### Umatilla County Has Four More Polio Cases

PENDELTON — Four more cases of polio in Eastern Umatilla County were reported Friday, bringing the total in the county to 15.

All but two of the 15 cases are in the Milton-Freewater area, where the swimming pool has been closed. American Legion junior baseball games cancelled and other juvenile activities curtailed in an attempt to prevent spread of the disease.

The latest cases struck three children and an adult. The attacks appeared to be mild. There have been no deaths in the 15 cases.

The total exceeds that of the entire 1951 season, when there were 14 cases in the county.

Rickets is a nutritional disorder of infancy marked by insufficient amounts of calcium phosphate in the bones. The disease causes softening of the bones, which consequently bend easily and produce deformities of the head, neck, chest, and legs. The abdomen is enlarged. Some of the teeth are late in coming through.

Rickets is a preventable disease. It is common especially among the poor. It usually occurs in infants from three months to three years of age. Almost invariably it begins during the winter and early spring months. Premature infants are more liable to have rickets than full term infants. If unchecked, the disease results in severe anemia.

The disease usually begins with restlessness at night on the part of the child, profuse sweating of the head and neck, and increased skin pallor. The muscles become flabby. Soft spots appear in the bones of the skull. There is also swelling of the joints, beading of the ribs, enlargement of certain finger joints and evidence of acquired deformity. This beading of the ribs consists of a row of nodules or knoblike structures, which are found at the junctions of the ribs with their cartilages. Usually there is some gastro-intestinal difficulty and constipation.

Inadequate diet is the chief factor in the production of rickets. The essential dietary factor is vitamin D. This vitamin occurs

Now, though he'll most likely never see them, Raymond will be considered a classmate by 500 more children in Roseburg.

The mayor and members of the committee discussed plans for getting out a big vote at Tuesday's election. (The vote is from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m. standard time, or 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. DST).

To encourage a large vote, budget committee members dug into their own pockets for \$15 to hire a sound truck.

During the meeting some budget members said they believed the group should present the original budget again to the voters without a decrease from the originally proposed 12 per cent to five per cent on the salary raises for city employees.

City Attorney Paul Geddes, however, advised against such a move. "No matter what the taxpayers' group has said or done, I think it would be morally wrong for the budget committee to go back on its part of the bargain. I think we should stick by our agreement and present the scaled-down budget to the people."



### Reward Offered For Cop Slayer

### 4 Die As Plane Crashes In Idaho

ST. ANTHONY, Idaho — A Beechcraft Bonanza airplane carrying four California residents crashed and burned near Henry's Lake in Eastern Idaho late Friday. All four were killed.

The victims were identified by Wilcoxon, 40, general contractor of investigating officials as Herschel Bakersfield, Calif.; his wife, about the same age; George Van Atta, 41, Shafter, Calif.; and Lee Morrison, 18, Bakersfield.

The party had flown from Burley, Idaho, to Henry's Lake to visit James Ford, 18, an employe of the Pittsburgh Club at the lake, a son by a former marriage to Mrs. Wilcoxon.

Observers said the plane, piloted by Wilcoxon, had flown over the club as a signal of arrival, before attempting to land. The plane crashed and burned on the runway.

### UN Opens Drive For 'Old Baldy'

SEOUL, Korea — United Nations infantrymen in a furious dawn attack Saturday forced back Chinese Communists on Old Baldy and then opened a new assault against Reds on one slope of the key Western Front hill.

The U. S. Eighth Army summary said the morning charge supported by artillery and tank fire carried the Allied troops to within 150 yards of Red positions on the northwestern slope.

The summary did not make clear whether U.N. units had reached the crest of the rain soaked hill. Earlier it had been described as a no-man's land.

The Eighth Army likewise did not say how far back the Reds had been driven by the initial thrust.

### Caleb Corder, Native Of Canyonville, Dies

Caleb Corder, 86, a native of Canyonville, and a resident of Josephine county most of his life, died at Grants Pass, Thursday. He was engaged in logging by overtime in the Wolf Creek area in the early days and also did considerable mining. Surviving are a son, Clifford P. Corder, Grants Pass, and a daughter, Meda M. Rush, Calif.

### Traffic Mishap Fatal To Ex-School Principal

EUGENE — Injuries suffered in an automobile accident on the McKenzie Highway Monday proved fatal Friday for Wayne L. Starr, 73, Monroe. He formerly was principal of high schools at Harrisburg and Monroe.

### COURT MARTIAL DATED

WASHINGTON — The Army announced Friday that the court martial of Maj. Gen. Robert W. Grow, charged with mentioning military secrets in a diary copied by a Soviet spy, will begin at Fort George G. Meade, Md., next Wednesday.

### Springfield Fire Kills Man, Wife

SPRINGFIELD — Fire swept through a two-room frame house here early Saturday and killed Mr. and Mrs. Walter Lee Rauch. Rauch, who was 64, was found to have collapsed at the back door, apparently while trying to open it for an escape. Deputy Coroner Dean Blachly said both Rauch and his wife apparently suffocated. The body of Mrs. Rauch was found on the floor, unmarked by burns. Resuscitation failed to revive them.

### 8 Oregon Cities Ordered To Build Sewer Plants

PORTLAND — Eight Oregon cities Friday were ordered to start construction of sewage treatment plants and to have them operating next July.

The order was made at Friday's meeting of the State Sanitary Authority. The cities affected are Coquille, Lebanon, Mt. Angel, Myrtle Point, Newport, Nyssa, Toledo and Vale. The sewage treatment program is part of the state's effort to halt stream pollution.

### June Coldest In History Here

This June was the coldest yet in Roseburg, according to the June Weather Bureau summary.

The minimum of 35 degrees on June 12 broke the previous record of 36 degrees, set in 1880.

The average monthly temperature of 59.8 degrees was 2.7 degrees below normal. The highest maximum temperature recorded was 87 degrees on the 14th.

The total precipitation for the month was 3.29 inches, which is 2.20 inches above the June normal. Of this total of 3.29 inches, 1.50 inches fell in the 24-hour period beginning on the afternoon of the 28th and ending on the morning of the 29th. The maximum 24-hour rainfall for any June is 1.68 inches, which fell in 1947.

There were seven clear days, five partly cloudy days, and 18 cloudy days. The total sunshine, recorded and observed, was 219 hours and 54 minutes, which is 48 percent of the possible 460 hours and 11 minutes.

Only one day of thunderstorms, the afternoon of the 28th, was noted; and no hail was observed in the immediate vicinity of the Weather Bureau Office. Only one lay with dense fog (visibility reduced to 1/4 mile or less) was noted. This was the morning of the 7th.

### Slide Buries S.P. Track Near Grants Pass

GRANTS PASS — A rock and dirt slide buried 30 feet of Southern Pacific Railway track three miles east of here Friday.

The south bound Portland-Ashland train was held here and passengers were taken to their destinations by bus.

A bulldozer helping clear the track was caught in a second slide and another bulldozer had to be brought in to free it.

Raymond Criswell, Southern Pacific agent, said the track was expected to be cleared Friday afternoon.

### Firemen Douse Blaze On Awning Of Store

The Roseburg fire department made one call and the rural department two calls Friday, but fire damage was slight.

The city department responded to a call at 9 p. m., when the awning over the front of Harth's Toggery was ignited by a cigarette tossed onto it by a passer-by.

The rural department was called to grass fires near the Pine Motor Theater at 2:25, and near Caskey Corners at the railroad track at 6:15 p. m.
