

Chiefs Drop 16-2 Contest To Coos

Poor Chiefs. Roseburg baseball fortunes cranked a new low at North Bend last night. The hosting Lumberjacks loosed a withering 17-hit attack to blast the riddled Chiefs, 16-2, in an exhibition game. It was the third straight victory over the Chiefs by the Coos Bay-North Bend team.

While the hosts were scoring in every inning but the second, Lumberjack Ace Al Treichel boosted his pitching record to 7-1 with a classy three-hit performance. The Chiefs paraded everyone but the batboys to the mound to stop the ruthless Lumberjack attack, but all in vain.

Even Roseburg's vaunted fielding disappeared in the rush of Coos Bay - North Bend runs. The Chiefs committed eight errors, a new high in that department.

If a bright spot can be found for the locals, it was the eighth inning when they scored their first runs in 26 innings played against the hosts in 1952. Barney Koch and Ken Ayres, the only two Roseburg hitters, earned both for the Chiefs. Ayres blasted John Ferrell home with the first run with a double. Chuck Fiske walked and Koch lamed his second single of the game.

This was nearly two million dollars below the \$15,677,707 in bonds bought in a similar period in 1951.

2 More Records Fall At Olympics

HELSINKI — Two more Olympic records were broken Thursday, making it 14 in all in five days of track and field competition.

But for American athletes there was a comparatively quiet interlude after Wednesday's five-ring circus of record-wrecking.

All three American "whales" qualified for the final of the hammer throw after Josef Csermak of Hungary broke the Olympic record on his first toss.

But Henry Laskau of New York America's best heel-and-toe performer, was disqualified in the trial heat of the 10,000 meter walk in which Bruno Junk of Russia set a new Olympic mark, and S. Price King, Jr., of Berkeley, Calif., failed to qualify for the final, finishing dead last in his heat.

Csermak whirled the 16-pound hammer out 57.20 meter (187 feet .02 inches) to shatter the Olympic record of 185 feet 4.06 inches established in 1936 by Karl Hein of Germany.

That was the 13th record-breaking track and field performance of the 15th Olympic games, which saw five records smashed and two tied Wednesday.

Junk brought the total to 14 when he won his heat in the 10,000 meters walk in 45 minutes, 5.8 seconds. The former mark of 45:13.5 was set by John Mikaelsson of Sweden, who finished second to Junk, and surpassing his old record.

the hammer throw, Sam Filton of New York one-time Harvard athlete, led the Americans with a heave of 166 feet 9.63 inches.

Martin Engel of New York did 164 feet 1/2 inch and Bob Backus of New York 161 feet 11.73 inches.

They were required only to throw 160 feet 9.17 inches to qualify for the final Thursday afternoon.

Laskau, a refugee from Nazi Germany and now a New York business man, was disconsolate after his disqualification for failing to keep one foot in contact with the ground.

But Coach Brutus Hamilton said he would not protest.

"This is the best officiated meet I've ever seen," Hamilton said.

A number of other walkers also were disqualified. Laskau, holder of the world record in the mile walk, was expected to be among the leaders in the final.

Stratofortress Production's Increase Urged

WASHINGTON — W. L. Campbell, acting chairman of the Aircraft Production Board, recommended Wednesday that mass production of Boeing's eight-engine Stratofortress be boosted at the expense of other long-range bomber programs.

Campbell's recommendation, if adopted, would also continue the current heavy production of the six-jet Boeing B-47B and C models but would wipe out the Martin B-57A Canberra in favor of the Douglas B-66, an Air Force version of the Navy's A3D attack bomber.

Also wiped out by the recommendation would be production lines for such well-known airplanes as the Northrop F-89, Republic F-94C and Grumman F-9F and F-10F.

Such aircraft would give way to increased production of the Republic F-84F, North American F-86F and F-86D, the McDonnell F-2H and F-3H, and the Douglas F-4D-1 Skyraider.

Charges have been made in Congress and elsewhere that the services are buying too many types of airplanes. For the fiscal year ending next June, the Air Force has scheduled production of 39 different types and the Navy 27.

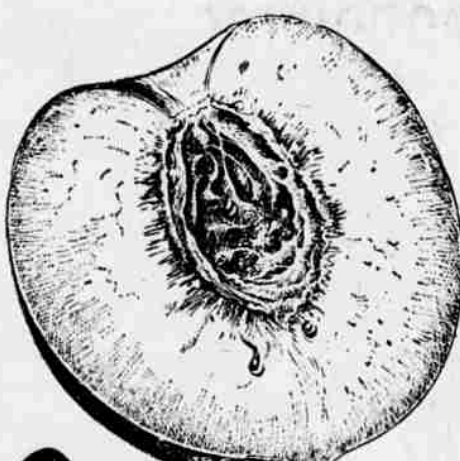
