## 78,000 War Veterans Now Receiving Bonus

SALEM — The Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs now has mailed out 78,000 World War II veterans bonus checks, and has caught up with the big backlog of applications.

H. C. Saffeld, bonus supervisor, said checks totaling 32 million dollars have been mailed. Payments now will be made as fast as bonus applications are approved.

## Anti-U.S. Riots Blamed On Reds

WASHINGTON — The State Department blamed the Communist demonstrations in Iran. It also officially expressed "horror" at the killing of more than a score unarmed persons by Red guerrillas in Indochina, near Saigon, Monday night.

"This government," said Press Officer Lincoln White, "cannot let pass without official notice its revulsion at Communist ruthlessness which, in order to further its aggressive purpose, does not hesitate to resort to the barbarous massacre of defenseless women and children."

Regarding anti-American aspects of the Iranian rioting, White said the demonstrations "appear to have arisen as a result of Communist participation in the demonstration which led to the fall of the Qavam government."

(Premier Qavam succeeded the Nationalist leader Premier Mossadegh as head of the government but lasted only a few days).

## Explosion in Mail Sack Injures U.P. Employee

SALT LAKE CITY — An explosion in a mail sack Wednesday night injured a Union Pacific Railroad employee and blew pieces of mail 200 feet.

Fred Bennett, 58, suffered injuries to his left eye and right side. The explosion was in one of a pile of five sacks just unloaded from a westbound train at the parcel post annex.

Some letters and pieces of mail stuck in crevices in the ceiling. Packages were blown 100 feet and lighter pieces of mail 200 feet.

Workers theorized that a bomb had been enclosed in the sack, either set for a timed explosion or rigged to go off when the sack was open. Postal authorities declined comment Thursday.

## Panama Missionary To Talk At Winston

A missionary from Panama and his family will talk at the Four Square Gospel Church in Winston at 7:45 p.m., DST, Friday.

The Rev. and Mrs. P. J. Tuttle and their two children, Carl and Carlene, will show slides of their work in Panama as well as describe it orally. They'll be dressed in native Panamanian costumes. Carl and Carlene will entertain with Spanish songs. A number of native articles the Tutttles have collected in Panama will be on display at the church.

The Tutttles are traveling through the United States telling of their work in Panama while on furlough from their missionary job.

## GOP Committee Head To Boss Ike's Campaign

DENVER — Arthur E. Summerfield of Michigan, new chairman of the Republican National Committee, will serve also as Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's campaign manager, the GOP presidential nominee's headquarters announced Thursday.

The announcement by Arthur H. Vandenberg Jr., Eisenhower's executive assistant, came shortly after Vandenberg arrived here from a series of New York conferences with Summerfield.

## Russians Offer Escort Service

BERLIN — The Russians announced Thursday they will assign sentries to the American military mission in Potsdam, Soviet headquarters outside Berlin, and "escort" American mission cars in the Soviet zone.

The announcement was made over the official East German ADN News Agency. The Soviet excuse that the Western powers had restricted activities of the Russian liaison mission at Frankfurt.

The Russians contended that West German police have for some time maintained sentry duty outside Russian liaison headquarters in West Germany. The official office in Frankfurt is the equivalent of the American mission in Potsdam.

The Americans have half a dozen officers and several enlisted men at Potsdam.

American officials said the Russian decision to escort the mission vehicles was merely making public what has been going on for some months.

## Lt. And Mrs. Madsen Leaving On Vacation

Lt. and Mrs. D. W. Madsen, who command the Roseburg Salvation Army Corps, and their two children are leaving next week on an extended vacation at Santa Cruz, Calif.

They will be accompanied south by Lt. Madsen's father, Lt. Col. Harold Madsen of East Oakland, Calif., who is here to conduct special services at the local chapel Saturday night and Sunday. Services will be continued at the Roseburg chapel in their absence.

## Eastern Oregon Power Rates Boost Sought

SALEM — Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel announced Thursday he would hold a hearing at the Ontario City Hall August 28 on the Idaho Power Company's application to increase its rates in Oregon.

The firm operates in Baker and Malheur counties. Heltzel said his engineers have not figured out yet how much the increase would be.

The company also is asking rate increases in Idaho and Nevada.

## Eugene Man Seriously Hurt In Traffic Crash

EUGENE — A head-on collision on the Pacific Highway three miles north of here critically injured Arthur G. Bumgardner, 49, Eugene, Thursday.

He was taken to the Sacred Heart Hospital after a collision with a Eugene creamery truck, driven by Everett C. Davis, Eugene, who was not hurt.

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## Hours May Shift For Liquor Sales

SALEM — The Oregon Liquor Commission will decide in August whether to change closing hours for beer and liquor sales.

The commission wants to know first what the public thinks about it. The commission said it might adopt a uniform 1 a.m. closing for taverns and nightclubs. Now, taverns close at that hour, but nightclubs can serve until 2:30 a.m.

The commission also is "thinking about preventing any beer sales before 1 p.m. Sunday. Beer sales now are allowed all day Sunday.

R. L. Alfstrom, chairman of the commission, said the commission would like public reaction to the proposal.

He explained the law doesn't allow the commission to stop all beer sales on Sundays, but it can change the hours.
