will not be completed for a year.

Also, attendance, which was about 3,600 last school year, is almost certain to hit the 4,000 mark this fall, he said.

"Students who live across the street from one school may be assigned to another school across town," Deller asserted. "This is going to confuse parents and cause many protests. But it is necessary so we don't crowd 50 to 60 students into class rooms."

He introduced the department heads of the Roseburg school system—Vic Micelli, clerk of the school district; Dr. Marvin Smith, new assistant superintendent; and Grady Mankins, in charge of building a property for the schools.

Rainstorms In Japan Deal Death, Destruction

TOKYO (AP) — The worst rainstorms in 40 years killed 49 persons and injured 67 Thursday night and Friday in the densely populated Osaka area, provincial police reported.

Twenty-two others were missing. The region is the industrial heart of Japan.

Property losses were placed at 305 houses destroyed and 75,105 flooded. Most of the deaths and injuries were caused by landslides and drownings.

Funeral services will be held in The Chapel of The Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home, Monday, July 14, at 11 a. m. with Dr. Morris Roach officiating. Interment will follow in the Masonic Cemetery.

Gov. Langlie Now Last Hope For Wilson Bros.

PORTLAND (AP) — Attorneys for Utah and Turman Wilson say only Washington Gov. Arthur B. Langlie can save the brothers from death on the gallows for the 1950 slaying of Jo Ann Dewey.

The Ninth U. S. Court of Appeals wiped out one of their last hopes Thursday with an order vacating an indefinite stay of execution.

The stay was granted July 2 to give the court time to determine if their was probable cause for appeal from a denial of habeas corpus. The court decided Thursday there was no probable cause.

Utah and Turman were convicted in March 1950 of the slaying of 18-year-old Miss Dewey. Their appeals have been carried twice to the U.S. Supreme Court. Each time the court refused to review the case.

Television came to Roseburg Thursday night!

But the sound came just the same, and went out over the air from the local station. There was a bit of confusion for a time, but the error was soon corrected and normal broadcast of Sen. Dirksen's speech was resumed.
