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Flying Saucer Reports Await Air Force Data

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force followed a familiar routine Thursday—sending through channels its latest flying saucer report. Two airline pilots, First Officers W. B. Nash and W. H. Fortenberry, reported in Miami eight objects 100 feet in diameter glowing like red hot coals and traveling 1,000 miles an hour passed directly beneath their plane over Chesapeake Bay on Tuesday night.

The Air Force said it has made a preliminary report to the Air Force's Technical Intelligence Center at Dayton, O., and that a complete written report is expected to follow.

Until this report is made, the Air Force added, no evaluation can be made of this reported sighting. Capt. E. J. Rupprecht of the Air Technical Intelligence Center said 60 reports of flying saucers from throughout the nation have been channeled to the base.

Capt. Rupprecht project officer for the Air Force investigation of "unidentified aerial objects," said the reports were almost double the number received at this time last year.

Roy T. Ellis of Dayton reported seeing an object almost like an ice cream cone with an elliptical object in the center where the ice cream would rest in the cone. Ellis, an amateur astronomer, said he was looking for comets Sunday night when he saw the object. He said it moved "very deliberately."

Col. Richard H. Magee, Dayton civil defense director, said "there is something flying around our skies and I wish I knew what it was."

Asked if flying saucers could be the reason for the "Skywatch Operation," Col. Magee said no specific reason had been given, "but that could be the answer."

Negroes Press Demand For Civil Rights Plank

CHICAGO (AP) — Northern Democrats and Negro spokesmen told Democratic platform writers Thursday their party may lose the November election if they pussy-foot on the civil rights issue.

Rep. Adam Clayton Powell of New York, in a statement read for him at the platform hearings, said that if the Democratic platform lacks a strong civil rights plank Negro voters probably "will not go to the polls at all."

Stanley Gewirtz, executive committee chairman of Americans for Democratic action, smilingly talked of a possible voting boycott in November.

Rep. Emanuel Celler of New York called for a compulsory fair employment practices commission and said such a plank helped win the 1948 election for the Democrats.

5-State Columbia River Water Compact Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman signed a bill Thursday authorizing five western states to negotiate a compact for the use of Columbia River water.

The states are Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming. Before the compact may become effective it must be ratified by each of the states and approved by Congress.
