

Friendly Scuffle Turns Into Shooting Affray

BAKER (AP) — What started as a friendly scuffle turned first into a fist fight, and then into a shooting in which two brothers were wounded here early Friday.

Patrolmen Chris Schaeberlin and Dave Gray said Luke Molich, 27, started the scuffle in a Baker cafe, and that soon led to a fight with Luke and his brother Bob, 23, taking on four other men.

Schaeberlin and Gray said they responded to a call and in subduing the Molich brothers accidentally shot both. Luke was hospitalized in serious condition with a stomach wound. Bob suffered a stomach

Hog Ban Doesn't Affect Oregon

SALEM (AP) — The Texas embargo against importation of hogs from Oregon and 13 other states won't make any difference to Oregon, the State Division of Animal Industry said Friday.

"This order won't have any effect on Oregon whatever because Oregon doesn't export hogs," a spokesman said.

He said there is no vesicular exanthema in Oregon hogs. That is the disease that prompted Texas to order the embargo.

He said quite a number of hogs shipped into Oregon from the midwest for slaughter have been found to have the disease.

Oregon issued an order a week ago that no hogs can be shipped here unless they are accompanied by certificates showing they are free from disease.

The disease is prevalent in the midwest, the department spokesman said, adding he expects the federal government will take action to isolate it by quarantine or other regulations.

Auto Industry Loses Billion In Steel Strike

DETROIT (AP) — The steel strike cost the automobile industry close to a billion dollars, Ward's Automotive Reports estimated Friday.

Asserting that some three weeks or more of idleness faces the industry, the statistical agency said the auto makers will have lost approximately 400,000 cars and about 120,000 trucks because of the steel tie up.

Prisoner Swap Dispute Still Prevents Truce

MUNSAN, Korea (AP) — The three-week news blackout was lifted from the Korean armistice talks Friday, showing the deadlock over prisoner exchange — final issue blocking a truce — still unbroken.

Despite a United Nations offer to return an additional 15,000 captives to the Communists, 13 off the record meetings since July 4 proved "completely fruitless," said Maj. Gen. William K. Harrison Jr.

"We are no nearer a solution of the problem than we were on July 4," the chief Allied delegate said, but added:

"As long as we continue negotiations there is always hope, when the enemy proposed this morning that we go back into open sessions, I agreed heartily."

Starting Saturday proceedings will be made public daily as formerly.

The U. N. command said it refused to back down on its decision not to return forcibly any prisoner to the Communists. Only 83,000 of 170,000 allied-held POWs

want to be repatriated, Harrison said. This is an increase of 13,000 over the figure submitted to the Reds earlier, before screening of POWs was completed.

The Allies said the Communists insisted on the return of 118,000 prisoners, these include 20,000 Chinese captives of whom only 6,400 will return voluntarily.

North Korean Gen. Nam Il, the senior Red negotiator, conceded the prisoner exchange issue had become not a matter of principle, but of "lists and numbers." He urged the U. N. to present a "figure" "approaching reality." But the Allies said Nam never reconciled his statements and proposals with the Allied report that almost three fourths of the Chinese in Allied prisoner camps would resist repatriation.
