## Brooklyn Edges Reds, 2-1; Cardinals Beat N.Y. Giants

The Brooklyn Dodgers, who have won 35 of 36 games with the bottom three National League clubs this season, found the going pretty tough Thursday against seventh-place Cincinnati.

It took 11 innings before Carl Furillo finally broke it up with a run-scoring single, 2-1.

Brooklyn now has a 12-1 record against the Reds, 13-0 against Boston and 10-0 against Pittsburgh. Friday night's opponent.

The Dodger lead measured six games after Max Lanier walked Enos Slaughter with the bases loaded and the score tied in the last of the ninth for a 3-2 St. Louis Card victory over the New York Giants.

Boston dropped Chicago 1-0. The "big" American League series at Yankee Stadium ended with New York and Cleveland splitting a twilight-night double-

header. The Yanks took the second game, 5-4, after dropping the first, 11-6.

Little Bobby Shantz turned in a six-hitter for Philadelphia against the St. Louis Browns to win his 16th, 3-1, in the second game of a two-night doubleheader. The Browns won the opener, 9-5.

Spec Shea, a spectacular success at Washington since he was discarded by the Yankees, shut out Detroit with five hits and scored the only run to beat Hal Newhouser's five-hitter, 1-0.

Boston didn't know it was taking over second place when the Red Sox squeezed past Chicago, 2-1, in a day game. Sammy White's home run and George Kelly's run-scoring double were enough to win.

Down in the second division of the National, the big noise was provided by Pittsburgh's sweep of a doubleheader with Philadelphia, 2-1 and 4-2.

## 14 Flags Raised In Olympic Rite

HELSINKI — The flags of 14 nations in the Olympic summer games here were raised at a brief ceremony in the village of Kaapylae at noon Friday, one day before the actual opening of the games.

Now the flags of all 69 nations competing countries are waving overhead.

The ceremony included Mexico, Bahama, British Guinea, Spain, Guatemala, Eire, Iceland, Liech- tenstein, Nigeria, Norway, Pana- ma, France, Sweden and Finland.

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## 8,000 Athletes In Olympic Test

HELSINKI — Another 24 hours and the greatest sports show on earth — the 15th summer Olympic games — will open on the Kely green turf of Helsinki's modern- istic stadium.

Sixty nine countries, a record, and almost 8,000 athletes, another record, will be represented at the colorful ceremonies Saturday.

A 70th nation may show up, but probably not by Saturday.

The ticklish question of which China — Communist or nationalist — can be the China in the games was settled temporarily Thursday. The International Olympic Com- mittee voted to let both take part.

Nationalist China then said it did not care to play with the Com- munistists here or anywhere else. The Nationalists promptly cancel- ed any plans to compete.

Communist China will be eligi- ble for one sport, swimming. But its team will have to get here by a week from Saturday when the first swimming events are sched- uled.

Present whereabouts of the squad are unknown. Guesses range from the Russian naval base 10 miles outside Helsinki, to Lenin- grad, Moscow, Siberia and China. As the big show here prepared to go on the committee confirmed final arrangements for the 1952

games at Melbourne. Now they will tackle the problem of reduc- ing the size of the affair. Team sports—basketball, soccer, field hockey and water polo — will have to put up a good case to justify their retention.

The 1952 games are so large that preliminary competition has been running in three sports for the past four days. This was neces- sary to squeeze the 20-sport pro- gram into the prescribed period of 15 official days.

Canada, Bulgaria and the Phil- ipines qualified for the basketball tournament Thursday and Cuba qualified in an early Friday game. Two more teams will qualify Friday, the winners of the Greece- Hungary and Egypt-Italy match- es.

The United States and Russia didn't have to play in the qualify- ing rounds. Neither did Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Mexico, Finland, France, Czechoslovakia or Uru- guay.

Two qualifying rounds were needed in soccer and the regular field hockey tournament started Tuesday. Austria and Belgium were knocked out in field hockey Thursday night. Holland plays France in second round matches Friday night.

## La Chapelle Returns For Try At Roseburg Wrestling Honors

A pair of last week's winners are matched up for this Saturday night's semi-final wrestling bout.

Back from other wrestling wars is Maurice La Chapelle, who has been named to put a stopper on a tricky, young newcomer, Billy Sandow.

Last week, La Chapelle master- fully dispatched old Steve Xenoff in his first match since his return to the local stomping ground. This time, however, the sighing French- man meets youth, strength and cleverness. Sandow has been wrest- ling here only two weeks, but he has already taken the hearts of the fans. Last weekend, he outsped fast Buck Weaver to score a semi- final victory.

This match precedes the Inva- sion of the dreaded Black Prince. The unknown grappler behind the black mask is the first chapter in another question-mark episode such as the Galloping Ghost who was un- masked in the local ring some months ago.

The Prince, whose name has be- come a threat to Northwest wrest- lers in recent weeks, pits his skill

against Jack Kiser, who has surged back into the top ranks by annex- ing the Pacific Coast Light Heavy- weight title.

In the opener, two young pros- pects take a one-fall test flight. They are Bill Fletcher and Danny O'Rourke.
