Stevenson Gets Great Ovation Prior To Speech

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago — Democrats gave a roaring ovation Monday at their 31st national convention to Gov. Adlai Stevenson.

He is the man who says he doesn't want the party's presidential nomination.

Cheers roared up from the delegates packed into this big arena when the Illinois chief executive took the podium for what ordinarily would be a routine welcoming speech.

It was plain that "Draft Stevenson" sentiment ran strong among many of the men and women who by next Friday will pick a man to contest with GOP nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower for the nation's top office.

The applause ran for six minutes and was calmed finally by a request from chairman F. E. McKinney of the national committee for the delegates to restrain their enthusiasm and let the convention get on with its business.

Most of the Southern delegates—backing Senator Russell of Georgia for the nomination—remained in their seats during the standing ovation for Stevenson.

Stevenson told delegates the party will never apologize for its 20th Century leadership.

"Who leads us is less important than what leads us," the Illinois governor said in a prepared welcoming speech.

"What counts now," Stevenson said in his speech, "is not just what we are against but what we are for... A man doesn't save a century or a civilization, but a military party wedded to a principle can."

Looks Like Boom. (Shortly after Lucas' prediction Sunday night, a poll of Pennsylvania delegates on their "personal choice" was topped by Stevenson with 32 votes. This, although not binding, was billed in advance as the possible starter button for a Stevenson bandwagon.)

"I hope our preoccupation here," Stevenson's speech went on, "is not just with personalities but with objections... What America needs and the world wants is not bomb, hate and double talk, but a sober message of firm faith and confidence."

(Joseph L. Gill, chairman of the Illinois delegation, said Sunday night: "He didn't say he would not accept a draft." This followed Stevenson's statement to the 60-vote group that, "I just don't want to be nominated for the presidency.")

Stevenson counseled in his speech that Democrats must not deny their errors or make excuses "where we have wronged the public trust." Then he added:

"But we will never appease, nor will we apologize for our leadership in the great events of this critical century from Woodrow Wilson to Harry Truman! "We glory in these imperishable pages of our country's chronicle."
