

IKE OPENS 'SHINING PROMISE' CRUSADE

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Democrats Hunting Strong Team To Defeat Ike, Nixon

Democrats predicted Saturday they would whip the GOP Eisenhower-Nixon team in November. But most of those who commented agreed the Republicans nominated their strongest candidate for the presidency.

The big question now was: Who will the Democrats pin their hopes on to beat Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, named the Republican standard bearer Friday? They'll decide that in the Democratic national convention opening in Chicago on July 21.

The November election will be no "pink tea" party for the Democrats, predicted James A. Farley, former Democratic national chairman. He told a convention of New York State Young Democrats the Republicans had nominated "a

very formidable candidate" and the Democrats must select a man "qualified in every respect." Farley didn't say whether he had anyone in mind.

Republican defeat was predicted by four candidates for the Democratic nomination — Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, Sen. Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma, Mutual Security Administrator Averell Harriman and Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia. So did Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, mentioned as a possible drafter for the nomination.

Kerr told Washington newsmen Eisenhower would be "a sadder but wiser general" after Nov. 4, that "the Republican party's record will be a handicap greater than he can overcome." Later in New York, Kerr told a television audience Eisenhower will lose

whatever he does.

Harriman issued a statement in Detroit saying "however they try to conceal it, the fact remains that the Republican party is still the party of grim reaction as it has been for generations." Arriving in New York Friday night, Harriman told reporters Eisenhower would be beaten "because of his ignorance on domestic matters."

Kefauver and Russell messaged congratulations to Eisenhower. Each said they would be happy to campaign against the general this fall—and beat him.

Kefauver declared in a statement that Eisenhower's nomination demonstrates that "in this critical year the rank and file members of both political parties are going to have their way in spite of the attempted obstruction of selfish political bosses."

County Truck Rules Draw Stiff Protest

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly took under advisement Friday the question of whether the county's hauling regulations can be referred to the voters.

Opposing counsel Friday afternoon presented arguments in a hearing before Judge Wimberly on a suit against the county by four log truckers who seek an injunction to prevent enforcement of the regulations.

The county, represented by Attorney Robert G. Davis, contended the "administrative" county order setting up the regulations was not enforceable. The plaintiffs, represented by Daniel R. Dimick, alleged the "legislative" order is not legally effective at present because of a referendum petition recently filed by the four log truck operators.

Davis contended the county courts of the state, along with municipal governments and the State Highway Commission were given the jobs of administering the 1951 legislative enactment setting up truck regulations.

Without county permission, Davis said, truckers would be unable to haul over county roads if their

65 Camp Fire Girls Leave For Tye On Sunday

It's off to camp Sunday for 65 Camp Fire girls.

Camp Tye, the five-year-old Roseburg Camp Fire Girl summer recreation area, opens Sunday for six one-week sessions of experience and fun in the outdoors.

The first three week sessions are for 5th graders and up; the remaining three for 2nd through 4th graders. (These are called Bluebirds.)

The final period ends Aug. 24 at the camp, located 26 miles from Roseburg on the North Umpqua, one mile from Tye Bridge on the Elkton cutoff.

But the camp's been occupied this week too. A training session for the camp staff—directors and counselors—has been on since Thursday.

Camp director is Louise Watson, a graduate assistant in physical education from the University of Oregon. She's had 10 years of summer camping experience, part of it in Yellowstone Park and the Portland Camp Fire Girl and Girl Scout camps.

Food will be cooked by Mrs. Ethel Heathorn, 520 N. Jackson, with Mrs. M. D. Burke, 617 W. Lane, as her assistant.

Scratches and stomach aches will be the concern of Blanche Cacy, 946 N. Jackson, camp nurse. Total camp capacity is 70 girls. And it's just about filled right now for all sessions except the sixth, for Bluebirds, which is only half filled.

Campers returning for a second time this year will find some changes. The Oakland Development Club has built a new cabin for the cooks. The old cooks' cabin will go to the nurse, who's been in with the director previously.

7 Hurt In Fight On Widow's Land

LEPEER, Mich. (AP) — Armed deputies kept an uneasy watch Saturday on the farm of Mrs. Elizabeth Stevens who was dragged bodily from her home in an eviction proceeding Friday.

Angry neighbors in the Leeper County farm community threatened reprisals and vowed the 60-year-old widow soon would be back on her 80-acre farm.

The eviction was a fist-swinging climax to a 17-year-old dispute growing out of the failure of the Leeper Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance Association.

Only members of the Stevens family and sheriff's deputies were involved in Friday's battle. But it left three persons in hospitals, two in jail and at least four more injured.

Mrs. Stevens, mother of nine, sought desperately to stay in her home but she was subdued by sheriff's deputies.

Mrs. Stevens lost title to the farm several years ago after refusing to pay a \$172 assessment against the failure of the insurance association.

The eviction came several weeks after Sheriff Clark Gregory was mauled and beaten at the Stevens farm when he went there to serve eviction papers. He returned Friday with a dozen deputies and with 60 state police backing him up.

Canyonville Youth Hurt At Swim Pool Dredging

Phil Dyer, whose parents operated the Glendale Variety Store, was injured at the Capitol Hill swimming pool Wednesday evening while observing dredging operations. He was taken by the Marriot ambulance to the office of Dr. Ferguson in Glendale, then removed to the Forest Glen Hospital, in Canyonville for X-rays and observation.

CHICAGO (AP) — Harold Stassen, who made an unsuccessful bid for the Republican presidential nomination, said Saturday he is returning to his post as president of the University of Pennsylvania.

Fire Destroys Myrtle Ck. Shop

The second Myrtle Creek fire within a 9-hour period raged through a body shop owned by Willis Mills at noon Friday, also destroying an adjoining private garage owned by Vern Williams.

Damage was estimated at \$12,000 by Myrtle Creek fire department officials.

Early in the morning fire leveled the Western Timber Products mill in Myrtle Creek.

Destroyed in the body shop were five cars—a '48 Ford pickup, '46 Chevrolet sedan, '49 Mercury sedan, '46 Chevrolet sedan and '51 Crosley delivery wagon.

The fire was reported at noon Friday by John Calvert, an employee at the shop. He was welding and his sparks jumped into some oily rags, starting the fire. He tried unsuccessfully to extinguish it, then called the Myrtle Creek fire department.

Firemen had the blaze under control at 12:45 p.m.

Lester Laurentz, Myrtle Creek fireman seriously injured while fighting the earlier mill fire, was reported Friday night as doing well in the hospital.

Sorry, He Thought It Was Wife He Stabbed

ATLANTA (AP) — Albert Favors, 28-year-old Negro woman, said a strange Negro man entered her apartment Friday night, plunged a knife into her side, looked surprised and said:

"Excuse me, I thought you was my wife."

He then fled and she went to a hospital for treatment of the wound which is not expected to be fatal.

The bewildered victim told police she never had seen the man before.

GOP Closes Ranks; Nixon In 2nd Place

CHICAGO (AP) — Gen. Eisenhower set out Saturday on a Republican "shining promise" crusade for the presidency.

At the side of the 62-year-old general of the Army—who won the party nomination by blasting down four rivals on a single ballot Friday—marched 39-year-old Sen. Richard M. Nixon of California.

Hand-picked by Eisenhower and his advisers for No. 2 place on the ticket, Nixon dramatized the new GOP bid for support of the nation's younger people.

The Californian, a former lieutenant commander in the Navy, completed an Army-Navy team chosen by Republicans at their 25th national convention. Nixon was unopposed for the vice presidential nomination.

Eisenhower took only one thrill-packed ballot to dispose of Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, Gov. Earl Warren of California, Former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota, and Gen. Douglas MacArthur in the presidential contest.

Acting swiftly to organize a campaign he said will be dedicated "to the shining promise of tomorrow," Eisenhower called available GOP members of congress into a closed conference to discuss policies.

In a colorful take-off for what both he and Nixon promised would be a fighting campaign, Eisenhower told a crowd of about 10,000 persons who filled only part of the seats in the stockyards convention hall at the final night session.

"It is more than a nomination I accept today. It is a dedication—a dedication to the shining promise of tomorrow."

"To sweep from office an administration which has fastened on every one of us the wastefulness, the arrogance and corruption in high places, the heavy burdens and the anxieties which are the bitter fruit of a party too long in power."

"Much more, it is our aim to give to our country a program of progressive policies drawn from our finest Republican traditions, to unite us where we have been divided; to strengthen freedom wherever among any group it has been weakened; to build a sure foundation for sound prosperity for all here at home and for a just and sure peace in the world."

Aiming at "total victory," Eisenhower said this would include more Republicans in local and state offices and GOP control of Congress.

The nominee promised to make a campaign in "every nook and cranny of this land."

He knew, he said, that the battle ahead could not be won by a few or by divided or uncertain forces. This was a bid for support from die-hard backers of Taft, still bitter at their champion's knockout. Eisenhower's three active but unsuccessful rivals pledged full cooperation with him in the campaign.

Said Taft: "I want to congratulate Gen. Eisenhower on his nomination and assure him I will do everything possible for him in his campaign and after he wins the election."

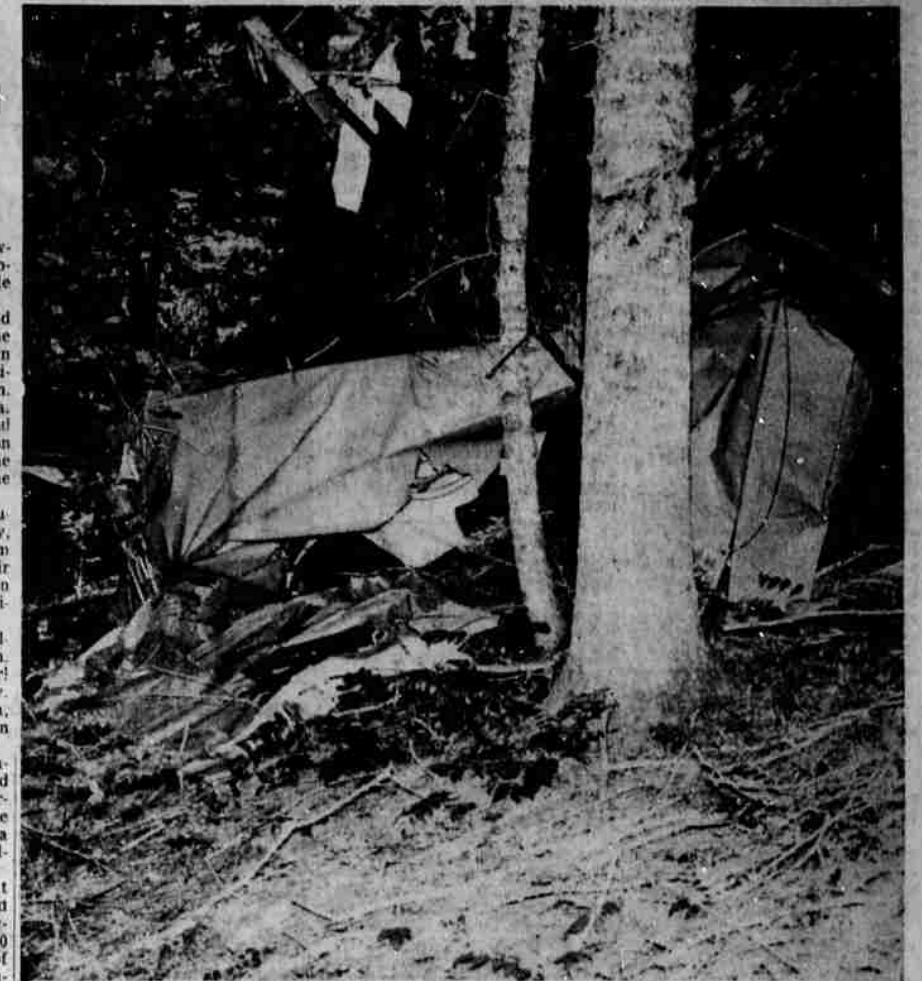
Warren and Stassen also were asked personally to help out and they agreed. MacArthur, the convention keynoteer who got 10 votes pointedly was ignored.

Plane Lost Four Years Ago Found

A crashed lightplane, object of an extensive ground and aerial search four years ago, was located Friday near Red Butte—the skeletal remains of its pilot scattered around the area.

State police identified the dead pilot as Cyrus Richard Doyle of Tacoma, Wash., who took off from Medford airport at 7 a.m. Sept. 15, 1948 enroute to Tacoma and had not been seen since. He was then 35.

The plane, a 1946 model Taylorcraft, was found by a timber cruiser about a mile northwest of Red Butte, some 40 miles east of Roseburg. Wreckage was strewn about a three and one-half acre area, officers said, and the fuselage of the plane came to rest in dense underbrush.

Deputy Coroner Howard Crook, State Patrolman Austin Murray and Herb Bernard Smith, the timber cruiser, brought back the remains of the dead man Friday afternoon. Officials said Doyle was probably killed instantly.

Officials of the Civil Aeronautics Administration are conducting an investigation in the area today to determine the cause of the crash.

Doyle was a student pilot alone on a cross-country run between Tacoma and Medford. The airplane belonged to the South Tacoma Flying Service.

Officer Murray, a flyer, said the plane was on course but that there apparently was a 4,000-foot cloud overcast on the day of the flight. The crash came at the 4,200-foot level.

The plane clipped tree tops as it came down, Murray said, and the major portion of it came to rest on the ground.

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Judges To Seek Queen At Least 70 Years Old

A queen "young in spirit" and rich in historical background is being sought for the Douglas County Centennial.

When she's selected by a board of anonymous judges, she'll be known as the Dowager Queen and will reign in the honorary post along with the younger queen.

She'll also probably have a court of princesses. Dr. Byron Woodruff, head of the Dowager Queen Committee, said nominations of candidates for the Queen—who must be 70 or over, and a resident of Douglas County since 1890—are being accepted at Centennial Headquarters in the Junior High School.

This is strictly an honorary post, Dr. Woodruff said, and nominees will complete on the basis of historical significance of the family contributions to the community in public service and the contributions of their descendants to the community.

"We hope to select a queen who'll be active and alert and will enjoy the popularity and public acclaim that goes with the position," Dr. Woodruff said.

The Dowager Queen will attend the special Centennial events and will be present at both days of the pageant.

Dr. Woodruff announced the following qualifications:

- 1—Age, 70 years or older.
- 2—A resident of Douglas County since 1890.
- 3—Nominations may be made by any organization, club, group, community or town.
- 4—Applications or nominations must be made by Aug. 1, in writing to the Douglas County Centennial, Box 1230, Roseburg. Applications must include date of birth, family connections, and other biographical information that will help the judges in their final

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Truckers To Seek Support On Two Ballot Measures

Ike's Running Mate Cast Vote For Warren

CHICAGO (AP) — Sen. Richard M. Nixon, who is Gen. Eisenhower's running mate on the 1952 presidential ticket voted for somebody else when the GOP picked its standard bearer.

Nixon was a member of the California delegation which went solidly for Gov. Warren on the first ballot.
