14-Year-Old Girl Sets Golf Record

Young Carol Jo Kahler, only 14 years old, scored the best mark ever made on the Roseburg Country Club course by a woman member to win Classes A and B honors in weekly play Tuesday.

She carded a 40 on the first nine to set the record. Her 18-hole card was 88. Mrs. Ralstyn Bridges was second in the combined classes for the day's play of blind bogey.

In Class C, Mrs. Clem Howard won. Meanwhile, the Courter-Pearson Tournament championship race was cut down to three names. Again Carol Jo figured prominently. She tied Mrs. Dick Coppage in the semi-final match. The two will play off in 18 holes later in the week.

Church, Industrial League All-Star Teams Selected

YMCA Church League and Industrial League Managers caucused Tuesday night at the Veterans Hospital and selected all-stars for the annual battle between the mythical softball giants in each league.

What they came up with were two teams dominated by players from front-running nine in the respective leagues. For example, Industrial leader Scherner Bros. placed five members on the team, including one manager. In the Church League, first-place Vets All-Stars placed five as did First Christian Church. Third-place Baptist placed four. These figures include two pitchers, two catchers, three utilities and two managers.

One strange factor in the nominations, however, is that second-place Melrose was almost overlooked. Only Bert Young earned a berth and that in the capacity of a utility player.

Four repeaters from each of the 1951 squads were listed in the latest edition of the All-Star roster.

Russian Lead Increased By 2 Mat Bouts

HELSINKI — Another Olympic record fell Wednesday as the fourth day of track and field competition began in the big Olympic stadium with qualifying trials in three events.

The women's broad jump mark of 3.69 meters (12 feet 0.2 inches) was subjected to a mass assault and was smashed by four girls, one an American, within a short time after competition started.

Russia meanwhile increased its lead in the overall point scoring by taking the gold medals in the first two free style wrestling championships that were decided.

Arsen Mekokishvili took the heavyweight title and David Cimkaurize the middleweight medal.

Girls Jump Mark — On the usual 10-5-4-3-2-1 scoring basis, this added 20 points to Russia's unofficial total to bring it to 156.5 points. All point scoring in the Olympics is unofficial as only individual victories are recognized.

The United States, which has scored all its 115 points in track and field events, has four survivors in other divisions of the wrestling competition, which will be completed Wednesday afternoon.

Yvette Williams of New Zealand, got off the best jump of the early trials, clearing 6.16 meters (20 feet 2.52 inches), nearly two feet beyond the old Olympic standard, established in 1948 by Olga Gyarmati of Hungary.

Qualifying Races — The women's broad jump was added to the Olympic program for the 1948 games in London.

Right behind Miss Williams in the qualifying for Wednesday afternoon's final came Mabel Landry of Chicago with a jump of 19 feet 3.50 inches.

Two Russian girls, Aleksandra Chudina and Nina Djerkina also exceeded the former record.

American men, who have been setting the pace in this unprecedented record-breaking carnival, contented themselves with ordinary performances as they had to attain only comparatively easy qualifying distances.

All three American entries qualified for the javelin throw final without removing their sweat suits, which served as protection against raw, cold weather.

Franklin (Bud) Held of Lakeside, Calif., former Stanford athlete, got off the best American toss, 225 feet 1.63 inches.

Cy Young of Modesto, Calif., did 229 feet 8.03 inches on his second try after missing on his first and Bill Miller of Phoenix, Ariz., threw 212 feet 7.62 inches.

Hop, Step, Jump — The minimum qualifying distance was 209 feet 11.74 inches. Walter Ashbaugh, Cornell University athlete from East Liverpool, O., and Jim Gerhardt of San Antonio, Tex., qualified for the final of the hop, step and jump in the first half of the field.

Ashbaugh cleared 47 feet 10.41 inches in the triple jump and Gerhardt 49 feet, 1.77 inches.

George Shaw of New York, third American entry, failed to qualify when he fouled on the third try.

A distance of 47 feet 8.44 inches as required to qualify. None of the Americans is expected to be a serious title contender.

Bill Kerslake of Euclid, Ohio, American heavyweight wrestler, as eliminated right at the start of the final day of mat competition.

Kerslake, starting with three demerits, lost a decision to Bert Underander of Sweden. It takes five demerits to eliminate a contestant in wrestling.

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Plywoodmen Defeat Vets; Motors Win

Umpqua Plywood moved into a tie for third place in the Industrial League softball race at Veterans Field Tuesday night, but the crucial sixth-place playoff berth was still hanging in a balance.

Umpqua Plywood and Vets Employees packed all the action in the first three innings of a make-up game last night, and the Plywoodmen won, 7-5. Meanwhile, Smith Motors defeated Roseburg Sand and Gravel, 13-2, to move into a sixth-place tie with Moose Lodge.

A revised schedule pits the two sixth-place teams tonight to determine the last playoff berth in the Industrial League tournament. The other five teams already in the stable are: Scherner Bros., Melrose, Youngs Bay, Umpqua Plywood and Veterans Employees.

Smith Motors pushed its way into a chance for the final playoffs by blasting 17 hits off Larry Kinzry, who just Monday night held Barcus Sales to two hits. The Motorsmen crowded 10 runs and 12 hits into the first three innings.

Five Sand and Gravel errors helped the Smith Motor cause in the initial two innings. Dick De Bernardi homered for the winners in the seventh inning.

After all 12 runs had been squeezed into the first three innings by Umpqua Plywood and Vets Employees, opposing pitchers Dick Ballantyne and Bert Kidder settled down to stifle scoring the rest of the game.

A triple by Ballantyne in the first inning drove in the first two runs for Umpqua. Then Kidder doubled to bring in his team's only run in the first inning. But Bill Reeder sent the Plywoodmen surging ahead in the second with a grand-slam homer for four runs.

The Vets came back valiantly with three runs in the bottom of that frame, but it wasn't good enough. Each team scored a run in the third. Ballantyne walked in the Vets third-inning run by issuing free passes to four consecutive men.

Ballantyne gave up only five hits, seven in the first three innings.

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Tigers Win 1-0; N.Y. Raps Indians

Baseball fans looked back to Tuesday night's thrill-packed action and cracked "what, no no-hitter?"

That's about the only thing that didn't occur in the Major Leagues. And that, too, came within one pitch of being accomplished.

The star of that pitching feat was Virgil Trucks, already the author of the American League's sole no-hitter this season. The Detroit Tiger righthander gave up just one hit, a single by Eddie Yost, in hurling the Tigers to a 1-0 victory over the Washington Senators.

Yost's hit came on Trucks' first pitch of the game. It was a slow-moving grounder between short and third. Trucks held Washington hitless May 15, winning 1-0.

Other highlights included:

New York's Yankees swept a double header from the vanishing Indians before 57,666 crushed Cleveland fans, 7-3 and 8-1, to increase their first place margin over Boston's Red Sox to five games.

Bobby Shantz continued on his way to his 30-victory goal, pitching the Philadelphia Athletics to a 3-2 win over the St. Louis Browns. Shantz yielded eight blows for his 17th triumph against three losses.

Dave Koslo registered his fifth straight success over the St. Louis Cardinals this season, his 12th in a row over them in three years as the New York Giants earned a 3-2 triumph on Hank Thomson's.

49er Coach Happy Over Agility Of McElhenry

MENLO PARK, Calif. — Veteran Coach Buck Shaw took a three-hour ponder at 30 of his San Francisco 49ers who showed up for their first 1952 training session and said "It's too early to tell."

Although only rookies were told to report Tuesday, 15 veterans also showed up.

Following the workout, McElhenry left by plane for Chicago to work out for the College All-Stars — Los Angeles Rams game next month.
