Burnett Family Reunion Held July 5



The descendants of the late Thomas B. Burnett met at the Burnett farm, (George F. Burnett residence) at Round Prairie July 5 in commemoration of the 101st anniversary of the family's settlement in that valley.

Thomas B. Burnett's father, the late James D. Burnett, with his wife and two eldest children, crossed the plains with ox team from Missouri, and took up a donation land claim at Round Prairie in 1851. It was he who gave the valley its name. Thomas B. Burnett was born there in 1858 and was an early stage driver. He drove the last stage coach out of Roseburg in 1883, when the railroad was completed and stages were discontinued through Ore-

gon. He then was transferred to Northern California where he met and married Jennie Cook in 1886 at Cloverdale, Calif. Mrs. Burnett died in 1937 and Thomas B. Burnett died in 1941.

One of the highlights of the centennial celebration was the old stage coach, which Mr. Burnett had treasured, and which was on display at the farm on that day. A delicious buffet dinner was served from a table covered with an Irish linen cutwork cloth. A beautiful centennial cake graced the buffet and was served during the afternoon. Another feature of the occasion was a platter which is over 150 years old and an heir-

loom of the family. Colorful sweet peas were used about the rooms.

Dewey Declares Formosa Must Stay Anti-Red

NEW YORK (P) — Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, who made a first-hand study of Far Eastern affairs last year, blames insufficient American aid for the downfall of Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist government in China.

"Aid which we were committed to give to the Nationalist government was not delivered," Dewey says, "and what was delivered wasn't adequate."

But, the governor added, "I am sure no one in the State Department, nor any individual in this country caused the fall of Chiang Kai-shek's government."

Dewey, appearing Thursday night on a Dumont network television program, said the Generalissimo's government was "far from perfect" but he expressed the belief it could have saved China from the Communists if America had sent enough help.

The fallen Chinese leader, now governing his Nationalist forces on the island of Formosa, remains "a symbol" to 10 million Chinese in the Free Pacific area, Dewey said, and these people constitute a balance of power between freedom

and slavery." Therefore, the governor said, Formosa "must be maintained as a symbol so that overseas Chinese can have not just one place to go—Communism."

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
