Middle Ground Taken By GOP On T-H Law

CHICAGO (AP) — Republicans courted both unions and management with a proposed party platform Thursday containing kind words for the union shop and the Taft-Hartley law as well.
The platform draft was approved by the Republican convention resolutions committee and presented for convention action later in the day.
Its labor plank called for retaining the Taft-Hartley act including the provision sanctioning the union shop.
In a union shop, all an employer's workers must become union members and pay union dues.
The union shop is the major unsettled issue in the steel strike.
Both the National Association of Manufacturers and the U. S. Chamber of Commerce—two major business organizations—had urged a ban on both the union shop and industrywide bargaining.
Neither such ban is sought in the proposed platform.
So neither labor unions nor business leaders are likely to be overjoyed with the labor plank language.
The proposed platform urged adoption of "such amendments to the Taft-Hartley act as time and experience show to be desirable." But no "desirable" is definable.
In other sections, the platform condemned President Truman's seizure of the steel mills, opposed compulsory health insurance and favored covering more individuals under the social security law.

Interior Dept. Money Measure OK'd By Truman

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman signed the Interior Department money bill Wednesday authorizing a start on building 10 new reclamation projects.
Total funds carried in the bill to operate the department for the current fiscal year which ends next June 30 are \$541,729,845.
This is \$80,421,955 below budget requests for the period.
Authorization for starting the new projects broke an administration policy that has been in effect for several years.
Money for beginning the projects was not included in the President's budget requests, but was written into the bill upon the insistence of the Senate Appropriations Committee.
The total of new appropriations for reclamation construction for the coming year is \$177,797,991.
This includes \$15,950,000 earmarked for the new starts.
Among other big items included in the bill are 17 1/2 million dollars for Indian Bureau construction work—of which about 10 million will go to the long range Navajo-Hopi rehabilitation program—and \$13,208,000 for public works in Alaska.

Allies Repulsed By Chinese Reds After Hill Grab

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — United Nations troops Wednesday drove on North Korean Communists entrenched on a ridge at the Eastern end of the Korean battle line but lost a key hill to counter-attacking Chinese in the center.
Between 350 and 400 Chinese in hand to hand fighting recaptured a hill U. N. troops had wrested from them 24 hours earlier.
U. S. Thunderjets again bombed the big No. 2 power plant at Changjin Reservoir Tuesday after reconnaissance showed the Reds were trying to get the generators back in operation.
The plant was one of 13 North Korean hydroelectric stations knocked out in heavy raids two weeks ago.
MUNSAN, Korea (AP) — The first year of Korean armistice negotia-

tions ended Wednesday with the United Nations and Communist delegates meeting in secret for 26 minutes.
There was no announcement on whether progress had been made toward solving the prisoner exchange deadlock, key issue blocking a truce. It was the shortest of six secret meetings held since Friday.
Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckols, U. N. Command spokesman, said the session was businesslike but "there was no change in the attitude of either side."
In Oslo, Norway, U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie expressed hope for an armistice "by the end of July or the beginning of August" because truce negotiators had shown "a certain positive willingness" to reach agreement.

Small-Scale Clashes Occur On Korean Front
SEOUL, Korea (AP) — United Nations soldiers killed or wounded at least 336 Communists Wednesday and early Thursday in sharp, small-scale actions all along the 155-mile Korean battlefield, the U. S. Eighth Army reported.
Allied casualties were not estimated, but briefing officers said they were small.
Allied light bomber pilots reported they destroyed 21 Communist supply vehicles, B-29 Superforts Wednesday night blasted the Huichon rail yards on the main Communist supply route from Manchuria.

Russian Attack On Western U.S. Area Theorized

WASH. (AP) — AIR FORCE BASE, Meach, Okla. — Pacific Coast civil defense leaders were warned of Russian air strength Wednesday as they heard a plea for stepped up activity in recruiting volunteer brigades for the western region.
Brig. Gen. Clinton D. Vincent of the Air Defense Command, Colorado Springs, Colo., told the regional directors that military intelligence believes the Russians are prepared to launch 400 B-29 type bombers as an aerial attack force.
However, Gen. Vincent did not say whether our government thought Russia had such intentions against the United States. But he did offer the opinion that if the Russians do attack the United States by air they will supplement the bombing with rockets fired from submarines off our coastal areas.
The summer months, General Vincent pointed out, are considered the most critical. Because of this, observers are scheduled to go on a round the clock basis next Monday. He called for immediate recruiting of 9,000 more volunteers for the Ground Observer Corps (GOC) in Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho and Montana.
