New radio relay brings convention telecasts to all West Coast viewers

On July 7th, the Bell System's radio relay system and coaxial cables enabled the TV networks to bring the Republican Convention to the nation's television viewers—who will also see the Democratic Convention on July 21st. It is now possible for all West Coast TV stations—from San Diego to Seattle—to carry these important national events as they happen. To accomplish this, Pacific Telephone engineers made special changes in the coaxial cable between Sacramento and Portland. They also rushed the installation of a new radio relay link from Portland to Seattle so both could be used together for the transmission of television network programs over this 745 mile route.

Mr. and Mrs. S. Clarence Trued have just returned to Roseburg from San Francisco where they, as members, attended the national convention of the American Guild of Organists. During the convention week they heard no less than 14 organ concerts by prominent American organists, some of the organists' friends of the Trueds, one concert by E. Powers Biggs of Boston in conjunction with the San Francisco Symphony orchestra and directed by Leo Sowerby, also an organist and composer. Clair Co. J. American woman organist of great renown, played Mozart's Sonata, 9, 12 and 15 together with the Hungarian String Quartette, the same performed by Ruth Trued with the Roseburg Symphony here last spring. The outstanding event was Virgil Fox, virtuoso organist from New York City, who played the city auditorium organ in such a dextrous and skillful manner that people are still raving about it. This seemed to be a convincing and sly gesture to all those organists who attempt to play an organ with only one foot. The final event was the banquet at the Fairmont Hotel (convention headquarters; where music was forgotten and friendships renewed.
