Drain Black Sox Sweep 2 From Medford By 11-2, 4-3

The steamrolling Drain Black Sox extended their Southwestern Oregon League baseball lead to four full games this weekend. They hammered out a pair of wins at Drain Saturday and Sunday over the Medford Cheney Studs to stretch their current League win streak to six games. They clubbed the Studs, 11-2, in the Saturday game and edged to a 4-3 win Sunday.

Manager Roy Helser took to the mound in the first game to dole out five hits. His Sox and the Studs handed Helser the win in the third inning when eight Drain runs bounced across. The Studs completely fell apart, committing six errors in that frame and the Sox rapped out five hits, including Ted Wilson's two-run double that led off the scoring spree.

It was Wilson, who took away a three-hitter from Helser. Playing center field, he lost two easy flies in the lights.

Venerable Paul Gehrman was the tough-luck pitcher of the weekend series. He was credited with both losses, although he didn't enter the Sunday game until the seventh inning. He came in with the score tied at 3-all. Then, in the ninth inning, the black cat crossed the outfield.

Don Kirsch singled for the Sox to set up the winning run. He was pushed to second when Ad Rutschman beat out a bunt. Still with no outs, Gehrman made a bad throw to first and the two men advanced to scoring positions. Bill Beard was intentionally walked to set up a double play situation which Cleanup Man Harvey Storey exploded by hammering a timely single that won the game.

Kirsch had a three-for-four day and Storey got three for five.

Deer Season Date Tentatively Set

PORTLAND — Deer hunting season in Oregon has tentatively been set for Sept. 27 to Oct. 17.

The State Game Commission announced the dates for the coming season at a meeting here Saturday. The final dates will be set at another meeting two weeks from now.

The U. S. Forest Service had urged that the season be delayed until mid-October because of fire danger in the woods. But this suggestion, opposed by most hunting and sportsmen's groups, was rejected by the commission.

The commission also scheduled a hunter's choice deer season Oct. special season would be held in areas where deer are a problem—near farmlands and areas where natural feed is scant.

The elk season has identical dates for eastern and western parts of the state—Nov. 1-20. There also will be special hunts, 200 permits for the Troy area of Walla Walla County, Aug. 23-28, and 200 permits for the northeast portion of Umatilla County, Nov. 22-26.

Archers will have the same areas as last year, plus a Hart Mountain area in Lake County, Sept. 13-Oct. 20.

Locals Drop Opener, 11-1, Win By 10-2

A spate of four-run innings dashed cold water on Bill Fortier Day at Coquille Sunday.

The Roseburg Chiefs racked the Coquille Loggers, 10-2, in the Sunday Southwestern Oregon game, which was officially tabbed as a celebration for Fortier in his last game as manager of the Loggers club.

If the games had been reversed, Fortier's final march to the dugout would have been a perfect climax to a 32-year baseball career at Coquille. Saturday night, the Loggers hammered out an 11-1 League victory.

The Fortier celebration, however, had its pleasant aspects. Preceding the game, a little power mower pulled to home plate with a check-full trailer filled with farewell presents. Among these was a rocking chair which the venerable old pilot used as a base of operations while directing the game.

The result of the game itself was a complete reversal from Roseburg's decisive loss the night before. Third Baseman Chuck Fiske can be thanked for counting the winning run in the third inning.

He highlighted the Chief showing by blasting a three-run homer that wiped out Coquille's two-run lead. The Loggers made their only showing in the scoring column by collecting two tallies in the first frame.

When the scoring was over in the third inning, the Chiefs had a 4-2 edge they never lost. Fortier used four hurlers in an effort to stop the Roseburg run parade, but the Chief batters treated them all alike to add up 14 hits.

Meanwhile, Wally Beamer of Sutherlin, set the Loggers on their ears with a scattered eight-hit performance. He blanked them after the first frame. He struck out three and didn't issue a walk.

In the hitting column, Fiske was the hero, but Center Fielder Hal Zurcher continued his steady hitting show by rapping three singles in four trips. The potent Roseburg batsmen scored four runs in the third and ninth and two in the eighth.

Saturday night, Bux Sporer's teammates let him down.

They committed six errors in the game. Four of these came in the first inning to pave the way to a five-run opening rally for the Loggers.

He gave up only two hits in that first inning.

The saying goes that every team has its bad night. This was the one for the Chiefs. Not only did the Roseburg crew commit more errors than in any previous game, but the Loggers started hitting "Old Faithful" Sporer consistently.

They banged ten hits off him before he was relieved by Don Hopp in the seventh inning.

Up to the sixth, he had scattered five hits, but the Loggers made the rout complete in the sixth when they scored four runs on five hits. Hopp gave up a run and three hits in his three-inning stint.

The Chiefs saved themselves from a whitewashing by scoring their only run in the ninth on a pair of singles. Aldon Wilkie allowed only five hits by the visitors. He struck out five and walked one.

San Diego won a doubleheader Sunday from San Francisco, 7 to 1 and 1 to 0. Memo Luna turned in the win of the year in the opener and Theophilus Smith tossed a three-hitter in the second affair. San Francisco's only run of the day was Frank Kalin's homer over the right field fence in the sixth frame of the curtain raiser.

Oakland took its doubleheader from Portland, 10 to 6 and 2 to 1. The Oaks simply outslugged the Beavers in the opener, even though each team got 13 hits. The difference was that Sam Chapman slammed his eighth homer and Gene Baker breaking up the first game with a single with the bases full to give the Angels an 8 to 7 decision in 10 innings, and the Rainiers taking the other, 2 to 1, on Boyd's long fly that gave Al Widmar his second win in four days. Leon Brinkopf got his 14th homer since June 12 in the opener.

Knuckleballer Johnny Lindell of Hollywood pitched and slugged the Stars to a 4 to 1 win over Sacramento in the windup of a twin bill after the Stars had annexed the opener, 5 to 4. Big Jawn, one-time New York Yankee, poled a home run in the eleventh with two men on base. He held the Stars to five hits and batted in four Hollywood runs altogether.

Shantz Snares 15th AL Victory On 3rd Shutout

Bobby Shantz, midwest south-paw of the Philadelphia Athletics,

1. Become the biggest winner in Philadelphia's American League history.

2. Become the first second division hurler in the past 50 years to lead his league in won and lost percentage.

3. Become the first 30-game winner in the majors in 18 years and the first American League pitcher to reach that total in 21 years.

Shantz spun a seven-hit 6-0 shutout Sunday as the Athletics split a doubleheader with the Chicago White Sox. The Sox took the second, 7-4. It was Bobby's third shutout and his 16th complete game in 18 starts. He has won 15 and lost three.
