

Ike Confers With Golden Waffles Campaign Aides, Running Mate

DENVER (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, rested after a ten day vacation, held a long conference Monday with his new political chief of staff, Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire.

The Republican presidential nominee and Adams talked over campaign organizational problems. Among others present at the meeting at Eisenhower headquarters at the Brown Palace hotel, were Sen. Frank Carlson of Kansas, and Fred A. Seaton of Nebraska, advisors to the general, and Arthur H. Vandenberg, Jr., his executive assistant.

Eisenhower Press Secretary James C. Hagerity told newsmen the session was devoted to organization of the general's personnel staff and plans for liaison with the Republican National Committee and the National Citizens for Eisenhower Committee.

Sunday the general discussed campaign plans with his vice-presidential running mate, Sen. Richard Nixon of California.

Eisenhower and Nixon joined in predicting a Republican victory in November. Nixon said he was confident "we are going to have the victory for Gen. Eisenhower that the country needs."

Seated on a bench alongside the Senator, Eisenhower interrupted and told his 39-year-old running mate:

"You mean victory for the party and not just for me, my boy—and more important, victory for the country."

Golden Waffles Now In Season

Now is the time for your golden waffles to bloom with a variety of toppings. Here's a new and zesty trick right off the baby-food shelf. It gives a fruity filling very like the expensive and hard-to-find lingonberry jam. Called plums with tapioca, it comes either strained or unstrained. It is true fruit, slightly tart, and is inexpensive.

Allow 1 cup for a double-decker layer in the three 9-inch waffles yielded by the average recipe. The junior plums give a thicker filling than the strained, just as they are, or varied with 1 tablespoon each sugar and lemon juice. Top each serving with confectioners' sugar.

Waffles for supper, for lunch, for young and old, are a simple choice these days with a handy packaged mix. Add water and beat as though you meant it. Remember to preheat the waffle iron, and no peeking until it stops steaming.

Quick tips: One teaspoon vanilla in the waffle batter for special flavor, or 1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind.

For quick French pancakes, use the convenient waffle mix by stirring batter only to the consistency of thick cream. Spoon plums with tapioca into each thin hot cake, roll tightly and neatly and dust with sugar. Serve on hot plate.

Basic Waffles
(Makes 4-8 waffles)

For those who prefer to start from scratch, here is a tested waffle recipe:

Two cups sifted flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 to 2 teaspoons sugar (optional), 3 eggs, separated; 1 cup milk, 1/4 cup melted shortening.

Mix and sift dry ingredients. Combine well-beaten egg yolks and milk, and add to dry mixture. Beat vigorously until smooth. Stir in shortening and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in hot waffle iron.

Rainy Season Start In Korea Halts Fighting

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — Torrential rains beat down on already soaked and muddy Korean battle lines Monday and virtually halted ground and air fighting for the third straight day.

The steady downpour appeared to be the long overdue start of the Korean rainy season.

Five and one half inches of rain have fallen in the Old Baldy and T-Bone hill areas, the two trouble spots on the Western front, since Friday.

Chinese troops hold the crest of Old Baldy and the upper section of T-Bone.

AP Correspondent Milo Farnell reported cave-ins in some of the rain-drenched bunkers occupied by Allied infantrymen in the Old Baldy area.

He said roads were washed out in several places.

MUNSAN, Korea (AP) — United Nations and Communist staff officers discussed minor wording differences in the Korean armistice document Monday but did nothing to solve the deadlock on prisoner exchange.

Prisoner exchange has bogged the plenary sessions, now recessed until Aug. 3.

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New Strong Man Succeeds Farouk As Egypt's Ruler

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — The head of Egypt's powerful Wafdist party voiced jubilant support Monday for the country's new strong man, Maj. Gen. Mohammed Naguib Bey, and hailed his ouster of King Farouk and his promise of a relentless nationwide cleanup of "bribery and corruption."

The sweeping praise for Naguib came from Mustapha El Nahas Pasha, the party head whom Farouk ousted from the premiership after last January's disastrous fire riots in Cairo and who returned Monday from a European holiday. A high Wafdist source said the

party, Egypt's largest and the sweeping victor in the last general elections, would support Naguib and his new premier, Aly Maher Pasha.

Nahas Pasha's high praise for Naguib and his plans took on particular interest for observers here, since much of the corruption which the new regime has sworn to root out and punish has been charged in the past to members of the earlier Wafdist administration.

The violently nationalist Wafdist, too, were chiefly responsible for Egypt's ordering the British out of the Suez Canal Zone and the

Anglo-Egyptian Sudan.

Farouk Sails For Italy

As the cabinet quit the summer capital at Alexandria for Cairo, the ousted monarch sailed toward Italy in the royal yacht Mahroussa.

With Farouk were his six-month-old son, now Egypt's King Fuad II, Farouk's teen-age second wife Nariman, and his three daughters by a previous marriage.

One newspaper said the baby king would be returned to Egypt when he is seven years old, the age at which Moslem mothers traditionally lose control of their sons.

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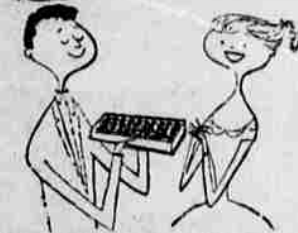


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
