

Mathias Builds Olympics Lead

HELSINKI (AP) — Bob Mathias, the defending champion from Tulare, Calif., increased his lead in the Olympic decathlon competition after seven events Saturday while asserting other athletes continued the business of methodically wrecking Olympic records.

Mathias, who set a world record in the American decathlon tryouts, dominated the two events run off Saturday morning.

After seven events, he had a total of 6,009 points heading the three-man American delegation at the top of the scoring list. Milton

Juniors Win 5-2, 7-4 In Two Series

Coach Hal Zurcher's Roseburg Pee Wees took a lead in the double home - and - home series with Fronto Loggry's Myrtle Creek Pee Wees by sweeping three games from the visitors at Finlay Field Friday.

In a well-played game between teams in the 12-to-14 year age group, the locals won, 5-2. The Roseburg's 9-to-11 group won, 7-4, in a three inning game. The Roseburg youngsters in the younger age group who were not on the regular team went an hour before getting through the second inning to win from a comparable Myrtle Creek group, 11-9.

With LeRoy Sargent and Lee Burghardt pacing the way in the older group's five-inning game, the Roseburg team came up with its best game this season. Sargent pitched a steady game in which he struck out eight. Burghardt paced the batters with a homer and a double. Roseburg scored two runs in the first and three in the third. Myrtle Creek posted its brace of runs in the fourth.

This is the second sweep in three legs of the double home-and-home competition for Roseburg. It won its last home set, but lost a set at Myrtle Creek last week.

Beamer Was Batting Leader

Catcher Nub Beamer, who recently moved into the Roseburg Chief baseball camp, played in the amateur Evergreen League just long enough to take over the batting leadership.

The young Sutherland High School backstop rapped out seven hits in 13 times at bat to bow out of the Evergreen loop with a hefty .538 average. According to the Sutherland Sun, Beamer did not play long enough, however, to get a shot at the season's end. The Sun states that a batter must have batted at least 15 times and must

be listed with a League team at the end of the season.

Another new Roseburg man was also high on the Evergreen batting standards before moving to the Chiefs. He is Ken Ayres with a .428 average. He batted safely in 12 of 28 trips to move into fifth place.

Both men played for Sutherland's Chevrolet in the amateur circuit.

Beside Beamer, only Phil Tedford of last-place Glendale, is still above the .500 mark. He has 15 hits in 30 times at bat for an even .500. Glen Cox of Elkton, who led the League much of this year, dropped to third when he was held to a single hit against Sutherland last week. He is now batting a healthy .487, however.

This weekend, the only slated game is Elkton at Sutherland. Elkton snagged the first-half championship last week by dumping the Sutherland team, 5-2. Sunday's game will complete the League action of the two games against each other.

Oakland moved into a second half tie with Elkton last Sunday by downing Glendale, 11-3. Each has a single win in the second half.

Ignace Heinrich of France, second to Mathias in the 1948 Olympic decathlon at London and the leading threat to American supremacy here, dropped out of the competition after six events because of a twisted ankle. Sepp Hipp of Germany moved into the fourth spot with 5,044 points.

In the first of three decathlon events, run off during the afternoon, the United States 400 meter relay team with 200-meter champion Andy Stanfield running the anchor leg, breezed to an easy victory in the first qualifying heat. France was second.

The American team was timed at 40.3 seconds, a half second slower than the Olympic record.

Stanfield came home a good five yards in front of the French anchor man. The first three runners were Dean Smith of Texas, Harrison Dillard of Cleveland, the Olympic high hurdles champion, and Lindy Remigio of Manhattan, the Olympic 100 meters champion. Most of the American lead was gained by Dillard, who ran with explosive speed.

The 24th Olympic record of the regular track and field competition was broken right at the start of the qualifying trials in the women's shot put. Kijivda Tochenova of Russia threw the shot 45 feet 6.45 inches to shatter the Olympic mark of 45 feet 1.33 inches set by Frances's Michelen Ostermeyer in 1948.

The swimmers, starting their part of the Olympic program, got right into the record breaking act. Eva Novak of Hungary, world record holder in the women's 200-meter breast stroke, smashed the Olympic record in her specialty when she won her trial heat in two minutes, 54 seconds. The old Olympic mark was 2:57.2 by N. Van Vliet of Holland. Miss Novak's world record is 2:48.5.

Another Hungarian girl, Eva Szekely, also bettered the old Olympic breast stroke mark with a 2:55.1 performance. Two American entries failed to qualify when Gail Peters of Washington finished sixth in one heat and Judy Cornell of Portland, Ore., seventh in another.

Oakland Near Top; Beats SF 6-5, 8-3

Oakland's fence busting A's aren't daunted one whit by the blistering pace being set by the Hollywood Stars in the Pacific Coast League race.

In fact, while Sacramento cooled the red hot Stars 8-3 Friday night, Oakland moved within a half game of first place with a double victory over San Francisco 6-5 and 8-3.

Other games saw Seattle nip Los Angeles 6-5 and Portland drop San Diego 5-1.

Oakland made good use of the home run to take the first game in extra innings and the same weapon capped the nightcap.

At the end of the regulation seven innings of the opener, the score stood 4-4. San Francisco went ahead 5-4 in the tenth, but Lloyd Christopher tied the count with a homer in the Oaks' half. Then Oakland loaded the sacks and Center Fielder Sam Chapman singled in the winning run.

Spider Jorgensen socked two round trippers in the nightcap and Christopher came through with another.

Meanwhile Hollywood, which had won 13 of its last 14 games, fell apart in the field and committed four errors responsible for six unearned Sacramento runs. Manager Joe Gordon helped his club's cause with two homers. His four master in the ninth highlighted a four-run rally that iced the contest.

San Diego, the leader through the first half of the season, continued to slip as Fred Sanford did a neat handoffing job for Portland in taking his 12th victory of the campaign. After hurling shut-out ball for eight innings, he needed help in the ninth when the Padres threatened to rally.

Indians Take Yankees Twice

The Cleveland Indians, counted out as a pennant threat early this week, are back in business once again.

When the league-leading New York Yankees dumped the Indians 7 1/2 games off the pace by sweeping a doubleheader Tuesday, it looked like curtains for the Tribe. But the Indians bounced back, knocking the Yanks off twice. Friday night they whipped Washington, 4-2, and took over third place from the Senators, 4 1/2 games behind New York and only 1/2 back of second place Boston.

The Yanks, meanwhile, suffered their third straight loss as they bowed to the Tigers in Detroit, 2-1. The Red Sox remained four games astern of the Bombers by dropping a 3-2 squeaker to the St. Louis Browns. The Philadelphia Athletics and Chicago White Sox divided a two-night doubleheader, the White Sox winning the opener, 5-0 and the A's the second game, 8-4.

In the National League, the New York Giants defeated Cincinnati, 3-1, in the major's only day game and climbed to within 5 1/2 games of Brooklyn's pace-setting Dodgers. The St. Louis Cardinals trounced the Dodgers, 8-4, while in other

Industrial Wins Over Church 14-2

The Industrial League softball aces battered two Church League pitchers with 12 hits to notch an easy 14-2 victory and even the series in the second annual YMCA All-Star game.

He allowed only one run and gave up only two hits in the next three innings. He struck out six. Bert Young of Melrose finished off the job with a two-hit performance in the last three innings.

The Industrialists wrapped up the game in the third inning for Smith. In the six-run uprising that inning, they batted completely around the lineup. L. Langley highlighted the flareup with a two-run homer. His teammates completed the job with four more runs on three more hits, a walk and an error.

Dick Ballantyne heaped on another brace of runs with a homer in the fifth. Dick Nichols added three more with a timely bases-loaded triple in the sixth to put the game out of reach.

The Church League's Al Hooten lasted six innings before giving up the chores to Howard Cox. In his six-inning stint, Hooten allowed nine hits and 11 runs.

Coach Wally Richardson's charges lost their first game of the year in dropping a 5-0 decision to hosting North Bend. The Douglas County squad has one more chance in the double elimination playoff, however. It meets Klamath Falls today at 1 p.m. DST.

Roseburg's Chuck Verrell, who bolstered the Myrtle Creek pitching staff, hurled an outstanding game, but unhappy errors by his teammates gave away all but one of North Bend's runs.

The young Roseburg fastballer struck out 12 men and walked 5 while giving up 6 hits. He was relieved in the ninth by Drain's Paul Miller, who was also added to the Myrtle Creek roster for strength. Miller gave up a hit and a run in his one-inning stint.

Meanwhile, North Bend's Jim Lehl had the Myrtle Creek batters on his hip. He gave up only 3 hits in the game while striking out 11 and walking 4. Dick Joslyn of Drain pounded out a double in the second. Dick Komp rapped a single in the sixth and Roseburg's Steve Dancho scratched a single in the ninth.

North Bend earned its only run in the second inning. After Verrell had walked Dave Jasman and Don Graham, Lehl himself singled to bring in the run.

Lehl also figured in North Bend's big fifth. He reached first on an error before Lee King Struck out for what should have been the third out. With this extra life, the North Bend batters rapped three consecutive singles off Verrell to score three runs.
