Elkton Studies School Gym Bids

A bid of \$158,781 for construction of a gymnasium at Elkton High School made A. T. Fox, North Bend, the low bidder for the school contract, reports architect Clare Hamlin of Eugene. Bids were opened at 7 p.m. Monday.

The Elkton school board is taking the bids under advisement and may issue another call for bids at a later date, says Eugene Fisher, board member.

Bids were considerably higher than the board expected, and some revision of plans may be necessary, Fisher said. The architect is meeting with the low bidder today.

Two Eugene firms also bid. Hardie & Heppner bid \$162,364. High bid was from Industrial Building Co. with \$164,378.

The multi-purpose 104X112-foot gym will be of laminated arch construction. A kitchen and storage area will flank the stage, which will also serve as a lunchroom.

Concrete floored dressing rooms will be located in the basement, with shower rooms of structural clay tile.

Rough stained cedar will be used on the exterior.

Construction of a disposal field and septic tank is also included in the project.

Yanks Win Two From Cleveland

The Yankee Stadium, graveyard of Cleveland American League pennant drives in the past, is haunting the Indians again.

Cleveland started the baseball world by winning its first three games in the home of the New York Yankees this year. This almost matched their victory total for the previous two seasons during which they managed to win only five of 17 games in the house that Ruth built.

But Cleveland's dreams of a happy hunting ground in the stadium were rudely shattered Wednesday. The Indians missed an opportunity to virtually tie the Yanks for first place by dropping both ends of a double-header, 8-7 in 10 innings and 7-4. They now are 4½ games behind.

The Yanks came from behind to win the opener. Yogi Berra tied the score at 7-7 in the eighth inning with a two-run homer, his 20th of the season, and Hank Bauer broke it up by singling home Rookie Kal Segrist in the tenth.

The Yanks won the nightcap with a four-run rally in the seventh against Bob Feller. Gil McDougald's three-run homer was the big blow of the rally.

Olympic Shakeup Due With New Director

HELSINKI — A thorough shakeup in the entire Olympic program was forecast Thursday to make sure that everybody taking part is a simon-pure amateur.

The move would be a logical step in view of the elevation Wednesday of Avery Brundage of Chicago to the presidency of the International Olympic Committee.

The I. O. C. runs the Olympic program.

Brundage is the world's leading advocate of amateur sports. He has fought the inroads of professionalism at every occasion without regard to his personal popularity.

Both in his position as president of the United States Olympic Committee and as a member of the I. O. C. executive commission he has opposed any suggestion to liberalize the interpretation of an amateur.

He will take over his new, unpaid job on September 1. For the present Olympic games the executive will be the aging J. Sigfrid Edstrom of Sweden, who has headed the organization since the war years.

Although the ruling body made the news Wednesday, competition also continued on the athletic fields in field hockey and soccer.

The United States was bounced out of the soccer qualifying competition in a one-sided battle with Italy.

Two surprises were the defeats of Great Britain, home of soccer, and Chile. The British lost, 5-3, to Luxembourg, in overtime and Chile was edged by Egypt, 5-4. Brazil defeated Holland, 5-1.

These matches ended the qualifying rounds. The draw for the regular Olympic tournament will be made Thursday. The teams will be Finland, Norway, Luxembourg, Italy, Brazil, Egypt, Russia, Yugoslavia, Denmark, Poland, Hungary, Sweden, Germany, Turkey, Austria, and the Dutch East Indies.

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
