U.S. Could Up Power In Korea 'In Pinch'

SEOUL, Korea, (AP) — Gen. J. Lawton Collins, U. S. Army chief of staff, hinted Monday that United States strength in Korea could be increased "in a pinch."

He said the U. S. Eighth Army "as a general proposition" has been furnished all the "means readily available" for battle, but added:

"In a pinch if it were essential to do so, we could employ other means."

He called the mass flight of Thunderjets bound from the U. S. to Japan an indication that "We are growing in air strength."

Local Adventists At Camp Meeting

Roseburg Seventh-day Adventists are joining those from 104 other cities and towns in western Oregon at their annual camp meeting at Gladstone Park, 10 miles south of Portland. Local church officers, Quintus Dickerson, Lewis Webb, LeNor Kruse, and Melvin Whiting, missionary leader, will represent Roseburg at the lay preachers' institute to be held during the first three days of the ten-day encampment from July 17 to 27.

Up to 15,000 attend these yearly gatherings; 7000 are housed on the grounds during the week, and up to 11,000 on weekends. The remaining number commutes from Portland and other nearby cities.

Elder E. F. Coy, pastor of the Roseburg church, has been on the grounds for the past 10 days helping 64 brother ministers set up the camp. By Thursday a multi-room town of 1750 cabins, tents, cafeteria and grocery store, will be set up on the 70-acre tract which the Oregon Conference purchased in 1932 for these annual gatherings. Speakers from the General Conference of the denomination, and missionaries from foreign countries will be speakers. The Voice of Prophecy radio group will be featured the last weekend.

Basis Of Bonus Payments Told To Oregon Vets

The Department of Veterans Affairs reported Friday that \$9,675 bonuses have been paid to living Oregon veterans and 2435 to next of kin of deceased ex-servicemen.

The next of kin include unmarried widows, children, or parents of Oregon men who died in service or following discharge.

Carl Cover, chief of claims for the department's bonus division, said many bonus recipients appear to be puzzled about the method by which the amount of their payments were computed. Their inquiries to the department indicate that they feel they did not receive payment for the full amount of time served, Cover said.

On the other hand, a conscientious ex-wave wrote in to state she believed she had been overpaid \$10.

Veterans were advised to consider the following factors in figuring the amount of payment they believe they are entitled to:

1. The bonus act says payment will be on the basis of \$10 for each full month of stateside duty and \$15 for each full month of foreign or sea duty. Fractions of months don't count, except as they may be added together to total one full month.

2. The bonus act says such payment will be only for the active duty served between Sept. 16, 1940 and June 30, 1946. Some veterans have written the department, citing their months of service after June of 1946. The bonus act doesn't permit payment for those months.

3. The date a man enlisted doesn't count. It's the date he actually entered active duty. Some men were enlisted for several months before they were called to active service. A number of payees who wrote the department about short payments have overlooked this fact.
