as are involved in the civil rights proposals, but as a candidate who would be reasonable about his differences with them.

Vice President Barkley's retirement from the presidential scramble strengthened the draft-Stevenson movement, which has been nurtured on the convention floor by such able strategists as Jacob M. Arvey, Illinois National committeeman.

Stevenson's Stock Rises
 The vice president said that leaders of certain big-state delegations who had been egging him on to run had "found it expedient" to withdraw their support.

There wasn't too much doubt in anyone's mind that these delegations were moving toward Stevenson.

Even New York's 94-vote group, the bulk of which has been committed to W. Averell Harriman, showed signs of wavering.

Barkley's pull-out threw into the uncommitted column the total 34½ delegate votes he had pledged to him. The latest Associated Press tabulation thus shows: Harriman 238½, Russell 164½, Harriman 105, Stevenson 63½, Kerr 46, other 218, uncommitted 374½. Nomination requires 616.

This put Stevenson under more and more compulsion so far as the nomination is concerned.

He has said he wants only to run for reelection as governor of Illinois and has urged delegates not to put him in nomination.

Scripture Quoted
 But when he signed off for a few hours sleep early Tuesday, he referred Newman to Matthew 26: 39 which says:

"O, my Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me. Nevertheless, not as I will but as Thou wilt."

Adventists In New Glendale Church

The new Seventh Day Adventist Church on the corner of Gilbert and Millie Streets in Glendale is nearly completed and is now being used by members and friends for regular services. The first worship service in the new building was held Saturday, June 29.

The church, semi-modern in architecture and with windows extending all along one side, is about 24 x 44 feet with a 12 x 20-foot swing. Seating capacity of the auditorium is 125, but should it be necessary at a later time, one partition can be easily removed to give an added capacity of 100 persons.

Two large classrooms and one small one, a pastor's study, four rooms, and a fireproof furnace room with forced air heating system are included in the structure.

When the church is completed, there will be flush-lighting in the ceiling, colored tile on the floors, and the walls will be painted in pastel tones. The present seating furniture is borrowed from the Cave Junction Church, but will be replaced with some more in keeping with the style of the building.

Plans call for landscaping in the front of the church and a graveled playground in the back, with a volleyball court, and backstops for baseball. The playground area will be used by children attending the Seventh Day Adventist school, which will be held there weekdays and will double as extra parking space when services are in progress.

The state conference of the Seventh Day Adventist Church has shared with the local congregation by financing the new building.

Some donated work and contributions from local business men have been helpful.

Replaces Old-Time Oratory, Noise At Democratic National Conclave Soft, Conversational Type Of Talk

CHICAGO—A score of years after F.D.R. initiated the homey talk-to-the-nation routine, Democratic presidential hopefuls and their supporters are using his speech techniques to espouse their own causes.

The days of the shouting, haranguing, gesticulating speaker have faded from the convention scene. Instead Democratic spokesmen today speak more softly, more intimately to the delegates and alternates gathered in the International Amphitheatre here.

The reason: upwards of 50-million of prospective voters are listening to their words via radio and television. And they are the people the speakers are seeking to sell more than the delegates.

They are mindful, too, of the impact of this unseen audience, as was so dramatically demonstrated in the GOP session two weeks ago. Fan mail swamped delegates, alternates, national committeemen as well as radio and tv commentators and by-line newspapermen. Some delegates admitted then that they spent as much as three hours daily answering mail, telegraph and phone queries from the folks back home.

"Conversational type of speech is the kind people like," Dean James H. McBurney of Northwestern University's School of Speech pointed out today in discussing this speakers' turnout from convention custom. "Oratory is as dead as a dodo bird. This I'm talking right-to-you style also permits the good speaker to take occasional emotional climaxes. And a good speaker should, but it's something other than talking into an empty rain barrel."

Soft Speaking Pays Off
 Dean McBurney points out that a good deal of the impact that bombarded an allegedly dejected GOP convention into the single-ballot nomination of Dwight D. Eisenhower as presidential standard bearer was Ike's soft-spoken, direct and sincere appeal via a soft and modulated speaking mannerism.

"The intimate approach and simple language," he said, "are politicians' swords today, and they seem to be making the most of it. Proof of this lies in the watchful activities of the folks back home, which took final say-so on nominations from smoke-filled rooms and placed them on the convention floor."

This correspondent is sure Dean McBurney knows whereof he speaks. The dean moderates the "Northwestern University Reviewing Stand" program which has
