U.S. Hoop Squad Playing For Olympic Championship

HELSINKI (AP) — The undefeated United States basketball team clinched a place in the Olympic finals Tuesday with a record - scoring 130 to 55 triumph over Chile.

Three American men swimmers, Wayne Moore and Jimmy McLane of Yale and Ford Konno, 19-year-old Ohio State freshman from Hawaii, earned places in the final of the 400 meter free style event.

Pat McCormick of Long Beach, Calif., took the early lead in women's three-meter springboard diving with defending champion Zoe Ann Olsen Jensen of Oakland, Calif., back in fourth place after the morning round of compulsory dives.

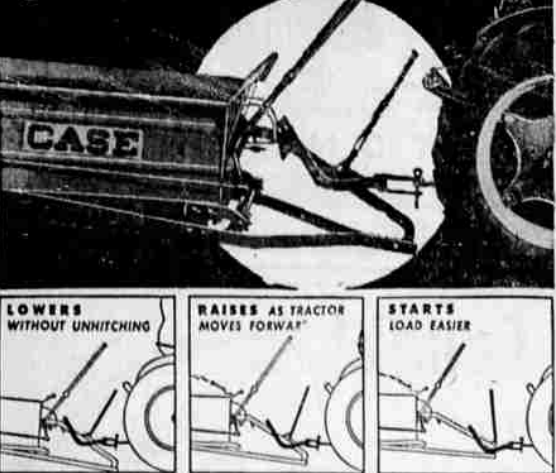
And, as usual, two more Olympic records were broken. The semi-finals of the men's 400 meter freestyle turned into another record-breaking carnival as Jean Boiteux of France lowered the Olympic mark to four minutes 33.1 seconds.

Geertje Wielema of Holland broke the Olympic record for the women's 100 meter backstroke when she won her qualifying heat in 1:13.8.

Boiteux nosed out Per-Olaf Ostrand of Sweden, who Monday set up a 400 meter record of 4:38.6 for the others to shoot at, Ostrand, in second place, also won under that mark with a 4:33.6 clocking.

Miss Wielema broke the Olympic backstroke record of 1:14.2 set by Karen Harup Tanska of Denmark in 1948. By placing fourth in this heat, Barbara Stark of Berkeley, Calif., qualified for the final on a time basis.

Seattle Fighting For Top Place

The Seattle Rainiers, who believed they had clinched a Pacific Coast League first division berth after last week's successes against fading Los Angeles, had their hands full trying to stay in the loop's top bracket.

The Beavers played inspired baseball against San Diego last week and enter the seven-game series against Seattle only 2 1/2 games back of the fourth-place Rainiers.

Seattle Manager Bill Sweeney nominated Al Widmar (10-9) to face Lyman Lunde (10-9) in the initial contest at Portland Tuesday night.

Meanwhile, the Angels, the League's biggest disappointment of the season, are home for a series against Oakland, which is engaged in a life-and-death struggle with Hollywood for the pennant.

The Angels, who were picked by many to finish no worse than third, are 14 games behind Hollywood and occupy sixth place.

San Diego, which showed signs of cracking in the last two weeks and fell from a tie for first place to third, seven and one-half games back, will take on Sacramento's cellar dwellers.

Hollywood recouped some lost ground in its last two weeks' stay at home and faces San Francisco this week in Seals' Stadium.

Rocky Eyes Title Shot At Walcott

NEW YORK (AP) — Rocky Marciano eyes a Sept. 23 million dollar title shot at heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott after his sensational two-round knockout of Harry Matthews.

"Marciano and Walcott will do all you can put in the till," said Jim Norris, International Boxing Club president after Monday night's Yankee Stadium elimination bout. "A million is conservative guess, not counting television or theater TV."

Walcott, who watched Marciano's crushing left hooks to the jaw sprawl Matthews on his back in 2:04 of the second round, said he was "looking forward to meeting Marciano."

Asked for a critical opinion on the fight, he said, "He's a pretty good puncher, a hard puncher. But I thought the other fellow (Matthews) was a little careless."

Back under the stands in Matthews' dressing room, manager Jack Hurley who does all the talking for his Seattle fighter said "Harry was a glorified amateur for 10 years and tonight he reverted to type." Matthews had little to say, grinning sheepishly. Neither had any alibi about hands or officials.

The payoff on Marciano-Matthews was disappointing in contrast to early estimates. But a last minute gate sale saved it from being a flop. A crowd of 31,188 paid \$215,707 to see the show.

Matthews won round No. 1 on the cards as referee Ray Miller, guided Harold Barnes and Joe Evellino and the AP but that was all, brother.

Two crunching hooks to the jaw, some 30 seconds after a long looping right started Matthews on his way, brought victory to swarthy Rocky, an 11 to 5 favorite. Marciano had an 8 1/2 pound advantage at 187 1/2 to Matthews' 179.

When the 29-year-old Matthews went down on his back, clutched at the ropes in an attempt to get up and the collapsed over the bottom strand, he lost his first fight since 1943.

His last loss also was a KO by Eddie Booker in 1943. In his long 105-bout career he has lost only four and was unbeaten in his last 70 until Marciano came along.

Marciano put a spectacular end to the fabulous Matthews story. No question about that. Scoring his 37th knockout in 42 all-winning fights, Rocky proved again his stunning power and strength.

In the first round, the slickster from the great Northwest out-jabbed him and beat him to the punch with his short, straight counters.

The end came rather suddenly. As he retreated toward his own corner, he tried to slip away from a Marciano hook like he did in the first round. He didn't slip far enough and took it on the jaw.

Another hook as he started to go down drove him to the canvas almost in the lap of Hurley.

Although he made a fumbling attempt to arise, it seemed to most ringers he never would make it. He didn't.

For the night's work, a few seconds more than five minutes in the 85-degree heat, each fighter gets about \$49,181. By rejecting \$100,000 theater-TV deal they probably turned down another \$30,000 each.

Rifle Club Gets Five Of 10 Trophies

Roseburg's Rifle Club ran off with a lion's share of medals and trophies in the regional .30 caliber rifle shoot at the National Guard Rifle Range here over the weekend.

With results finally tabulated Roseburg riflemen had snagged five of the 10 trophies, 16 first-place silver medals, 14 second-place bronze medals and one gold medal. It was the biggest array of medals and cups ever offered at an Oregon rifle shoot, according to Spokesman Bill Jones. Awarded to winners were 72 medals and 10 trophies.

Leading the list of Roseburg trophy winners was Harold Beauchamp in the expert class. He won the only local trophy for the high Roseburg shooter. His score of 466x500 for grand aggregate gave him the Hugh Harrison Roseburg Championship trophy.

Beauchamp Trophy
Probably his most brilliant showing however, was a perfect 150 score in the long-range grand aggregate. He scored a perfect 100 the first day and 50 the second to edge out Gene Endicott of Redmond who scored 149. Endicott, incidentally, was the top shooter of the meet, winning the grand aggregate overall with a score of 485. For his outstanding showing in the long-range firing, Beauchamp won the Umpqua Gun Store trophy.

The most consistent Roseburg winner was Bill Jones in the marksmen class. He won five silver medals, one bronze and the Harold Beauchamp trophy. Larry Davie in the sharpshooter class grabbed off three silver medals, two bronzes and a gold medal. But he was edged out in the grand aggregate in that class by Johnny Parsons who had two silver medals, three bronzes and a trophy.

In the team events, Bend No. 1 Rifle Club snared the championship with a score of 765. Portland Rifle Club was second with 735. Roseburg's second team of John Parsons, Dean Paulson, Hugh Harrison and Hugh Pearson turned in a surprising 735 for third place. It outshot the Roseburg No. 1 team to snare the third spot.

Sergeant Wins

Oregon's state semi-professional baseball champs, the Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks make their first appearance on Finlay Field this year when they play the Roseburg Chiefs Wednesday night at 8:30.

This mid-week exhibition tilt will be the second of the week for the Chiefs. Tonight, they travel to Coquille for a kings-X game with the Loggers. The game is slated for 8 p.m. DST.

Manager Earl Sargent reports he will send Old Workhorse Bus Sporer to the mound against the Lumberjacks Wednesday night. It was Sporer who pitched a brilliant game at Coos Bay in the first League meeting of the two teams in mid-June. He gave up seven hits in one of the tightest pitcher's duels of the year which he lost to Al Treichel, currently the hottest hurler in the Southwestern Oregon League.

Against the power-laden Jacks, the Chiefs have lost three. The first was the pitcher's battle which Sporer dropped, 3-0, and the second was a 9-0 whitewash by the Lumberjacks. With the loss of four of Roseburg's top players, the Chiefs were battered last week, 16-2.

Tonight, Sargent has scheduled Mickey Coen for starting mound chores against Coquille. Sargent stated that Coen would also start against the Harlem Globetrotters this Sunday when Roseburg draws a bye in the SWO League.

The reason for starting the young right-hander against the Trotters rests on the desire of a Cleveland Indian scout to watch the Roseburg youth in action, Sargent states. The Roseburg manager goes on to say that the anonymous scout has been interested in the Willamette University sophomore for some time. He asked Sargent to start him. This should considerably enhance interest in the game.
