International Court Sidetracks Iran Oil Dispute

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran's parliament overwhelmingly renominated Mohammed Mossadegh premier Tuesday after two days of bloody Nationalist rioting and disorder had forced the more moderate Ahmed Qavam from the office.

Qavam's announced determination to seek a settlement of Iran's oil dispute with Britain set off Communist-strengthened Nationalist mobs who screamed through the streets for his death and battled with police and troops.

Twenty persons reportedly were killed in the fighting which raged through the capital Monday. Disorders erupted in other parts of the country. Qavam resigned Monday afternoon.

At The Hague, The Netherlands, the International Court of Justice ruled in a 9 to 5 decision Tuesday that it is not competent to judge the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute.

Britain contended the court had power to settle the dispute between the British-controlled Anglo-Iranian Oil Company and the Iranian government which had nationalized the company's billion dollar Iranian holdings.

Efforts To End Steel Strike Still Stymied

WASHINGTON — The White House, deeply concerned about the complete break-down of steel negotiations, pondered a new peace move Tuesday—but there was obviously a feeling of futility over any chances of quick success.

Plans to take over a small portion of the industry under the 1948 Selective Service Act were under serious study but no action was in the immediate offing.

A top official asking not to be named said a meeting of the Wage Policy Committee of the striking CIO Steelworkers Monday "obviously left the parties much further apart than they had been."

After that meeting broke up, CIO chief Philip Murray said the two sides were "completely deadlocked."

U.S. Sues To Compel TV Features In Movies

LOS ANGELES — The U.S. Justice Department filed a civil suit Tuesday aimed to compel 12 motion picture producing and distributing companies to allow feature films on television.

The complaint filed in federal court charged the movie companies with conspiracy to restrain interstate commerce in feature 16 millimeter films by agreeing to ban their use on television.

Defendants also are charged with refusing to allow exhibition of the 16 millimeter films within 10 miles of any established theater and to strictly limit exhibition in schools, churches, hospitals, U.S.O. centers and private clubs.
