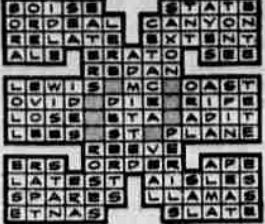


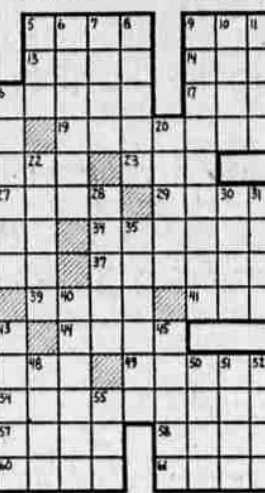

20 Survivors Picked Up Off Crashed Brazil Plane

EDMONTON, Alta., (U.P.) — A team of three helicopters Saturday started evacuating seven survivors of a crashed United States Air Force B-17 bomber from a remote area near the Yukon-Alaska border.

The men, whose plane crashed Friday, are being flown to Snag, Y. T., about 30 miles southwest of the crash scene.

An American para-rescue team, which jumped to the scene Saturday loaded the men aboard the rescue helicopters. The team had reported by radio that there were seven survivors including three injured with second and third-degree burns.

There were conflicting reports on how many were aboard the B-17. The search base at Whitehorse, Y. T., was given to understand there were eight men aboard when it left Anchorage, Alaska. But one of the helicopters was reported to have informed Snag that there were only seven men on the bomber.

The B-17 was on a flight from Elmendorf Air Force Base, Anchorage, to Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, when it crashed. Whitehorse is about 1,000 miles north of Edmonton. The wrecked plane was sighted by an SA-16 Albatross which was sent out to search for it when it failed to arrive at Whitehorse.

Truman Readies Inaugural Fete

WASHINGTON, (U.P.) — President Truman has completed the legal formalities for the inauguration of the next President.

Truman, who insists he will not run again, signed three congressional resolutions that will allow the inauguration committee to start preparing for the January 20 event.

One permits the use of government-owned land for grandstands and allows the defense department to loan flags and other equipment to the committee.

Another appropriates \$55,100 for precautions to maintain order during the ceremonies. A third permits the use of government buildings to house participating troops.
