Australian Track Girl Sets New Olympic Dash Record

HELSINKI (AP) — Marjorie Jackson of Australia equalled the world record and broke the Olympic mark for the women's 200 meter dash Friday.

Miss Jackson, who already has won the 100 meter title in world record time, was timed in 23.6 seconds to tie the world record set by Stella Walsh in 1935.

This was the 20th Olympic record to be broken in men's and women's track and field events. Two have been tied. Four world records have been broken and one equalled.

Miss Jackson set her record in winning the third semi-final heat from Catherine Hardy of Fort Valley, Ga.

In the second semi-final Nadezhda Kynkina of Russia was timed in 24.3 seconds, also surpassing the Olympic record of 24.4 set by Fanny Blankers-Koen of Holland in 1948.

Miss Jackson won easily and might have run even faster. There was a cross wind blowing which made it uncertain whether the world record will be recognized.

Dolores Dwyer of Woodside, N. Y., failed to qualify in the fifth heat because of a mixup resulting from a false start.

Miss Dwyer did not hear the recall signal and ran fully 100 meters at full speed, with the crowd shouting at her to stop, before two officials ran onto the track and flagged her down.

She was given an extra minute of rest, but she gave up in the home stretch when she was hopelessly last. Eulalia Swajkowska of Poland won the heat.

Meanwhile Bob Mathias of Tulara, Calif., the defending Deane champion, put the shot 50 feet, 2.37 inches on his first try in the third event of the ten-event

competition.

With two chances to improve on that performance, Mathias had a sure 912 points in the shot put and 2,637 for the first three events.

After the 100 meter dash and shot put Friday morning, Mathias had 1,725 points, trailing Milton Campbell, the Plainfield, N. J., schoolboy, by ten points.

Campbell's first shot put was only 45 feet 6.84 inches, good for 739 points.

Mae Faggs of New York, third American girl sprinter, was eliminated when she finished third in a heat won by Daphne Hasenjager of South Africa with Winsome Cripps of Australia second.

The first two were both timed in 24.4 seconds, equalling the old Olympic record. Miss Faggs was about a yard back.

Mrs. Blankers-Koen gave up the defense of her third championship when she scratched from a heat won by Evgeniya Sechenova of Russia with Luella Law of Canada second. She has been ill and far below her top form.

HELSINKI (AP) — Horace Ashenbatter, the galloping FBI man from Glen Ridge, N. J., won the Olympic 3,000 meters steeplechase Friday. It was the first time an American has won the steeplechase since the modern Olympic games began.

Seattle and Los Angeles split a doubleheader, the Rainiers winning the opener by a 6 to 0 score. Al Widmar allowed only three hits. Los Angeles took the second, 2 to 1, in 12 innings. Leon Brinkopf's double brought home Bob Usher with the payoff run.

The Seattle Kid seemed to understand that the writers were puzzled by his casual gym work, wondered why he wasn't throwing more punches to prepare himself for the swarming Brockton, Mass. slugger.

"You fellows can't understand why I don't rip into my sparring partners," said Matthews. "You don't realize I've been in training all the time. Since Christmas I never had more than a week or 10 days off."

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Eugene Athletics Thump Chiefs, 4-0

Fifth Loss In Row For Local Nine

No joy in the Roseburg baseball camp again last night.

The Eugene Athletics of the Oregon State League made it a clean sweep over the Roseburg Chiefs, 4-0, on the brilliant two-hit pitching of Stan Aune.

It was the fifth consecutive loss for the Chiefs since they knocked over Coquille, 10-2, July 13.

This game at Eugene completed a home-and-home series for the two teams. The Athletics won the first meeting at Roseburg, 8-3, on June 18. Aune also won that one with a snappy six-hitter.

Slender Stan, who has been a now-and-then hurler for the Chiefs, appears to have the voodoo sign against his erstwhile Roseburg mates.

Two Errors

He reached his peak Thursday, and sensational errorless fielding by the Athletics left him no reason for worry. He gave Hal Zurcher a single in the fourth and allowed Chuck Fiske another in the eighth. He struck out six.

Meanwhile, Wally Beamer pitched a steady eight-hitter for the Chiefs, but the Athletics bunched hits nicely in three innings and took advantage of one of Roseburg's two errors to wrap up the game. The Beamer-brother battery got its first test in this game. Behind the plate, young brother Nub of Sutherlin High School made his first showing since officially donning Chief uniform.

Eugene got into the scoring column early. With two outs in the first inning, Ray Stratton, who alternates between Eugene and Bandon of the Southwestern Oregon League, doubled. Ron Phillips another two-league player from Eugene and Drain, singled him home with the winning run. Norvall Ritchey, also of Drain's Black Sox, brought in the second run with a double before the side was retired.

Right Field Fly

Mel Krause, a former Chief hurler, set up another run in the second with a single. He went to third on a play at first and scored on Ray Clayton's grounder to Beamer which had to be played at first.

The final Eugene run, in the eighth, was set up by John Linde's fumble of Charlie DeAutremont's fly in right field. DeAutremont came home later on Ron Phillips' second timely single.

With Roseburg's hitting power being skimmed off with depressing regularity by the professional leagues, the Chiefs have

staggered to a new low in the last week. As Manager Earl Sargent puts it, "You have to hit to win games."

Since July 16, the Chiefs have lost consecutively to the Cuban Giants (7-1), the Medford Studs twice (7-6 and 5-2), Coos Bay-North Bend (16-2) and now the Athletics. Since losing Ernie Velasquez and Dwane Helbig this week, the locals have managed only five hits in two games. Wednesday night Al Treichel of Coos Bay held the Chiefs to three hits.

Lack of hitting has plagued the Chiefs most of the season, but July has been the month of woes. In 11 games this month, they have won only three.

Glendale Cop Uses Tear Gas To Halt Riot At Ball Game

Glendale comes up with the hottest baseball news this week in Douglas County, and certainly the most colorful this year.

The Glendale Loggers play in the amateur Rogue Valley League and last Sunday had a double header with Cave Junction.

The Cave Junction squad won the first game, 6-1, but a minor tiff under the scorching afternoon sun set tempers afire for a knock-down-drag-out battle in the second game.

By the third inning of the second game, Glendale had taken a hefty 9-3 lead. It was at that point that "temper exploded," according to Glendale's News-Review correspondent.

She gives her account as follows: "Tiger Smith of Cave Junction was sent to the bench by Umpire

Lief Edson. From here on, versions differ, but it seems that the following things occurred.

First, a blow was struck on the sidelines in an argument over the decision.

Peace makers were mistaken for partisans of the victim, and friends of the striker joined in battling the would-be peace makers.

One man started into the fray armed with a ball bat. He was disarmed by another spectator who reached over from the side, jerked the bat out of his hands, and sent it flying some distance away and out of reach.

By this time, some say, 10 to 12 people, among them a woman, were exchanging blows in haphazard fashion.

Glendale's marshal, Leroy Hawks, tried in vain to quell the row, and like previous peace makers, was himself being embroiled. Then, with the fight fast assuming riot proportions, Hawks fired a tear gas shell into the melee and put a quick stop to active hostilities.

Before hostile groups could reform, reinforcements for the side of law and order came in the form of State Patrolman Virgil Simpson, who drove up as close to the fight as possible and lent a hand to hard-pressed local forces. Order was restored, but the game was not resumed, and Glendale claimed the victory."

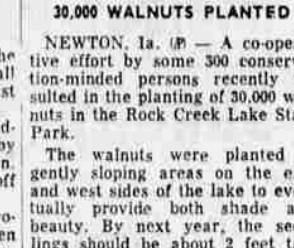
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
