Delegates From Oregon Relate Convention Jolt

PORTLAND (AP)—Two delegates to the Democratic convention, bewildered by events which led to the defeat of Sen. Estes Kefauver for the presidential nomination, returned to Oregon Monday.

Multnomah County Sheriff Terry Schunk, chairman of the delegation, said, "Out West there, we're just not used to the kind of opposition we ran into. We were a bunch of farm boys among city slickers."

Nicholas Granet, a Portland attorney, said, "I learned something about politics. I was a babe in the woods."

Both men, although ardent supporters of the Tennesseean for the nomination, said they thought their party had selected a strong ticket with Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois and Sen. John Sparkman of Alabama.

Granet, criticizing the "Stevenson draft" which gave the Illinois governor the nomination on the third ballot, said: "There was absolutely no draft. Jack Arvey (Chicago politician) tried to make a draft all week but he couldn't do it."

What really swept Stevenson into the nomination, Granet said, was President Truman's support.

Chinese Youth Wins Fight For U.S. Entry

PORTLAND (AP)—A 16-year-old Chinese youth, fighting for U. S. citizenship, will be admitted to the United States at least temporarily under an order signed Tuesday by Federal Judge Gus J. Solomon.

The boy, Louis Kyle Fale, now is in Hong Kong. His attorney said the U. S. consul there refused him a passport.

Judge Solomon directed Secretary of State Acheson to admit the boy so he can be present for the trial of his suit for U. S. citizenship.

The suit, filed by Fale's relatives, claims he is entitled to citizenship on ground that his father, a Portland cook, is a U. S. citizen.

EXETER, England (AP)—Novelist J. B. Priestley was divorced Tuesday by his wife. She accused him of misconduct. The Priestleys were married in 1926 and have two grown children.

Roseburg Swim Meet Aug. 15

The third annual Southern Oregon Invitational swim meet in the Roseburg municipal pool Aug. 15 will be strictly amateur, according to Co-chairman Bob McKee of the sponsoring Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Also, domination of the meet will no longer be limited to the Portland athletic clubs as it has been in the past two runnings of the event.

McKee stated that invitations have been sent out to "Y" and clubs localized in the lower Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon. This will eliminate Portland and Washington Clubs, who have annually swam away with the lion's share of prizes in the meet.

In limiting the meet to strictly amateur talent, McKee explained that no added attractions such as Olympic Diver Al Patnik or the perennial professional clown divers will be included on the one-night program. In the two past years, the meet has extended over two nights.

McKee shares the Junior Chamber swim meet chairmanship with Bill Miles and Jerry Coen.

Outcast Rivera Rejoins Chicago

CHICAGO (AP)—Outfielder Jim Rivera, a Chicago White Sox outcast, rejoins the team Tuesday after the Sox pulled a sleight-of-hand waiver maneuver with the St. Louis Browns.

The transaction, announced Monday, also brings catcher Darrell Johnson, 23, to the Sox on waivers from the Browns. Outfielder Ray Coleman, 30, hitting .215 for Chicago, was sold to St. Louis and catcher J. W. Porter was sold by Memphis, a White Sox farm club, to the Browns.

The Sox optioned catcher Bud Sheely to Memphis to round out the player deal. Sheely formerly played with Seattle in the Coast League and with Spokane and Vancouver in the Western International League.

Rivera, highly touted by Rogers Hornsby last season when he was with him at Seattle where he won the Pacific Coast League batting crown with .352, currently is batting .255 with 39 RBI's for 95 games.

"If Rivera can hit .250 he can help us," Paul Richards, Sox manager, has said.
