FOUL CALL STIRS FURY

Mob Attacks American Referee At Basketball Tilt's End At Olympiad

HELSINKI (AP) — American referee Vincent Farrell was mobbed by players and spectators, flogged by a kick in the groin and then clipped on the cheekbone in a riot at the end of the Uruguay-France Olympic basketball game Monday.

Farrell was carried from the floor by police and given emergency medical aid.

A doctor said Farrell, from Newark, N. J., would have to rest for several hours before he could decide whether any further treatment would be necessary.

"A spectator kicked me," Farrell said as he lay on a cot in a first aid room beneath the basketball floor.

"A couple of Uruguay players charged me but I got rid of them. Then this guy from the crowd went wild and landed his kick. That sent me sprawling," Farrell said. Willard Grein of the United States and president of FIBA, the International Basketball Association, said no action would be taken immediately against anyone.

He said Farrell's future as a referee in the tournament depended on the referee's condition.

"If I can run I'll work," Farrell said, "and I think I'll be able to run."

Foul Call Enrages

Farrell got in hot water with the Uruguayans a minute before the game ended.

Playing with only three men and trailing 66-64, Uruguay broke loose and tied the score.

Farrell whistled loudly and motioned toward the French free throw line indicating a foul.

The Uruguay bench started to storm the floor, chasing Farrell but officials held them back.

After five minutes of yelling and pushing Farrell got it across in sign language that the goal was good but that the shooter had fouled a Frenchman after the shot.

That meant the score was tied. France took the ball out of bounds and Jacques Desmarte threw up an easy lay-up to win the game, 68-66.

Then the storm broke for sure. The Uruguayans went for Farrell and the crowd joined in.

Death, Ruin Ride On Hurricane

SALEM, Mass. (AP) — A brief, violent line squall with hurricane wind gusts up to 85 miles an hour smashed through this famed old seaport Sunday leaving four known dead and at least three missing. The victims were in small craft capsized in the harbor.

The squall, accompanied by a driving rain, lightning and hail, struck a dozen Essex county communities, capsizing small craft, cations lines and uprooting trees, knocking out power and communications, and felling telephone and power poles.

Some 200 craft capsized in Salem harbor which bore the brunt of the 20-minute storm. The Coast Guard and private motor launches rescued about 100 persons in small boats.

More than 30 persons were listed as missing at one time but they were tracked down during the day at their homes in scattered sections of Massachusetts or in refuge on the numerous islands in the harbor.

Miss Oregon Title Won By Eugene Girl

SEASIDE (AP) — Mary Lou Teague of Eugene, a green-eyed brunette, will represent Oregon in the Miss America contest at Atlantic City this September.

She was selected Sunday from among 12 girls seeking the title of Miss Oregon and the \$300 scholarship which was presented by Seaside residents.

Loretta Mason, 18, Hermiston, was second with Marilyn Lundell, 18, The Dalles, third.

More Funds For School Construction Allocated

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government Monday tabbed 17 million more dollars for school construction projects in federally-affected defense areas.

Earlier this month, 67 million dollars was earmarked for this purpose. The new allocations brings the total reserved for school construction to \$44 million dollars, still less than half the 195 million dollars appropriated for this purpose by the 82nd Congress.

Harrison A. (Harry) Winston, 69, life-long resident of Winston and well-known fruit and bean grower, died Saturday at the Douglas Community Hospital following a short illness. He was born at Winston, the son of William Chauncey and Agnes Wright Winston, pioneer settlers of that community and for whose family the town of Winston received its name. He was married to Ulah Renner on July 21, 1915. He operated a large pear orchard at Winston and had one of the most productive bean gardens in the state.

Mr. Winston was a member of Roseburg Lodge No. 326, BPO, Elks.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Ulah Winston of Winston, a son, Attorney Harrison R. Winston, Roseburg, and three daughters, Mrs. C. J. (Beverly) Browne, Eugene, Ore., Mrs. James (Virginia) Gray, Corvallis, and Mrs. Lowell (Ulah) Rhoden, Roseburg. He is also survived by a brother, Fred Winston, Estacada, Oregon; and four sisters, Mrs. Winnifred McCracken, Lamoni, Wash., Mrs. Mattie McNabb, Portland, Mrs. Edna Smith, Riddle, Ore., and Mrs. Ruth Davidson, Portland, and eight grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary, Tuesday July 29, at 11 a.m. D.S.T. The services will be read by Harry Wallen, First Reader of the First Church Christ, Scientist, Roseburg. Concluding services and interment will follow in the Civil Bend cemetery at Winston.

CHICAGO — By the time the 1956 conventions roll around, Oregon undoubtedly will be on the full television circuit and viewers will share an inside seat on everything but the smoke-filled rooms.

If the big brains in the networks wield any influence, one of two things will happen: either the conventions will streamline themselves or the them in the cutting rooms.

This year, both conventions received full coverage... that is, every minute of the proceedings at the stockyards was on the air, with switches to the open committee meetings progressing in the hotels downtown. But as somebody remarked, there is such a thing as too full coverage.

The Republicans had all the television cameras mounted on platforms built out from the sides of the huge meeting hall. Complaints poured in about movement in the background which obscured the view of the main speakers.

The Democrats built a camera platform in the center of the floor to correct this. It must have been a dizzying job, as photographers were confined to a narrow cat-walk swung over the heads of the South Carolina and Arizona delegations. It also cracked the heads of the girls who were carried aloft through the demonstrations. All it

did was to pick up the constant commotion on the rostrum.

The Democrats announced they were going to streamline their convention, but somebody forgot to pass the word along.

They were going to have short speeches. The keynote was so long that every good Democrat in the hall caught up on the sleep he missed the night before. They were going to be on time. No session got under way less than an hour from the announced starting time. There were going to be no fights for the public to witness.

The Democrats rolled up their sleeves and put on a first-class re-play of the War Between the States. However, viewers will long remember seeing Franklin Roosevelt Jr. give the classic over-the-head handshake as Virginia was seated; Sen. Paul Douglas

Roseburg Couple Drowns In N. Tenmile Lake

J. Harbison, Wife Victims Of Tragedy

Disappear After Leap From Leaky Boat; Two Companions Rescued

A midnight catfishing expedition brought death to a Roseburg couple early Sunday morning in North Tenmile Lake, located between Coos Bay and Reedsport.

Drowned were John Reed Harbison, 39, and his wife, Mildred Poole, 35, of Rt. 3 Box 110, Medford. Harbison was a truck driver for the Douglas County Flour Mill.

Dragging operations failed to locate the bodies.

Fishing with the Harbisons were another Roseburg couple, Kilane Miller Matthews, 38, and his wife, Judith, 32, 1293 Ball St. They managed to swim to shore.

The couples were just returning from fishing shortly after midnight when the boat began to fill with water, says Mrs. Matthews.

Both couples jumped from the boat, holding air cushions. The Matthews began to swim in one direction, the Harbisons in another.

Neither of the Harbisons answered her calls, Mrs. Matthews said.

She and her husband were in the water until about 2 a.m. They were about 100 feet from shore when the accident occurred, but due to the darkness swam clear across the lake to the opposite shore.

A watchman, Arthur Fugua, and Jim Walter, heard the Matthews as they neared shore and went out after them with a boat.

After calling the State Police, the Matthews immediately went out looking for the Harbisons. Seeing no sign of them, they returned about 4 a.m. They searched later in the morning but stopped, due to fog.

Wind Halls Dragging

Dragging operations were carried on by the Coos County sheriff's office, the Oregon State Police and the Coos County coroner from about 11 a.m. until late afternoon. Coroner Brewer Mills said high winds, combined with a snaggy bottom, forced them to stop.

No further attempts will be made to recover the bodies due to the snags and the wide area. They'll float to the top in about a week, Mills estimates.

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Death Ends Reign Of Peron's Wife



EVA PERON Death Strikes Early

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, (AP) — Argentina's humble thousands paid grieving homage Monday to Eva Peron. They waited four abreast in mile-long queues for a 20-second walk past the body of their president's wife and political partner, who died Saturday night after a long illness.

At the age of 30—according to her official count—the slim beauty was regarded as the most powerful woman in politics in the world.

Eight persons were killed and scores injured as thousands crowded up to pay last homage to Eva where she was lying in state. Most of the injured only faintly but many suffered fractured legs or arms.

Woman Plunges To Death Trying Parachute Jump

BUDD LAKE, N. J. (AP) — A pretty mother, her parachute failing to open, plunged 2,500 feet to her death Sunday in an initiation for a parachuting club formed by her husband.

It was a scene of confusion and near-hysteria as 24-year-old Mrs. Dorothy Berard of Harrison tumbled from the small plane, clawed desperately at the parachute and finally fell in a cabbage patch.

"I killed her, I killed her," sobbed her grief-stricken husband, Joseph, who organized the Sky Divers Club, a parachuting-for-fun group. He collapsed when she fell.

Just before Mrs. Berard, mother of a four-month-old daughter, went up, her husband considered refusing to let her make the jump because of a series of minor mishaps earlier.

But she reassured him by saying, "don't worry, honey, I'll be all right."

He made the first jump of the day and suffered bruises about the head.

Berard is an ex-paratrooper with 74 jumps to his credit.

A few minutes later, a small plane used by other club members crashed, but no one was hurt.

Then Mrs. Sarah Hazelt of Union jumped and was knocked unconscious when she hit her head while landing. Mrs. Berard's fatal plunge climaxed the series of accidents.

Said one of the members: "this ends the club forever."

Gov. Stevenson Will Campaign In Oregon

PORTLAND (AP) — Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois will campaign in Oregon for the presidency, delegates returning from the Democratic national convention reported.

Howard Morgan, Democratic state chairman, and C. Girard Davidson, an alternate delegate, arrived by plane from Chicago Sunday.

Morgan said he had received personal assurance from Stevenson that he would be in Oregon before the November elections.

Death Claims Mongrel Dog 104 Years Old

CHARLTON, Mass. (AP) — Fanny, a mongrel dog, died Sunday night at the ripe old dogdom age of 140 years.

She was believed — and there was nobody to dispute it — one of the oldest dogs in New England. Fanny died while undergoing a major operation in the hospital of Dr. M. Terry Mills.

An average dog's life span is between 10 and 14 years and dog authorities claim seven years of human's life is comparable to one of a dog's life.

Full Output Week Hence Steel's Goal

Strike Set, However, In Aluminum Industry; Teamsters Still Out

The steel industry strove Monday toward its goal of full production in a week, after settlement last Thursday of a 55-day strike of CIO Steelworkers.

A settlement believed certain to be ratified by AFL unions was expected to end the two months strike of 6,000 West Coast sailors Monday and send the first of 100 idled ships back into the commerce lanes of the Pacific.

But the CIO Steelworkers called a new strike, to begin Tuesday, in 10 Eastern, Southern and Midwest plants of the Aluminum Industry Corporation of America. The affected plants employ 15,000 workers.

In St. Louis, federal mediators planned another attempt to settle the 27-day AFL Teamsters strike which has idled 9,500 employees of trucking companies.

The 2,400 striking truck drivers demand a 40-hour week, instead of the present 48, and a wage increase of 31 cents hourly to bring the average pay to \$1.90 an hour. They rejected over the week end a management proposal of a 44-hour week this year and a 40-hour week the next year, plus a 20-cent hourly pay raise now and 10 cents more a year hence.

100 Ships Await Green Light

The agreement expected to end the West Coast maritime strike calls for a 5 per cent wage increase, overtime benefits and a reduction of the 48-hour work week at sea to 44 or 40 hours, depending upon classification.

Union members were to vote on the proposal Monday in San Francisco, Portland, Seattle and Los Angeles where more than 100 ships have been laid up at a loss of 20 million dollars to 24 shipping lines.

An ALCOA management announcement said CIO Steelworkers called a strike in 10 plants after the company rejected union demands it said exceeded "by several cents" the settlement in the steel industry. ALCOA settled with AFL workers in other plants last week on a basis of wage increase and other benefits it said amounted to 24 cents an hour.

Air Draft Hurls Woman To Death From Plane

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — The door of a Pan American Airlines Stratocruiser blew open in flight Sunday and the sudden draft sucked an American-born woman out of her seat and to her death in the Atlantic ocean 12,000 feet below.

The victim was identified as Mrs. Marie Elizabeth Westbrook Capellaro, daughter of Mrs. Bessie Machris of Los Angeles, Calif., and wife of Emilio Capellaro, a banker of Rome, Italy.

She was accompanying Capellaro on a business trip.

'Flying Saucers' For 2nd Time Near Capital Of U.S. Send Jets On Futile Quest

WASHINGTON (AP) — Radar — which normally doesn't show something that isn't there — has picked up "flying saucers" near the nation's capital for the second time within a week.

Jet fighter pilots searched the skies without directly contacting anything during the six hours that four to 12 unidentified objects intermittently appeared on radar screens at Washington National Airport and nearby Andrews Air Force Base.

One pilot said he saw four lights approximately 10 miles away and slightly above him but they disappeared before he could overtake them. Later, the same pilot said, he saw "a steady white light" five miles away that vanished in about a minute.

So far as could be determined, this was the first time jets have been sent on the trail of such sky ghosts.

Officials carefully avoided mentioning "flying saucers," just as they did when radar picked up seven or eight unidentified objects near Washington last Monday. But the Air Force was expected to add the report to its long list of saucer sightings, which officials say are

U. S. Senator Brien McMahon, Key Figure In Nation's Atomic Energy Program, Passes Away

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Brien McMahon, 48, a Connecticut Democrat with a passion for peace and a key role in the nation's atomic energy program, died Monday of a spinal ailment.

Illness prevented his campaigning as a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Friends from Connecticut gave him 16 votes anyhow at the Democratic National Convention last week. From his hospital bed, McMahon ordered his name withdrawn.

McMahon was a brand new senator in 1945 when the first atomic bomb devastated Hiroshima.

Awesomely impressed, he decided this new force must be leashed to save civilization, and dedicated his life to that goal.

Despite his relative inexperience, he became chairman of the Senate House Atomic Energy committee—the voice of Congress on all atomic affairs, the highest lay authority on the subject.

He first won fame as chief of the Justice Department's criminal division.

Ended Kentucky Terrorism

In 1933, he personally moved into a bloody Harlan County, Ky., during a war between coal mine operators and union labor.

McMahon was shot at from ambush but unhurt. Two of his key witnesses were slain and the homes of two others were dynamited, but the New Englander restored law and order after spectacular trials for terrorism.

In New Haven, Republican Gov. John Lodge of Connecticut can name a successor to take over McMahon's senate seat only until the November general election.

Both Republicans and Democrats are expected to hold special state nominating conventions to select candidates for the full unexpired term.

Astoria Youth Admits Slaying Foster Mother

ASTORIA (AP) — Sheriff Paul Kearney said Sunday that Ward Wenger, 20, had admitted the slaying of his foster mother, Mrs. Marie Wenger, 47, here last July 10.

Kearney and Joseph Cooney, juvenile officer, arrived in Astoria with Wenger, and the sheriff dictated a statement he said Wenger made on the trip from Paris, Tex. The statement was turned over to the district attorney's office.

In it, Kearney said Wenger, charged with first degree murder, told him he waited behind a door for his foster mother to come home, then attacked her with a hammer. Kearney said the youth was "all mixed up" and could give no clear motive for his actions.

Kearney quoted Wenger as saying he took from his foster mother's purse \$20 he had paid her in room rent. The remainder of the \$35 he had when he left Astoria in his foster mother's car he had earned at a flour mill, he said.

Wenger was arrested in Clarksburg, Tex., after an automobile accident. He telephoned Astoria to ask his insurance agent to pay the repair bill. The agent notified police and Wenger was arrested.

He was jailed at Paris, Kearney drove the Wenger car back.

Winners Listed In Whiskilantes

Al Muma won first prize for the bushiest beard. His measured nine inches across. Second prize went to Ed Waldron.

Alfred Hicks' flaring whiskers were judged the most unique. Ray Lively took second honors.

Leo Dunning's beard was judged most colorful. Prize for the scrappiest went to Harold Cacy. Sgt. Lyle Weacott was second in this section of the contest.

Tioga Burn Fire Being Controlled

Three hundred weary fire fighters were slowly winning their battle today to get fire lines around the raging forest blaze that has burned over nearly 900 acres of timber land in the old Williams River burn between Reason and Tioga.

Ivan Young, assistant warden of the Coos Forest Protective Association, said this morning, the fire was "partially controlled."

Nine caterpillars and seven tank trucks were being used with logging crews from various timber operations in the area to fight the blaze.

About 40 Camas Valley men were still on the fire lines of the blaze that started Thursday and has claimed the life of Camas Valley logger Joe Johnson.

"We still have to burn out sections of some lines," said the fire boss, Young, "but barring a stiff wind, it looks like we'll have it licked in another day."

Man Slays Wife, 4 Small Children

BRIDGEPORT, Wash. (AP) — Four small children and their young mother were slain as they prepared to leave for church services early Sunday and police arrested the father, who Chief Lyle Prothero said admitted killing his family because "the minister said God is a square shooter."

Being held in connection with the multiple slaying that left the modest family home on the outskirts of this North Central Washington community a bloody shambles was Matthias Swearson, 27, a laborer.

Dead were his 25-year-old wife, Joyce, and the couple's four children, Ray, 4, Peggy, 3, Karen, 2, and Matthias, six months. Three had been shot, the others' throats had been slashed.

Prothero quoted Swearson as saying: "The Lord told me to take their lives and that I would join them later."

Swearson, bloody from self-inflicted wounds and naked to the waist, was arrested as he drove toward town in the family station wagon. He told arresting officers he was going to church.

Drunken Driver Fined, Jail Term Suspended

Austin Homer Counts of Port Orford, Calif., pleaded guilty in Municipal Court today to a charge of drunk driving and Judge Ira B. Riddle fined him \$150, gave him a 30-day suspended jail sentence and suspended his driving license for 30 days. He was being held in jail in lieu of paying the fine.

JUROR'S TROUBLES MOUNT

DENVER (AP) — A prospective juror, 33, told a U.S. District Court judge that he "couldn't be a fair juror because I've got too many troubles of my own to listen to someone else's trouble."

Judge Willis W. Ritter fined him \$50 for contempt of court. The judge told him that jury service "is a privilege, not a burden."
