EUGENE—Work will start next Monday on Eugene's new \$735,220 sewage treatment plant which will help clear up pollution of the Willamette River. The city council has awarded the construction contract to Lee Hoffman, Portland.

School Driver Education Has National Okay

The governors of all 48 states have endorsed high school driver education, according to an announcement received at Oregon State Motor Association headquarters, Portland.

The announcement was received from the American Automobile Association, which has issued a booklet with remarks of the governors. The AAA says high school driver education is considered the traffic safety program holding the greatest long-range promise, that it is strongly favored by parents once they know about the program, and that it is immensely popular with students.

Governor Douglas McKay of Oregon says, "Probably no activity in improving highway safety is more productive than the Driver Training education in high schools. This trains the driver who is just forming driver habits in the proper way to handle a motor car. It instills in him not only a correct mechanical habit of driving but gives him a correct mental attitude towards the rights of others. This is a definite, tangible, provable activity in highway safety which I hope will be expanded and enlarged during the coming year."

Fairbanks Fire Dead Reaches 4

FAIRBANKS, Alaska—The known death toll stood at four today as firemen and military volunteers continued to probe through the ashes of the old Pioneer Hotel, which was leveled by a fire early Monday.

Three bodies were recovered from the ruins yesterday and one man died of burns in a local hospital Monday. He was identified as ill Venderpool, an Alaska Freight Lines employee.

Two of the bodies found yesterday were tentatively identified as those of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph J. Steiner of Point Barrow, Alaska. Fire Chief E. B. Wilcox said he believed the third body was that of Edna Richardson, Fairbanks.

Police Chief Floyd Clower still listed five persons as missing and eight were in hospitals.

The hotel was crowded with 250 guests when the fire broke out early Monday, destroying the wooden structure in two hours.

Roseburg School System's Heads Speak On Status

In order to understand the problems of School District 4, we must evaluate the school property and the school children served. Supt. M. C. "Mike" Deller told Roseburg Kiwanians Tuesday noon at the weekly luncheon meeting.

Deller, along with Victor Micelli, school clerk and director of business affairs, and Grady Mankins, building superintendent, spoke on various phases of the school system and its rapidly expanding program.

The district, with the newly consolidated areas, will have a school census estimated at around 4700. The building program, approved by the voters in a \$1 1/2 million bond issue, is underway, but the process of drafting plans is time consuming, Deller pointed out.

Building Progress Noted

Already underway is construction on an eight-room addition at Fullerton, and an auditorium-cafeteria at Riverside. It is the board's hopes these will be completed by the opening of school this fall. Bids are to be taken this week on the high school shop building. Still in the planning stage is the new school near Cloverdale Park, the Rose School annex, the high school physical education plant and improving of other schools now in the school system.

An attendance of more than 4000 is expected this fall, and this could go higher, explained Deller. He said last year's average attendance for the year was 93.3, compared with the state average of 92.6.

The Roseburg School district is now 29 miles in length and 13 miles in depth at its greatest point, stated Micelli, who discussed the financial aspects of the district.

Financial Status Cited

The district has a bonded indebtedness of \$2,296,000, but has as assets \$5 million invested in buildings and employs 194 persons who receive a total payroll of \$60,000 a month, said Micelli.

He explained a new program for financing, in that all purchases must be made on requisitions, with a minimum of employees eligible to sign such requisitions. Also all supplies will be purchased by requisition. The \$905,000 which will be paid out for instruction is very near the state normal expenditure for this purpose, he said.

Mankins described what is being done to improve the schools this summer. Some 40 custodians and maintenance men on full time are working on the build-

U.S. Planes Fire Four More Red Power Plants

SEOUL, Korea—American carrier planes fired power plants at Changjin reservoir in Northeast Korea Tuesday.

The battleship Iowa blasted red rail yards and coastal guns with one ton projectiles.

On the ground, U.N. infantrymen fought off a tank-supported night attack against a key hill position on the Central front.

Allied troops wrested the hill from the Reds last month. Five Red tanks shelled the hill for four hours Tuesday night. Then for two hours Communist troops battled unsuccessfully to reach its heights.

FREED IN TRAGEDY

PORTLAND—Air Force man Lawrence Leroy Rice, 17, Tuesday was cleared by a coroner's jury of blame for the gunbot death of Vernon Wilson Pond, also 17.

Both men were from Grand Junction, Col., and were stationed at the Portland Airbase.

Rice said Pond was killed in a playful scuffle over a target pistol which both youths thought was not loaded.

John A. Sutter, on whose 50,000 acres gold was discovered in 1851, did not profit from the discovery. His holdings were lost in the subsequent frenzy.

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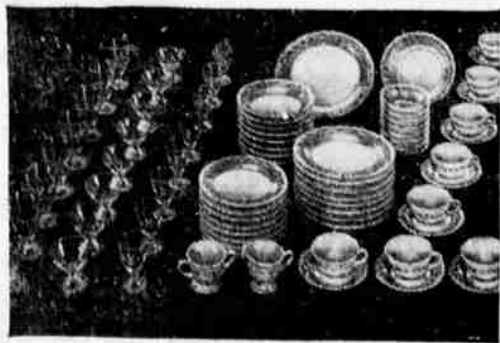
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
