Blood Donation Need For Korea Still Urgent

Someday you may find yourself in a hospital getting a transfusion from blood you yourself donated to the Red Cross.

Unlikely? Yes, but possible. Not all Red Cross blood goes to Korea. The soldier is number one on the priority list, of course, but number two is the American civilian.

So, when John Blood Donor goes down to the American Legion Hall between 10 a.m. and 12 noon Friday he may give a pint that will end up right here in a Roseburg hospital.

There's no charge to the civilian patient for this blood, though hospitals do request payment for administering it.

Right now the need in Korea is serious, says Walt Kauslarich, recruitment chairman for Douglas County. He points out that the weekly published casualty rates are increasing rapidly. For June 18 the number was 259, June 25, 640, and July 3, 965.

As much blood is required in Korea now as during December, 1950, when U.N. forces were retreating from the Chosin reservoir.

It takes nine pints of blood for each person hospitalized in Korea, Kauslarich says, and the casualty figures only list those wounded, not men in hospitals for other reasons.

How do you go about giving a pint of your blood? It's simple. If you're between 18 and 59, don't weigh less than 110, and are healthy, you're eligible. All those under 21 must have notes of permission signed by a parent or guardian.

Appointment Advisable
Though you can just drop up to the Bloodmobile headquarters any time between 10 and 12 noon Friday, officials would appreciate a call beforehand, at 3-3255, so they can make a definite appointment.

When you go to the office, you'll first be registered. Then you'll go to the medical history section where hemoglobin, pulse, blood pressure and temperature tests will be taken. Then on to a fruit juice test. Next you're issued a number, and, within a 5-to-8-minute period, give one pint of blood.

From the donor table you take a 10-minute rest on a cot, drink a glass of water, and head for the canteen where free coffee and doughnuts are served.

You're asked not to eat fatty foods for four hours prior to donation time.

All Red Cross workers will be local people, with the exception of seven and nurses and a doctor from Portland. About 30 local nurses and volunteers will be headed by Mrs. Richard Grant, volunteer service chairman for Douglas County.

American Telephone Co. Reports Income Boost

NEW YORK (AP)—The American Telephone and Telegraph Co. Tuesday reported net income of \$88,170,000, or \$2.56 a share, for the three months ended June 30.

This compares with net income of \$81,111,970 in the like quarter last year, equivalent to \$2.71 a share on a smaller number of shares.

For the 12 months ended June 30, net income was \$340,080,000, or \$10.22 a share, against \$314,314,005, or \$10.89 a share, in the preceding 12 months.

World's Most Prevalent Disease Could Be Boredom; Chopping Wood Suggested As Efficient Remedy

NEW YORK (AP)—What is the most widespread disease in the modern world?

A good case might be made for that death in life, that ennui of the spirit, called boredom.

It is the high price modern man pays for having so much leisure he doesn't know what to do with himself. It is peculiarly virulent in civilized nations. Savages aren't so susceptible to the ravages of boredom. They are too busy trying to stay alive.

Many physicians, if pressed, will admit that perhaps one third of the patients who crowd their waiting rooms are suffering basically from nothing but boredom.

They go there hoping the doctor will find something wrong with them, something to give them the excitement of a real worry. But the medical profession so far hasn't been able to concoct a really effective anti-boredom pill.

You are too tense, you need to relax, such patients often are told. This only encourages them to feel more bored with it all. My theory is it would be better if the doctor said to them:

"You have a bad heart — you may die at any moment."

Children Deceived
There is nothing that gets rid of boredom faster than the fear you won't live to enjoy it.

More people, weary of living, commit suicide in hotel bedrooms in peacetime than destroy themselves on the battlefields of war.

We do our children wrong in educating them to believe freedom from worry will bring them happiness. A man with nothing to worry about can only do two things — become bored or fall asleep. That is the nature of the creature, and human nature doesn't readily change.

Boredom strikes the very poor as well as the very wealthy. Psychologists have found that the Bowery bum isn't happy because he has ducked his responsibilities in life.

He is even more bored and frustrated than an idle rich man, who has at least one thing left to fret over: he can't take his money with him when he goes.

Most boredom seems to spring from a feeling of lack of accomplishment. The tedious tasks, the routine of the daily rut that wear out the lives of many people in our complicated civilization, give them too small a sense of importance, of being really needed.

A man isn't depressed so much by the fact that he is only a cog in a big machine as by the realization that even as a cog he isn't really essential to the machine. It is easy to get another cog.
