Color Scheme Tried As Guide Through Cities

"When going south, you should see red."

This isn't a lesson in losing your temper. It's the advice you might receive under an experiment being conducted in Washington, D. C. The American Automobile Association has informed the Oregon State Motor Association that an experiment is underway to aid motorists in finding their way through cities by using different colors for different directions.

At Washington Circle in the nation's capital drivers are somewhat startled to find the federal highway markers in brilliant colors: blue, green, yellow and red. All roads with yellow lead west; those marked in blue are heading in a northerly direction; green means you're heading east, while a red sign shows you're traveling south—that's the additional visual aid the motorist would receive under the plan.

The AAA, whose travel experts contend that finding the way through cities is one of the motorist's principal headaches, is watching the colored marker experiment with interest. The idea originated in the office of George Koenig, director of traffic for D. C. If the system proves satisfactory for the nation's capital, Koenig says he will try to get its use extended to the entire federal interstate highway system.

This is somewhat similar to a plan several months ago under which the motorist would be guided through a city by the color of the center stripe. The plan has not been too popular, however, Oregon State Motor Association officials say.

NEW ICE-MAKING PROCESS

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—A new commercial process that is said to make ice 30 times faster and much cheaper than conventional methods has been developed by a University of Texas scientist, Prof. John R. Watt.

The new technique resembles nature's process of making hail from raindrops. Watt's method forms a center core of ice and adds frozen layers rapidly from coatings of pre-cooled water. Ice produced in this manner can be cut in blocks, crushed or shredded.

HORSES STILL IN DEMAND

GLIDDEN, Ia. (AP)—Old Dobbin may have retired from most Midwestern farms, but he's still in demand in the Northeastern United States, Billy Merritt, horse-buyer, says.

Merritt, who attends horse auctions in Iowa, Nebraska and Missouri, says a good young draft horse brings about \$100. The horses have to be big and strong and teams must be matched. So far, Merritt says, he has shipped 10 carloads of horses this year.

Allies In Korea Have Clever Spy In Candy Bar Kid

TACOMA (AP)—Twenty-three-year-old Lyle Lewis, the Marines Kandy Bar Kid who stalks Communists behind the lines in Korea, as a youth stalked deer in the woods and always carried a ration of candy bars, his father recalled today.

"That's him from baby up," L. D. Lewis, a heavy construction foreman here, said of a dispatch from Korea describing how the young Marine penetrates Communist lines, sometimes to a depth of two miles, taking along three candy bars as his rations while on missions lasting as long as 40 hours.

Lewis said his son, now with the U. S. First Marine Division, had hunted from childhood.

"He always was a deer stalker and he always carried a couple of candy bars. That was his ration," Lewis said.

Lewis said Lyle joined the Marines five years ago and had been in Korea eight months.

"He was never one to talk much about himself," he said, "and he's never mentioned much in his letters home. He said though when he got home he would tell us things

that would make our blood boil." Lyle's wife, Charles, and their three children live here with Lewis. They were married three and on half years ago.

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MINNESOTA ESTABLISHES

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Minnesota claims two unique national distinctions for its civil defense organization.

The most northern civil defense ground observer post in the nation is in a lumber camp in the state's Northwest Angle. Facilities at the post include an 80-foot look-out tower and radio station.

Fourteen inmates at the St. Cloud Reformatory for men have been training for several weeks to handle what is believed to be the only observer post in the country located in a penal institution. The observer post is on the reformatory roof.
