

'Return To Truth,' Pope Urges Russian People

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Pius, in his first apostolic letter to all the peoples of Russia, has appealed to them to "return to truth and to the right path."

"Undoubtedly," the Pontiff wrote, "we have condemned and rejected, as the duty of our office demands, the errors which the promoters of atheistic Communism teach and try to propagate to the greatest detriment and misfortune of the citizens."

But, he added, "we do not turn away" the persons who are in error.

"We desire that they should return to the truth and the right path," he said.
