Deadline Fixed For Veterans' Vocation Course

July 25th will mark an important deadline for disabled World War II veterans in need of vocational training under Public Law 16 for occupations requiring a full four years of study. It has been announced by the Veterans Administration.

Eligible veterans must be enrolled before the deadline date in order to get in four full years of training.

After July 25th, the VA said, no more four-year courses of Public Law 16 training may be taken under the law. Disabled veterans, however, still will be permitted to train for occupations requiring shorter periods of time.

Public Law 16, the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, provides up to four years of training to disabled veterans who need it to overcome occupational and physical handicaps. But the law also specifies that no training may be given after July 25, 1956, a date that's only four years away.

After July 25th, disabled World War II veterans will be allowed to start only those courses that can be completed by the 1956 wind-up of the training program.

A veteran who would need three years of training, for example, when the program had but two years to run, could not take it. Under the law, the length of training may not exceed the life of the program.

The deadlines apply only to World War II veterans with service-connected disabilities, in need of training to overcome their disabilities.

For veterans disabled after the fighting began in Korea, in June, 1950, no deadlines have yet been set for Public Law 16 training. Vocational training for them may extend until nine years after the end of the current emergency—a date yet to be determined either by the President or by Congress.

10 Cities Cited In Lack Of Sewage Facilities

PORTLAND (AP) — Ten Oregon cities have been ordered to appear before the State Sanitary Authority Friday for failure to install sewage treatment plants.

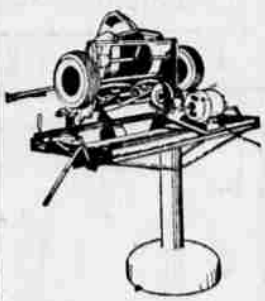
The 10 cities are Newport, Lebanon, Mt. Angel, Vale, Nyssa, Coquille, Myrtle Point, Toledo, Wheeler and Nehalem.

If they can offer no reason for failure to start construction, the authority can order them to take action.

The sewage treatment program is part of the state's efforts to eliminate stream pollution.

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
