Candidates To Beat Brush For Whistle Stop Votes

CHICAGO—Whistle-stops will become major metropolitan politics in 1952. The presidential nominating sessions are proving this fact.

Leaders of both parties, now busily mapping campaign strategies though still mopping their brows from hectic conventions, know now that every whistle-stop speech by any of the candidates will this year become major items on the daily political menu of the country's more than 60-million voters.

There have been no hiding places for politicians this year. Smoke-filled rooms were just as active as in yesterday's and just as fogged with industrious behind-the-scenes machinations. But this year every activity was mirrored by sight and sound to millions of people throughout the land—just as they occurred.

And the people reacted—much to the delight of telephone and telegraph officials but to the chagrin of politicians. The Illinois Bell telephone system averaged 2,300 calls daily to delegates from constituents back home. Western Union was swamped with messages for Melegates and kept a score of messengers busy on the convention floor alone scurrying back and forth. Delegates averaged two to three hours daily dictating letters, making phone calls and preparing telegrams outlining the reasons why they voted as they did, or why they didn't vote as the folks back home wanted.

One delegate, a governor of a major state, told this correspondent that he felt he was "back home" though physically here in Chicago. This chief executive described the Democratic session—and it is descriptive, too, of the Republican meeting—as a "huge goulash bowl in which every action we made was clearly seen by the home folks."

Mail responses, too, was very heavy. But politicians expected that. What they did not anticipate, however, was the immediacy of responses via telephone and tele-

Gov. Stevenson May Not Get Vote Of His Divorced Wife

CHICAGO (AP)—The Democratic party has handed its presidential standard to Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, but he begins his campaign forewarned of one vote he might not get—that of his former wife.

Attractive Ellen Borden Stevenson, wealthy Chicago socialite and mother of their three sons, said she still intends to vote Republican in November—not for any personal reason but as a matter of political conviction.

But November is three months away.

Add her mother, Mrs. John Alden Carpenter of Chicago and Beverly, Mass., gave a hint her daughter might change her mind her daughter believes the Democrats have been in power long enough.

Mrs. Stevenson sent the governor a note. It read:

"Dear Adlai: Congratulations to the Democratic party for choosing the finest available Democrat for President. I know you will do your best for the American people. All good wishes to you personally."

She signed it "Ellen Borden Stevenson."

A divorce generally is considered a political strike against a candidate. Although the governor is not one to discuss his personal affairs, this may have been one reason for his reluctance to be the Democratic nominee for President.

Mrs. Stevenson, now 42, and a slim brunette, was regarded as one of Chicago's loveliest debutantes when she met Stevenson, then a rising young lawyer ten years her senior. Their marriage, in 1928, shortly after her presentation at the court of St. James in London, was one of the season's most brilliant social events.

After 21 years of married life, she obtained a Nevada divorce in 1949—shortly after he took office as governor—on the grounds of
