

## Flying Saucer Reports Coming At Faster Rate

WASHINGTON — The Air Force said Monday it is receiving flying saucer reports this summer at a rate higher than at any time since the initial flood of sightings in 1947.

An Air Force spokesman said that while 1947 was the big year for such reports, the current average of 100 sightings a month is the largest since then, with the November-December period of 1948 next.

He said there has been no correlation of sighting reports to seasons.

The Air Force could not furnish an estimate of the cost of running down flying saucer rumors, because they are handled through

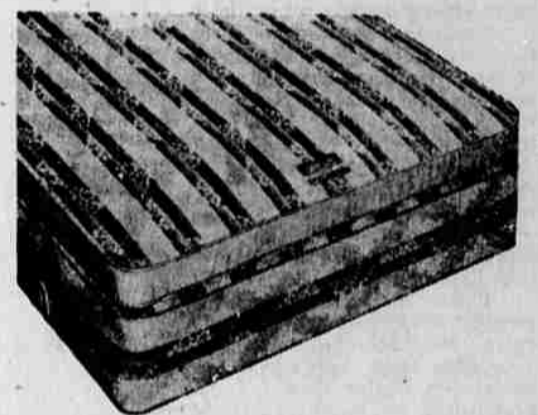

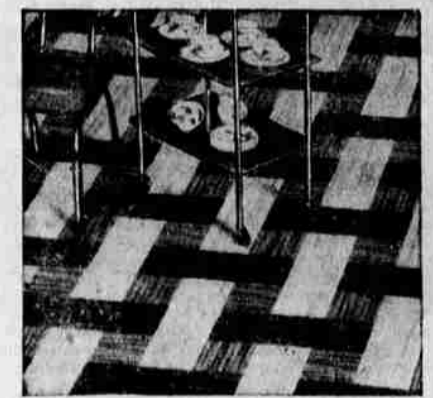
